A contract to clean part of Agree On Rate Hike, Improvements the city's sewer system was let this week by Mayor Carl Harrison after action by the City Council who voted in favor of cleaning the sewer system.

Southwestern Norcam Company of Dallas was awarded the cleaning contract at an estimated cost of \$2400.

Actual work is epected to begin sometime in August.

Mayor Harrison announced areas to be cleaned include the alley between Main and Brice streets from the high school to the railroad tracks, the alley between Noel and Robertson, streets from seventh to Front street and some of the sewer lines leading into seventh street sewer.

The Norcam Company conducted a sewer survey of Memphis last month and these were the ps, Coy Smith, and Reymond sewer lines which needed attention the most according to Norcam representatives.





### **Cattlemen** Alerted For Herd Disease

A baffling disease of cattle which often creeps into a herd without noticeable symptoms is now causing losses to farmers in 41 states, the American Foundation for Animal Health reported here today.

The Foundation's report said the condition, known as Johne's disease, is regarded as one of the most difficult of all infections to eradicate from cattle herds. Slow to develop, it is very hard to detect in its early stages.

"The disease is caused by a young or the very inexperienced tiny germ which attacks the in- believe that a person has to be testinal tract. Symptoms are most likely to man who can carry a 30-pound how up in animals from two to six years old. Such animals may have harbored the germ since calfood and this long incubation perod makes the disease difficult to stamp out once it shows up in a herd.

"Control depends on an accurat" liagnosis, as there is danger of confusing the disease with tuberulosis," say Foundation authoriies. "Clinical tests enable the veterinarian to spot the reactors which should then be removed from the herd and sold for slaughter The premises should also be disinfected and young calves kept away from contaminated quarters if this dangerous infection is to

The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily in spection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer to insist on the proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat.

If the public is carless in thi respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only main tain the level the public is will ing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness

The State Health Department a making every effort to improv sanitation of eating places Dr Cox said, and their is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handler schools which are being offere all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of ap proved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The nublic should be aware of these sanitary rules and regula tions and insist that restaurant. observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than **Kulp Family** the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

### **Do Your Guides Have Dirty Feet?**

This provocative query has nothing to do with the tootsies of man, Helen Shackleford, Guyula Cawlfield, Sandra Kay Lee, Matwho charge you five bucks to take you where the fish aren't biting . . . The guides referred to are those on your rod, and the feet are the flat ends of the quide over which silk thread is wound.

When these feet become cake with lin dressing, which in turn picks up minute particles of dirt it acts as an abrasive. This is rough on good fly lines and brings on that curse of all fly fishermen-a sinking fly line, according to Heddon's research de partment.

They advise a regular cleaning of guide feet, and here's how Simply brush thm out with a small paint brush saturated with naphtha, about every three or four fishing trips.

And, Heddon's caution, remem ber that it's not how much line dressing you put on that counts, but how little you can apply and still give a complete coating to your line.

If a pad comes with your dressing, throw it away for it be comes a dirt catcher. Apply the dressing with your clean bare hands, after cleaning your line with naphtha, and before every fishing trip. If your lader won't sink, try washing it with a small piece of abrasive soap.

In other words, a floating line a sinking leader and a good Heddon fly rod mean enjoyable fish ing-IF you keep those feet clean.


