THE DAY IS PAST

"The day definitely is past when an individual can hope to grow wealthy from savings out of wages or salary," says a feature article in a recent issue of U. S. News & World Report. "Old ideas about what constitutes a "high" income are having to be revised, along with old ideas about the size of a fortune needed to support a family when a man retires.

This may well be the result of two potent forces which, in combination, have reduced the purchasing power of the dollar on one hand, and have made it impossible for even people with every large gross incomes to save substantial sums on the

Force one is inflation. Today's dollar, going by the government figures, is worth only a little more than half as much as the prewar dollar. Force two is taxation, which now bites deeply into the incomes of people of moderate means, and takes most of the earnings of people in the upper brackets.

Let's review some of the tremendous changes that have occured since 1939. Taking into consideration the most recent tax increases, thte man who earned \$3,000 to \$4,000 a year then, must receive a little better than \$8,000 to \$9,000 now it he is to live as well-and relatively few people have bettered their incomes to so great an extent.

In the higher income brackets-the man who earned \$10,000 must now take in more than \$25,000 if he is to take care of taxes and the results of inflation and have the same

standard as before. Further up the income ladder, the situation becomes almost fantistic. It takes an inmcome of better than \$365,000 a year to mantain living standards that could be bought for \$50,000 in 1939. It is obvious that not one man in hundreds of thoussands has been able to increase his gross so greatly.

As a matter of fact, raises of salary, even though they may charge of expenditures, says the be large, cannot solve the problem-for the simple reason that the tax collector is going to take a large part of the raise and, at high levels, most of it.

Now this type of situation is bad not only for wage earners and salaried people but look at the position in which it puts people with capital.

If taxes and inflation eat up the majority of profits made from any business investment . . . people with the capital to invest aren't going to be very eager to invest if their own the amount of taxes which can be profit is so meager.

Less investment and heavy taxes from wage earners, are gree, the effect of this would be evils that could destroy this country, of free enterprise, much faster and much more completely than Russia or any foreign

Don't be fooled into complacency that any additional taxes the present administration asks for will come from the high income brackets.

Income figures show that future tax money has it's greatest potential from the low, and I repeat low, income bracket. The world policy of this country and this government can-

not be to financially support the world. Most of the world outside the American continents has been in existance or at least inhabated much longer than the United States. They existed satisfactorily for centuries without and regulations that could our help and can continue to do so.

It is right, certainly, for us to help countries and re-estblish economic stability after war has wrecked nations. But to con- Farm and Dairy. tinue indefinitely to pour millions of dollars into countries as the ECA and Marshall Plan has into Europe is most certain to spell eventual doom for this country.

Future policies of the adminstration of this government should be to reduce taxes and government costs instead of asking for increased tax rates.

And if the present administration cannot realize or adhere to this, then let the other political parties campaigning for the 1952 elections take note.

There must be a stop to this lavish spending soon!
