

vas the after dinner talk by Dr. D. D. Jackson of Texas Technological College. Dr. Jackson called his lecture "America's Years in the Sun." He scanned through some factual material which emphasized the idea that the United States with one-seventh of the world's land and one-sixteenth of the world's population produces 92% of the world's bath-tubs, 85% of the automobiles, 57% of the petroleum, 51% of the cotton; he repeated Franklin D. Roosevelt's memorable statement that we are indeed the "arsenal of democracy". Then he swiftly recalled the times when Persia, Greece, Rome, Spain, and England held their respective places in the sun and lost them.

"Why", Dr. Jackson asked," do we now hold this significant place in the sun? For how many years will we hold it?" We hold it now, he said, not because we have the most natural resources because we don't; not because we are the most intellectual people on the earth, because scientific surveys have proved that we are not; not because we are good looking because artists have said the Latin Americans are the best looking people in the world. "No, none of these is the reason for America's years in the sun, but the fact that we are a Christian nation; we were founded upon the principle of the respect and dignity of Man; Christianity and Democracy walk hand in hand!" He concluded his masterful address with the challenge: "How much longer will America hold her place in the sun? How many more years do we have in the sun? It all depends upon the faith and work and intelligence and prayers of the Christian people.

In our paper recently was a story concerning the increase in number of passenger cars, commercial and farm vehicles that were licensed last year over 1950.

All over the country the increase was noticeable. This, taken into consideration shows in our taxes that the pocketbook of the American motorist is the main support of state government.

It paid 29 percent, or over two and a quarter billion of the nearly eight billion dollars in taxes collected by the 48 states in 1950-\$1,548 million in motor fuel taxes and \$749 million in motor vehicle license fees, according to a summary of trends in state taxes compiled by the family economics bureau

Sales taxes rank No 2 as a source of state revenue and are coming up fast—though only 28 states levy general sales taxes these furnish 21 percent of total state tax collections in the United States for 1950, or \$1,679 million, compared with 15 percent furnished from this source in 1940, and less than onehalf percent in 1930.

State income taxes are also mounting in importance as a source of state revenue, the analysis observes, yielding 161/2 percent of total state collections in 1950, or \$1,321 million. rompared with 11 percent of total tax revenues in both 1940 and 1930.

Alcohol and tobacco taxes yielded 111/2 percent of total state tax revenues in 1950, or \$919 million.
