

## About \$500 Worth **Of Diamond Rings Is Principal Loot**

Three Memphis business firms were broken into sometime Tuesday night, according to local officers.

Entered were the J. H. Morris & Company cotton firm, Branigam Jewelry Store, and J. C. Penney Company.

No suspects had been taken into custody this morning.

Only apparent loss was that sustained by the jewelry firm, according to Sheriff Bill Baten, one of the investigating officers. Elmost Branigan, owner, estimated his loss at approximately \$500, after making a check of his store, the sheriff said. All of the items taken were diamond rings, as far as Branigan could determine. Some of the rings were in sets while others were singles. Retail value of the jewelry ranged as high as \$112.50, Branigan told officers.

Two safes in the cotton com pany office were prowled but nothing seemed to have been taken.

Neither was anything apparently taken from the dry goods store, although the office was ransacked.

Constable Jack Peabody and City Policemen Ben Spear and Dutch Vallance made the arrests. Found in the car was a minute quantity of a pint of whiskey.


The couple was placed in county jail, after the man was charged with driving while intoxicated and the woman with drinking in a car.

feel that young people are too interested in their own activities to pay serious attention to the world in which they live?

We may be wrong but we feel that boys and girls of this generation probably are more aware of current events and their implications than any of their predecessors and that we older people are failing to avail ourselves of some able partners if we do not make a point of listening to what they have to say.

The Independence, Iowa, Chamber of Commerce decided to make a survey in the town's two high schools and the outcome was both revealing and disturbing.

The civic organization asked 160 juniors and seniors 24 questions. Among them were these: "Have you any suggestions on how to improve recreational and social facilities in Independence?" and "What is your opinion of our retail stores?" Extremely vital was the one which asked, "Do you plan to re main in Independence and make it your home?" since the answer to this largly determines whether any community shall go forward or backward.

The Independence students wanted more selection and variety in stores, new lighting and color schemes, new store fronts and fewer "pouncing" clerks. About 50 per cent wanted a store which specialized in teen-age clothes.

Seventy-three said they expected to leave their hometown after graduation, while 13 planned to stay and 11 were undecided. Chief reason for leaving was lack of job opportunities, a problem that harasses many smaller communities today.

It may be that many young people regret having to leave their hometowns but feel they have no other choice.

One of the girls questioned put it this way:

'Sure, we like Independence and want to remain loyal to the town, but when it doesn't offer us much in the way of a living, you can't expect us to stay here all our lives.

This situation is one of the most serious to be found in smaller towns today but there is a good chance it could be licked if adults and young people pooled their ideas and their efforts. Certainly, there is nothing to lose by following such a course while there is plenty to gain.
