Use of Premerge before the otton came up, supplemented by delayed rotary hoeing and highspeed tractor cultivation followed by late season flame cultivation, resulted in a hand labor cost of \$10.33 per acre. The rotary hoe was used once and the cotton was hand-hoed three times. In this experiment, two pounds

of Permerge in 10 gallons of water were applied per acre in a 10inch band over the drill immediately behind the press wheels. This treatment was used to control shallow-seeded annual weeds and grasses until time for the first cultivation.

Lion Oil No. 1 at the rate of five gallons per acre was applied to a 10-inch band in the drill below the cotton leaves. The two applications were made seven days apart. These applications gave from 94 to 99 percent control of the annual and Johnson grass seedlings. All treated young grass seedlings were killed by the first application of Lion Oil

In another test, a chemical sold inder the trade name Esso Weedkiller No. 38 was just as effective

as Lion Oil No. 1. Rea said, "Except for the burnng of an occasional leaf that was oiled accidently, there was no evident injury to the cotton plant from any of the chemical treat-

The Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission issued a clarfying statement on quail hunting limits because, he ty. said, the varied regulations "naturally have confused some sport-

He reported a number of Panhandle hunters "were understandably mixed up because of belated action liberlizing limits in the 28county Panhandle area over which the Commission has regulatory power."

The Commission, pursuant to Panhandle reports of a fine bobwhite quail crop, increased the daily bag and possession limits slightly after the regular Game Law Ligest had been issued.

The limits in the Panhandle or ginally were ten quail per day and twenty in possession. The Commission increased the bag limit to twelve quail per day and twenty-four in possession.

The Executive Secretary poin ted out that, under the general state quail law, the daily bag limit for most of the state is

Sale of Defense **Bonds to Increase During Christmas**

The banks of Texas will sell about \$5,000,000 worth of Christ-"merchandise" during De-

This is the estimate of Nathan Adams of Dallas, who said that while banks are not ordinarily thought of as "Santa Claus headquarters", about one third of their sales of U. S. Defense Bonds mas presents or year-end bonuses. Adams ought to know, because at 82 he is dean of Texas bankers and has been state Defense Bond chairman for almost ten years.

Adams said that parents are probably the principal buyers of onds as gifts, with grandparents and aunts and uncles not far beaind. 

Farm income in Texas during the first 10 months of 1951 averaged 27 percent more than the same period last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports

The October index was 29 per cent above that of September, statistics reveal. Research indicates inflation rather than a good crop year was responsible for the greater farm income.

During January-October, 1951. cumulative income from marketings of calves, as compared to the same 1950 period, was up 128 per cent; cattle, 57 per cent; wool

56 per cent; eggs, 41 per cent; grain sorghum and poultry, each 39 per cent; hogs, 29 per cent; cottonseed, 28 per cent; and cot-



Cotton Supply Decline Creates Strong Market

Great uncertainty currentl plagues the cotton situation, said Dr. A. B. Cox, internationally distinguished authority on cotton and University of Texas professor of cotton marketing.

"The biggest single question," Dr. Cox stated, "concerns the imminent December estimate (of cotton production by the Department of Agriculture.)

"The deadline in cotton prospects in the U. S. and in foreign countries has been about 3 million bales since August," he continued. "This has created a very bullish supply situation. Should the December estimate be decreased by 1 million bales from the November estimate, prices would most certainly reach the ceiling of 45.39 cents for futures.

"It must be recognized." Dr Cox warned, "that present mill margins in this country will not support such a price.

"The strength in the market on the demand side lies in prospective exports paid for to a large extent by our own government he explained. "It must also be recognized in this connection that as prices advance, the number of bales exportable with government grants decreases. Mills in this country will assuredly seek limitations of exports to hold prices of cotton down in the U. S. in order to continue in full operation.
