



At the insistence of Texas Press Association, the 51st Legislature in 1949 passed the "Mandatory Publications

The act was passed because some city, county, and other local government officials had failed to comply with state regulations requiring them to publish in the newspapers facts concerning the financing and operation of their offices.

The mandatory publications act provided that "all public officers of the state, counties, cities and school districts who are required by law to publish legal notices or financial statements and who shall fail, refuse, or neglect to make such publications shall be guilty of malfeasance of office and subject to forfeiture of salary for the month in which such failure occurs. Such officers shall be subject to removal from office upon wilful continuance of such neglect of duty.'

The act also provided that "suits to enjoin or recover pay-ment of salary and for removal from office under law shall be instituted in the proper district court by the county or district attorney of the county in which the offending officer
