

The Proposed 22nd Amendment

The reluctance of state legislatures, including that of Texas, to ratify the proposed 2nd amendment to the federal constitution, limiting presidents to two terms, s probably due to a feeling on the part of legislators that the people can be trusted not to make a habit of giving more than two terms and that their hands should not be tied in this respect. Up to now, 27 states have ratified the proposal, with none more needed to give it effectiveness.

Perhaps the amendment would have wider appead if it applied to Mr. Truman. It does not. Thereis a clause in it which says that it shall not effect the president who was in office when it was submitted. If it were to be immediately ratified, it would not
