## Local Voters O. K. Two Amendments SHOW ONLY ONE TO BE PASSED

Voters here in Hall county lidn't agree with other Texans throughout the state on the five amendments which voters acted on at the polls Tuesday.

In the state, only one of the amendments carried, number 4, the one for expanding veterans land program by raising from \$25,000,000 to \$100,000,000 a permitted state bond issue for oans. The other four amendments

were defeated statewide. However here in Hall county voters approved both amendment number four and number five, concerning state velfare payments.

Results showed a few more than 400 persons cast ballots here in this county and results considered decisive by the Texas Election Bureau late Wednesday showd that more than 200,000 Texas voters expressed their will this way:

1. County pensions, approval 64,938, against 120,670. 2. University fund, approval

85,678, against 97,626. 3. Rural fire prevention, approval 66,786, against 117,002. 4. Veterans land fund, approval

99,807, against 86,899. 5. State Welfare payments, approval 84,136, against 108,289. Local county balloting on the five amendments went thus: 1. County pensions, approval

86, against 45. 2. University fund, approval 164, against 247.

3. Rural fire prevention, approval 96, against 315. Veterans land fund, approval 322, against 129.

5. State Welfare payments, approval 238, against 174. Thus state wide, Texans said
