The speech will be the first in a series of grassroots and "whistle stop" speeches the President will make prior to the congressional elections in November, Just how the President is going to handle this campaign is a question being asked here in Washington, for there is little question that the 81st congress has made just as poor a record as a "do-nothing congress" as the 80th, which the President castigated from coast to coast for not carrying out his Fair Deal program.

The opinion has been expressed budget. that one reason for this early speech of the President may be to stir-up this congress, nominally Democratic, but controlled by a coalition of southern Democrats and Republicans. Even so, these observers point out, it will be pretty late for any very outstanding action before adjournment which is expected along about July 1.




