Granting of this franchise on the cil: water facilities here has been under discussion for some time by

the council. Following a lengthy discussion on the question, the following

the concessions that were previously agreed to and including the fluoridization of the water that the Community Public Service Co. be granted a franchise with the city having a two year option to purchase the facilities

at a price not to exceed \$350,-This motion was seconded and upon call for a vote five councilmen voted to renew the franchise.

"That if the City is granted

One voted against the motion and one abstained from the voting. Prior to this vote, the council heard two engineers submit bids for surveying the water facilities and determining its value and one representative from a bond buying firm of Ft. Worth.

The two engineers, H. N. Roberts of Lubbock and Joe D. Ward of Wichita Falls, offered bids to the council to survey the Community Public Service Co. holdings in order that the city might set a purchase price.

Clarence Hendricks, the bond firm representative, presented a plan for the city to purchase the facilities through bonds issued in cooperation with his firm.

No action was taken on these proposals. The council had discussed hiring an engineer to evaluate the holdings at their May meeting.

This was the regular monthly meeting of the council which had been postponed from Tuesday because of the holiday.



Q. I am the stepmother of World War II veteran who was killed in action. He was in my care and custody prior to his entrance into service. May I file a claim for compensation?

A. Yes. Q. My brother, an honorably dis charged World War I veteran was buried in Potter's Field because his estranged wife was not interested where he was buried What procedure must be followed to have buried in a National Cemetery and will VA pay the expense?

A. Application for burial should be made to the superintendent of the National Cemetery where burial is desired. Upon application to VA an amount may be allowed, it being assumed that no allowance has heretofore been made by VA for burial purposes.


Q. I have been receiving compensation from VA and \$21 additional for a dependent wife. She has now gotten herself a job and is earning a fair salary. May I still claim he as a dependent?

A. The additional compensation provided on account of wife or shild to veterans having a disability of 50 per cent or more is not based on dependency but sole- yo-yo ly on relationship.
