One dissenter to this picture of continued generally good times is Roger Babson, who reportedly was one of the few who warned against a major depression back in the Twenties, if people didn't change their ways of living. His stock shot up considerably after the crash of '29.

Babson, in his forecast for 1954, says he disagrees with the theory of most economist-that business will fall off no more than 10 per cent this year.

He feels that business will hold up to its 1953 average, at least through the first half of the year.

But he goes on to warn that if business does dip 10 per cent, it likely will not stop there. He is of the opinion that resulting business losses and decline in employment could start a chain reaction which would cut business another 10 to 30


