

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
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National Oil Week

Jefferson Davis, former president of the Confederacy, and one of the best-loved men in the South, was the first man elected to the Presidency of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. In June of 1875, the board of directors for the newly-authorized school met in Bryan and voted to offer the post to Davis, then living in retirement Bryan and voted to offer the post to Davis, then living in retirement in his native Mississippi. Governor Richard Coke, chairman of the board, tendered the offer in a manner typical of the feeling of the times. "As the representative, not only of the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas," he wrote, "but in behalf of the State of Texas and all her people, I ask that you come and live with and be one of us, and make your home and resting place, after a long and eventful public service, among a people who will never cease to love and honor you." The former President replied that "No occupation would be more acceptable to me..." but that "In the consciousness that I could not satisfactorily perform the duties of the office." he must decline to accept it. In poor health, Davis was of the office," he must decline to accept it. In poor health, Davis was never again able to assume major public duties. 
