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

ENOUGH PULLERS

Hall county cotton farmers with their crops already reduced by the summer drought, faced another great problem this weekthe problem of harvesting their crop and getting it to the gins.

With only about 10-15 per cent of the county's cotton harvested and gined, the labor supply has aleady begun to dwindle

Willie Basoco, in charge of farm labor in this area, reported from 750 to 1,000 pullers are now eeded. Several hundred transient aborers have been placed on county farms during the past few weeks, but the rapidly opening olls has caused the local labor lemand to go up.

Also many of the transient laporers are moving on to other ections of the country where coton crops are reported to be better, in orded to make more money. Prices paid here are about the ame, but pullers claim they can make more where cotton harvest s thicker than as it is in many laces here in Hall county.

Pulling price delivered here in Hall county is \$2.50 per hundred pounds and in the fields \$2 per hundred pounds.

Ace Gailey, agent for the U.S. Departmeth of Commerce Census Bureau, turned in the first cotton ginning report recently as of October 1, and showed officially 4,237 bales of 1951 cotton already ginned. This compares to 507 bales as of the same date last year, Gailey said.

This week the biggest demand for cotton pullers came from Littlefield, Plainview and Vernon. Plainview area farmers asked for up to 2,000 pullers and Vernon and also asked for feed shockers and oil mill workers.

Farmers Cash **Income Higher** This Year

Cash income for Texas farmers and ranchers in the first eight months of 1951 was 37 per cent higher than in the same period last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Most impressive were cumulative gains in income from cattle sales-half again as large as in 1950-and in income from cotton, cottonseed and wool production-all up more than 50 per cent from the preceding year.

Other commodities which yield ed greater revenue during the first two-thirds of 1951 included mohair (up 41 per cent), hogs (up 36 per cent), sheep and lambs (up 12 per cent), poultry (up 44 per cent), eggs (up 45 per cent), and milk and milk products (up 10 per cent).


Except for cotton, cottonseed and grain sorghums, all commo dities that registered year-to-year gains were animals or animal products. In general, vegetables fruit and field crops fared worse this year than last.

Grain sorghum brought raisers twice as much income in 1951 as in 1950.

In other words, it can be said

that all of the additional taxes that you have to pay, plus some your old taxes, will go for foreign aid. You can see that most of these funds are earmarked for Europe and the North Atlantic Treaty countries.

In most of these countries the per capita public debt is less than ours, while at the same time their standard of living will equal only about one-third of our standard of living. I wish that I had the space to give you some of the figures on these public debts of foreign countries and the present standards of living in those countries. I will try to do it in a future news letter
