## **Polio Vaccination Plans For County** Are Being Made

Plans are being made to conduct a polio vaccination campaign for the first and second grade students of the various Hall County schools, Miss Mary Foreman, county school superintendent said Tuesday. Miss Foreman released the information after conferring with Dr. J. A. Odom. county health officer, who will be in charge of the contemplated vaccination program.

Superintendents of the schools in Memphis, Estelline, Turkey and Lakeview have been contacted and they are sending letters to parents to inform them of the service and to ascertain if they desire their children to participate. The program will be conducted on a voluntary basis, minus any compulsion, Miss Foreman said.

The vaccinations are to be performed after evaluation of the 1954 field trial of the Salk Polionyelitis Vaccine is completed, probably early in April. Plans are to give the vaccinations by the end of the present school year.

Vaccine will be provided by the Texas State Department of Health, at no cost to those whose

Three doses of vaccine will be given each child, with the secinnoculation coming one week after the initial one, and the third, four weeks after the second

#### Partnership or Corporation

John Brown and Bill Smith de sire to operate a business together. Should this be done as partners or as a corporation? The answer to this problem involves many legal questions.

Perhaps the most important factor is that the business or per sonal acts of either John or Bill may be binding upon the partnership. The corporation, however, can act only through its officers and agents, and then only within the limitations granted by the articles of incorporation.

As members of a partnership both John and Bill are liable for all of the debts of the business. In the case they have business losses, the creditors of the partnership could take all of the assets of the partnership, and all of the personal assets of either John or Bill, or both (except a few exempt by law), in order to satisfy partnership debts.

On the other hand, if they form go only against the assets of the either John or Bill can lose is the when distributed. amount they have invested in the business. The creditors could not disadvantage of a partnership as either John or Bill.

The corporation is recognized as a taxable entity, so it pays a tax on the amount of its net income, after deducting the salaries of John and Bill and other expenses.

If over a period of years the earnings of the corporation exceed reasonable salaries for the two owners, these earnings will be distributed to John and Bill in the form of dividends. The funds with which the dividends are paid have already been subject to ta in the hands of the corporation

## **Texas Livestock** Face Quarantine, Senator Declares

AUSTIN-The Texas livestock industry stands in danger of being paralysed by a federal quatantine on cattle leaving the state, unless something is done to eradicate 30, of Childress, says.

A Window To The World

Guest editorial presented by the Rotary Club of Memphis in commemoration of the Golden Anniversary of Rotary.

February 23, 1955 is the Golden Anniversary of Rotary. Just 50 years ago four men met in a Chicago office. They came together at the suggestion of Paul Harris, a young lawyer, who felt that men of different trades and professions should become acquainted. At first, the new club met in rotation at the stores and offices of members. This practice, soon abandoned in favor of regular meetings and the same hotel or restaurant, explains the name-"Rotary."

Very quickly, Rotary became international. With less than two score clubs in existence, one was formed in Winnepeg, Canada. The very next year saw the establishment of clubs in Dublin and Belfast, Ireland, and in London, England. Thereafter Rotary spread rapidly over the globe, through the Old Press Paragraphs-World to the Far East, from the tip of Latin America to the North Cape and to Australia.

Today, there are more than 8,400 Rotary Clubs in 89 countries and geographical regions throughout the world.
