Loss in the fire here last month which destroyed four Memphis business houses and damaged two others, has been estimated at approximately \$560,000 by insurance adjusters, Chief of Police T.

Insurance, totaling nearly \$199,-00, has been paid to cover damage claims on buildings and contents, Weatherby said. He explained that this represents payment for all claims against insurance firms. Estimated insurable value of

Farmers With No Cotton On Land Plant Grain And Sweet Sorghums Crops which survived heat, drouth, wind, sand and hail

earlier this summer, have made an amazing comeback in the period since good rains soaked most points in this area last Sunday a week ago.

Pastures, which appeared to be dead, have almost miraculously sprung to life, as grasses have virtually leaped up, some say "three inches" since rains began.

Some points, notably Lakeview, Plaska and Brice, had additional moisture last Thursday afternoon. On the other hand, there were points which missed most of the precipitation. These included the Baylor community, south of Estelline, Deep Lake and Lesley.

EMERGENCY FEED FUMBLING

After considerable initial confusion and delay, the emergency feed program finally may be on the threshold of fulfilling its ostensible purpose-helping drouth-ridden stockmen hold on to their foundation herds.

The program was snarled for a time, when the Department of Agriculture, through Secretary Benson, sent out a directive, requiring applicants for feed to swear that they had less than a 30-day supply of feed and that they were financially unable to purchase feed in the open market.

This at a time when a wide region, whose economic life is based primarily on agriculture, was facing disaster because of prolonged drouth.

If the condition had resulted from fire, flood, tornado or other more commonly known types of disaster, the government no doubt would have sent aid without quibble or question.

But because drouth apparently is less spectacular and its effects not so immediately noticeable, strings were attached to the government program.

Stockmen all the drouth region promptly "went up in the air.

Why should they as respected, tax-paying citizens, be forced to swear to something, which amounted to a 'Pauper's oath," in order to obtain feed for their hungry cattle?

Why should they be compelled to suffer this indignity because they were mainly victims of a situation (extended drouth) over which they had no control?

If they did not get feed and had to dispose of their live- to their necks in hot water in no stock, they knew it would likely take them years longer to resume their cattle operations on a paying basis. This, in turn would have been reflected in the economy of the region. Cattlemen probably were puzzled-and angry, too-to

be treated in such a way by their government.

They began firing bitter protests into Washington. The upshot was that last week Secretary Benson an-


nounced that his department does not "contemplate giving (an) oath of any kind or even requiring any financial statement to obtain feed under (the) drouth relief program."

Acquiring title to a modern family-size unit requires a sizable chunk of capital, and this, says C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is not al ways easy to get. But, he adds families with determination usual. ly find a way to turn the trick.

This financial assistance is ob tained from many sources and the specialist cites information obtained from a recently made study in Virginia on where this helt comes from. In a majority of cases in that state, financial aid was provided young farmers by their arents or families. Some of the help was in the form of inheritan ce, family financing or the privi lege of working on the home farm The family help factor in the main was in the form of an assist for acquiring more land when the start was made on a small scale

A big factor in becoming an owner, independent of family help, was non-farm employmen. during prosperous times, say Bates. Farmers worked in industries and saved enough to make the down payment on their chosen farm. 


