# **Evaporation Tests To Show Amount Of Water Loss**

City Councilmen Tuesday night voted to bring payments to the Timmons Construction Company of Amarillo up to 90 per cent of the contract price which the firm is to receive for building the municipal swimming pool here. The pool was recently completed and opened temporarily so that check of its operations could be made.

The Amarillo company awarded the contract last spring after agreeing to construct the pool for \$51,888.00.

Prior to Tuesday night's Council session, the firm had received \$44,444.74, according to figures furnished by City Secretary D. L. Kinard. The Tuesday night step will permit payment of another \$2,254.46 to the Timmons company, or a total so far of \$46,-699.20. This leaves \$5,188.80 to be paid to complete the contract between the City of Memphis and the construction firm.

# **Attorney General Releases List Of** September Rulings

Austin-Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has released a list of all opinions of his office dur-ing the month of September. The office received 196 requests for advice or opinions and closed 194 opinion files during the month.

The office has won 97 per cent of all cases tried or appealed since the first of the year. A total of 959 cases have been won out of 988 tried. During the month of September 41 cases were tried, none of which were lost.

A veteran is not entitled to register in Texas schools as a "resident" simply because he was stationtd in Texas for one year. However, we should resolve that from now on we will do all we can to hold fire losses to a minimum and to make it as certain as possible that there will be no human casualties.

In an official proclamation, President Eisenhower has arged all citizens to initiate a year-round campaign in their homes and communities against needless loss of life and property caused by fires.

In this state alone, fire deaths could be reduced by half if proper precautions were taken, according to Norris W. Parker, manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association.

Last year, 542 Texans died in fires. At least 350 of these were trapped in their homes. More than 150 of the victims were children.

Parker recommends a number of precautions which can improve this tragic situation.

Among them are the following: Every bedroom should have two means of exit; houses should be well ventilated at all times; children and elderly persons should never be left alone in the home; open heaters should be protected by screen guards; gasoline should in no instance ever be used as a fuel; kerosene should be stored outside in approved containers.

Some Texas family loses its home to fire every 65 minutes. Parker declares. By the end of this year, approximately 8,000 families will have watched their homes go up in smoke within the 12-month period, the association manager predicts.

Parker's figures are based on data the fire insurance trade association has compiled during the past 20 years.



their annual gross incomes by reducing such losses, he exp Fires last year destroyed this amount of farm buildings and crops and 1953 figures may be even higher unless something is done, Parker declared.

Across the nation, fires last year cost farmers a stupendous 133 million dollars, and 3,000 farm residents died, E. C. Martin, state agricultural leader for the Texas Extension Service, says. He adds that approximately 95 per cent of the fires were due to carelessness and neglect. This figure probably would apply to fires in towns and cities, as well.

Because farms usually are located some distance from organized fire protection, each family should make fire prevention a top project, Martin says.

Fire prevention facilities needed on farms include fire extinguishers, ladders, hose and plenty of water-under pressure if possible. Martin explains.

There is a saying among firemen that "a clean building seldom burns," meaning that the majority of fires start in trashpiles, rubbish or stored odds and ends which have accumulated.

Fire Prevention Week would be a good time to check on and eliminate fire hazards in homes and business establishments, following this up with periodic inspections.

Doing this might well forestall trouble-even heartbreak -in the future.







## **Building Declines In Non-Residential Field**

AUSTIN-Non-residential build ing permits in Texas during August were only 7 per cent higher than in July, when the lowest level of 1953 building activity so far was reached, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Most important changes bringing about the modest increase were increases in construction of factories and workshops (382 per cent), institutional buildings (1,-837 per cent) and educational buildings (82 per cent). Most significant change in the nonresidential building pattern was a 23 per cent drop in additions, alterations and repairs.





A locsely drawn property de-scription may have consequences Charter No. 6107 entirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate description is doubly important.

In addition, there are legal rules to substitute for some omissions in written leases. For example, the tenant who holds over beyond his term may automatically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is as important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts interpretation of the language used.

There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share bas is, care should be taken to definwhat expenses are to be paid by the parties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cover such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped, whether the tenant can cut timber, whether loss of a building by fire or other cause frees the tenant, or whether the landlord must accept a sub-tenant. One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreements can cause disputes between persons even though they are both honest and gener

Many of the possibilities that should be covered by a properly drawn lease will not occur to in experienced persons. The renting of land deserves a written contract and it is a contract too importan to be entrusted to anyone other than an expert.
