TAXES: This news letter is | In New York City the man who being written just after my return delivers the milk gets as much for to my office from casting a vote on the new tax bill. That is the tax bill that would increase taxes in order to gather another 5-% billion dollars-the same tax bill that failed to pass on October

My vote was cast against this tax increase on Tuesday and was cast against the bill on Friday. There is much that can be said both for and against the bill, and I have done my best to give deep and conscientious consideration to all of the amendments on both

I have never seen the House of Representatives quieter or more tense during the roll-call on this bill. The final vote was 185 "yeas" to 160 "nays." Lack of space will not permit me to tell you of the many interesting incidents that occured during the past week, especially concerning this tax measure, but I hope to be back in the district before long and will try to do it then

PUBLIC DEBTS: I told you in my letter last week that I would try to give you the present per capita public debt in the European countries as compared with the per capita debt of this counrty. Here are some of them:

United States \$1660.00; Belgium \$511.00; Denmark \$274.00; France \$226.00; Iceland \$98.00; Italy \$91.00; Luxembourg \$353.00 Netherlands \$632.00; Norway \$440.00 Portugal \$40.00; United Kingdom \$1277.00.

You will note that the nearest approach to the per capita debt of the United States is that of Great Britain. The figures on the foreign countries are based on the end of the 1950 fiscal year, except Great Britain, which is March 31, 1951. The figure for the United States is as of October

FARM INCOME: Here is some information that I know will be of interest to the farmers, since it seems to be the policy that every time a farmer gets his head above water, someone wants to hit him with an oar. Most of you know that the farmers have been subjected to much criticism about from March of Dimes funds this high prices, and this information year to add to the storehouse of is given you to show that the farmer is not to blame.

For instance, according to present statistics, on an average basis, bread that is now selling for 16 cents a loaf was selling for approximately 2 cents less pound in 1948. In January, 1948 wheat was selling at \$2.79. It is now bringing \$2.07.

This shows that the farmer i getting over a cent less per pound for his wheat, while the consum er is paying two cents more for the bread. The same situation is true as to milk. The Texas averbrought Texas farmers an average of \$6.60.

THE FARM LABOR PRO-BLEM: Several of the Texas congressmen met again with officials of the Department of Labor this week in an effort to try to work out the problem that the farmers are facing in getting their cotton harvested. Other than myself, George Ma-hon, Clark Fisher, Olin Teague, Frank Ikard and Graham Barden, of North Carolina, were present at the meeting, and Omar Burleson of Texas, was represented. We had worked long and hard for a solution of the problem and presented it to these officials, but it is my opinion that they are not going to do anything about it. We intend to continue our efforts for an amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act if the Labor Department does not straignten out the situation, and I firmly believe that we will be able to muster enough support to get this amendment through the first of next year.

This is not going to help the farmers this fall, but, as most of you know, many of these battles up here are up-hill fights. We have some valliant warriors on our side in this fight, and certainly hope to win before
