



Tuberculosis Is Fifth Most Deadly Disease in Texas

There is no more emphatic proof the power of ignorance and arelessness to spread disease than shown by the continued ravage tuberculosis, which is respon ble for more deaths between the ges of fifteen and forty-five than v other disease.

Despite the knowledge of its ause, spread, and curative proedures, tuberculosis continues to a grave public health problem, and today it holds fifth place among the killing diseases in this This fact exists even hough the majority of tubercuosis patients could have their condition arrested, if it were recognized early and proper treatment

These facts are disclosed by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Offir, who says, "treatment of the recovery. It is of equal importance, from a public health view point, that the spread of this de vastating infection be prevented. A more widespread appreciation of his fact would result in the savng of thousands of lives.'

The State Health Officer added: "When a diagnosis of active uberculosis has been made, examnation of all other members of he family should follow as a mater of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any special susceptibility, but because t is communicable and easily transmitted from one member of

the family to others." To reduce the number of deaths caused by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox urges periodic examinations of all adults, including chest X-rays; frequent check-ups by physicians where active cases and their con tacts are known; isolation or hos pitalization of active tuberculosis cases, and a more intelligent application of hygienic living prin-

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


