Tax Values Behind Market Price Of **Taxable Property**

"Adjusted tax rates have accardingly decreased throughout the entire state," Lynn F. Anderson, assistant director of the University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs, writes in the latest issue of Texas Municipalities, monthly journal of the League of

Farmer's Income In First Quarter Above 1953 Figure

AUSTIN-Texas farmers' cash come for the first quarter of 1954 was 4 per cent higher than the sameperiod last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Busiless Research reports.


Income from peanuts was up 109 per cent, sheep and lambs 106 orghum 46 per cent, cotton 16 per cent, and cattle and wool, both 14 per cent.

Wheat income dropped 40 per cent and cottonseed and mohair ncomes, each 39 per cent.

March crop prices averaged 3 per cent higher than February but prices for livestock and products dropped 3 per cent.

The Texas agricultural picture brightened during April as rains ranging from light to drenching fell over much of the state, the Bureau says. By late April, however, no general relief had alleviated the drouthy conditions resulting from the driest January-March quarter ever recorded in

Texas history. Rainfall particularly helped the North Texas wheat crop, labeled 'near disaster" only hours before rains set in, the researchers report. In the state's eastern, cen-



If anything written here should be of any benefit to any graduate or graduates in choosing their careers and making them more successful and pleasant, we will be amply repaid for having been the middleman.

There may be times when business heads or managers may have to use such employees. This was sometimes the case during and following World War II, when manpower was at a premium. But as soon as help is more plentiful, the lazy, leas productive employees will almost certainly be the first to go.

If young people want to get ahead, they should make it a practice to do the best work they can. In addition, they should, as far as possible, always save a portion of their incomes. This may be a sizable amount, or it may be only a few dollars a week or month. But if saving becomes a habit, the time will come when the totals will be surprisingly large.

In human relations lies a challenge to the young people of today to achieve an understanding and respect between the peoples of the world which may lay the foundation for the peace and cooperation that will be the crowning achievement and glory of Man.

High school graduates of 1954 can help make this dream a reality, if they have the faith, the vision and the courage to accept the challenge of today's uncertainties and the promise of tomorrow's possibilities and make the most of them




