

S, C. Harrison was elected to a two-year term as Mayor. Frank Manzingo received 90 votes to defeat B. B. McMillan, who received 23, in Ward three, the only contested position in the election. Monzingo was running for reelection.

Other Councilmen elected in the election are O. L. Helm in Ward Two who polled 24 votes, O. V. Alexander in Ward One with 28 votes and E. C. Rice in Ward Four with 23 votes. Helm was running for re-election. Retiring





THE CHANGING FARMS

Throughout the United States for the past two or three decades we have noticed the change that has come over various industries, Our cities have grown, businesses have changed and are now for the most part, larger, more prosperous, other words, we, in this country have raised our standards of living

The American farmer is no exception to this change throughout the country.

Today, American farmers own 91 billion dollars worth of land, buildings, livestock and equipment. This gigantic food "factory" turned out approximately 30 billon dollars worth of produce in 1950, or a third of the value of the "plant" itself.

In 1900 and even in 1910. American agriculture produced only a sixth of its own physical value in a year. Even in prosperous 1929 it produced a little less than one-fourth of its "plant" value, according to a study by the Family Economics Bureau.

Though America's farm population has srunk from 32 million persons to 28 millon in less than half-a-century, this 12 per cent smaller force now produces twice as much food and other products as in 1900; has boosted its output per man hour by 35 per cent since 1940, according to the study.

Accomplishment

The American farmer has accomplished these gain through a 900 per cent increase in his investment in tools and machinery since 1910, and by use of better methods, better seed better livestock, and more fertilizer.

The average U. S. farm is a third bigger today, comprising 195 acres of land, as against an average of 146 acres in 1900] and 145 acres in 1925.

Annual net income per farm was only \$350 in 1900; \$960 in a dangerious world of fantasy in 1925 and amounted to an estimated \$2,225 in 1950.

The statistical "average farmer" in 1950 was 49 years old His 195 acres of land with their buildings were worth \$10,000. He owned \$2,200 worth of implements, machinery and motor wehicles. His livestock and poultry were worth \$2,100. . . . a total "plant" value of \$14,300.

In addition he had \$1,200 worth of crops in storage, and petition is the backbone of the he held about \$3,100 in cash, bank deposits and savings bonds; he also owned \$350 worth of stock in his local cooperative.

Against these assets was a mortage now paid down to \$850 only 81/2 per cent of the value of his land and buildings (his mortage amounted to 20 per cent of land and building value before the war); he also owed his bank, the CCC and his local merchants a total of about \$1,100. leaving him a net worth of \$17,000.

The new regulations are issued to take these foods from under war-time regulantions in the food the general "freeze" order of January 26 and put them under a system of price control which veathered the test of experience luring the war period.

Major grocery items not covered are fresh milk, and cream, fresh meats, bread, fresh fruits and vegetables, sugar, ice cream. oft drinks and candy, along with a number of less important foods and "speciality" items. Beers, vines, and liquors are also excluled

Except for fresh fruits and vegtables and sugar, which are now exempt from price control, prices of all excluded items remain unler the General Ceiling Price Regulation. Regulations to meet the pecial pricing problems involved n production and sale of the excluded items are being prepared at OPS for early issuance.
