Upper Salt Fork Dam North of Memphis CONSTRUCTION WOULD BE FINANCED BY REVENUE FROM WATER USERS

A proposed dam on the Upper Salt Fork of Red River, a project on which a group of area residents have been working for about three years, should be located about 18 miles north of Memphis, according to the engineer's report which Work of installing a 6-inch watel was received here Friday by local officials of the work.

Plans call for water, impounded by the dam, to be used showers but moisture appeared to Seventh Street between Robert- by municipalities in this area. In addition, water would be provided for irrigation purposes and the dam also would serve as a flood control measure, Clifford Farmer, of Memphis, Hall County chairman of the project, said. The lake, itself, would serve as the nucleus of a recreation site.

PRICE SUPPORTS — YES OR NO?

Considerable discussion is going on at the present time among cattlemen concerning price supports.

Support prices and crop controls have been touchy subjects with many Americans ever since their inception in the drouthy Thirties during the first term of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

This stems from the fact that the average American is a die-hard independent who dislikes for anyone, whether it be the government, a group or another individual, telling him what he can or cannot do.

But it certainly is true that if the government guarantees producers specified prices for what they raise, the government also is going to expect to exercise some control over how much they raise.

It would be financial suicide to do otherwise, because without controls or quotas, supplies of crops would pile up and the government would be forced to buy products for which there was no demand, in order to bolster the market.

Even with controls, the government has in numerous instances accumulated crop surpluses but no doubt the situation would have been worse with no controls at all.

Residents of this region probably are about as independent and resourceful as citizens anywhere in the United States, consequently dislike interference with their daily lives as much as any group you could name

But the livestock men at Dalhart apparently felt they had little choice but to vote for supports. In doing so, they strongly denounced the stands of the Texas and New Mexico associations.

The difference of opinions may have resulted from a number of reasons.

It may be that the decisions of the state organizations, because they were on a state-wide level, did not truly reflect the desperation and need of cattlemen in drouth areas, which cover portions of several states.

Where there has been rain, livestock raisers have been in better shape as far as feed and pastures are concerned than those who have felt the pinch of prolonged drouth.

The decisions also may have represented only the opinions and desires of larger cattlemen, whose financial positions may be stronger than smaller stockmen,, or who have other sources

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that of having to buy price-supported feeds for livestock, on which prices have slumped about 50 per cent in the past year.

Many livestock men are citing this as one reason for establishing a floor under cattle prices.

At the Dalhart session, cattlemen asked for federal price supports on livestock at the producer level and endorsed Sen. Robert Kerr's amendment to an emergency drouth-relief bill requiring that support prices on cattle be set at 90 per cent of parity.

In view of recurring drouths which strike this section it seems that some sort of permanent government program for aiding farmers and ranchere at such times, is a sensible and humane proposal.

We remember very vividly the starvation prices, the low wages, the millions of unemployed and the privation of the early Thirties.

There certainly wasn't much independence then.

If supports and controls will help prevent a recurrence of the heartaches and hopelessness of twenty years ago, let's have them.




