



There Must Be A Better Way

One of the principal issues before the American public today is the current beef rollback which the Office of Price Stabilization has decided must be put into effect.

Cattle people, from the big city packer to the rancher and wondering cowboy, tell us that such a rollback won't work. But their words seem to fall on deaf ears in Washington.

We agree with the cow people! It won't work, not the present program, and here's why:

Price Stabilizer Michael V. DiSalle and his crew seem to be trying to play the housewives against the cattlemen.

Now the cattlemen are for lower prices just as much as the housewives, but you can't lower prices one place when everything else is out of line!

The OPS seems to be trying to play the one segment of the American economy against the other.

The current beef roll back will not work for the reason that you can't put a price control on an industry like the catthe industry in the middle group as they propose to do. -

There are no rules or laws about what a rancher can sell his cattle for and with the high prices of feed and range land, he certainly is going to get every cent he can for them just like you would if you had some cattle to sell. Thus when he dose OPS is out to ruin you . . find a market at the current trends, and it is high, the packer or slaughter who must buy these cattle in competition at a sales or auction ring, certainly can't be expected to take a decreased profit for his labor, just so the American housewife can buy meat from her butcher for a few cents cheaper.

Already there is a meat shortage. Mr. DiSalle claims this will remedy itself shortly. But if you were a packer and stood to lose on each cow you butchered would you be in any hurry or rush to lose your money? Well, packers and slaughterers are no different. They are in business to make money, just like anyone else, and if necessary, many of them are going to go out of business before they operate under such conditions.

Now, in case you are among those that agree that beef is too high and want to see a decrease in price, we agree with show that Mike DiSalle and his ators had been getting last year you that it is high, but we don't believe in discriminating against one group in the industry to get those low prices.
