2. An aggressive town spirit, in which the townspeople are entered in doings for their community.

3. A local government that is alert, progressive and businesslike. Industry also prefers cities with balanced budgets and a comparative low debt per capita, but with a reputation for vallis, Ore., Gazette Times. good municipal facilities.

4. A good educational system with an adequate, well-equip-

- ped library, as well as other cultural facilities.
- Churches representating all denominations.

6. Adequate health services and hospitals.

7. Adequate recreational facilities and places of conregation where people can play or visit together.


8. Suitable housing at costs which employees can afford. 9. Good shopping places.
