Citizens Urged By Mayor To Sign Up **Before That Date**

Bryan & Hoffman Construction Company of Plainview have called a temporary halt to their paving operations here but are scheduled to return here around Oct. 1 to complete all paving for which contracts have been signed by the first of next month, Mayor Carl Harrison said this week.

Mayor Harrison urged everyone who wishes to participate in the program to make needed arrangements by Oct. 1, as he said the onstruction company has set that late as the absolute deadline for ompleting contracts.

So far, South Seventh Street between Noel and Mendon streets, has been signed up solidly, the Mayor said. Present plans also call for paving Tenth to Ninth streets on Cleveland, Ninth Street to Davis Street, and Davis Street between Ninth and Eighth streets. At their regular meeting the council members voted to pave North Tenth Street. This street carries a great deal of throughtown traffic and residents along long time about dust which pass ing vehicles whip up. According to council plans, the street will be with two coats of blacktopping.

Also planned is the widening of Noel Street from Tenth to Sixtenth streets. The six-block strip is expected to be 53-feet wide when finished.

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DROUTH PROGRAM ENDS—MAYBE

A good many Panhandle farmers and ranchers probably are finding it difficult to understand the ruling by the State Drouth Disaster Committee last week, removing the entire region from the "drouth disaster" classification.

Condittions in irrigated sections of the Panhandle may have improved enough recently to justify such action, although "we are not in a position to know. However, reports of good crops and brighter pasture conditions have been circulating. But in dryland areas, conditions certainly are no better,

and likely are worse, than they were when they were included in the drouth disaster program earlier this summer. Crop prospects have deteriorated fast in the past three weeks, and pastures are as dry and dead as they have ever been.

Even in sections where cotton was relatively good, insects have craused heavy damage in many fields. So it's no wonder if residents of these dry areas are puz-

zled-even aroused-by this precipitate step of the drouth disaster committee.

Speaking at a meeting of Panhandle farmers and ranchers at Amarillo, Lyons declared the counties were removed from the eligible list because the Commodity Credit Corporation was running short of cottonseed meal, cake, corn and oats. He went on to say that money, tabbed for the program, has been seriously depleted.

He explained that drouth relief eligibility was "suspended temporarily pending revaluation of the feed the CCC has on hand.

A check of available feed supplies may have been necessary but we are unable to understand why part of the counties, eligible for aid, had to be eliminated in order to do this.

As a matter of fact , we believe the state PMA committee es and go up in the same manner the free world. exhibited undue haste, even questionable judgement, in taking this action.

But now that it is done, committeemen, the CCC, or whoever has the authority, should make a survey of present crop and pasture conditions as quickly as possible, so that farmers and ranchers who have not had sufficient rain, may receive the







Mix together hamburger, I egg, slightly beaten, 1/2 cup cracker crumbs, 1/2 cup drained horseradish, 1/2 cup IGA Catsup, I tup, celery salt, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. 
