Hall County First

Hall County agriculture again has stepped into the lead in another project to protect our valuable farm land.

The County Committee for the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation program realized early that this county was going to be in serious trouble again from wind erosion and that the farmers were going to need funds to help pay for the listing and chiseling that would be needed to keep this dirt from

These four men, R. A. Eddleman, chairman, Estelline, T. R. Fuston, Jr., vice-chairman, Turkey, Joe C. Montgomery, Memphis, and L. L. McKown, office manager, drew up a request for \$100.000 for control of wind erosion and submitted it on March 16. They were the first county in Texas to submit their request and Texas was the first state.

When the allocation of funds was made this week, this foresightedness paid off. Hall County was allowed \$104,300, while the surrounding counties, which were later in making their requests, each received only about one quarter the

amount allotted here. The committeemen and office manager are to be highly commended for their outstanding leadership in securing this much aid in controlling wind erosion. With the amount of land that needs control work done in this county, it would have been almost impossible for the farmers to pay for all the work themselves. Therefore, without this aid we would have suffered a heavy loss of top soil from wind erosion,

Education In Driving

Traffic accidents were down during 1954 - a few less than two million people were killed or injured during the 12 months. In 1953 more than two million persons were traffic casualties. This is a disgusting waste of life and property.

This waste-the worst in a wasteful country-becomes even more disgusting when one reads that three out of every four of these accidents happen in clear weather, on dry roads, and the cars were traveling straight ahead.

These statistics point out that the drivers are careless and unmindful of their driving responsibilities. Even though state, county and local authorities spend millions each year building safer roads, and patrolling highways and streets, the drivers still kill and injure themselves with bad driving.

Every year thousands of new drivers are added to our crowded highway. Who are they and where do they come from? They are children who reach the driving age each year, and they come from the high schools of the nation.

If these useless accidents are to be stopped, these new drivers must be educated to the responsibilities they assume when taking the wheel of a car. Who is going to do this educating? The drivers that have been killing each other with bad driving. That would be like the blind leading the blind.

A program of driver training has been introduced in many Texas high schools and proven successful with teen-age drivers. The officials have estimated that even with the present inadequate program, the course has cut accidents among the trained teen-agers by 50 per cent.

There is a bill in Austin now to set up a compulsory course of driver training in every Texas high school. This bill has been endorsed by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. They said. "We are for the driver education and are willing

to help pay for it. The cost of the proposed program would be 40 cents per person or one dollar per car in Texas. This amount could by saved by the reduction in the surcharge in Automobile insurance for drivers under 25 who have had an approved course in driver education, and many times over by the reduction of the \$150 million we have been spending in Texas every year for accidents.

Our public schools try to educate the youth of Texas to cope with the problems of our complex society. The automobile is a basic part of our fast moving life, and in all fairness to these children, we should teach them how to operate the car and live.

The best scholastic education in the world will not make a success of a youth if he is killed in an automobile accident because he wasn't properly taught his responsibilities as a

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





AUSTIN. - The Texas Senate last week gave final passage to a bill sponsored by Senator Andy Robert of Childress, that will prohibit the publishing and distribution of lewd, vulgar and depraved literature, moving pictures and penny arcade pictures in Texas.

Aimed at lewd and immoral material that has been rapped as a major contributing factor to problems of juvenile delinquency, the measure was introduced in the House by Rep. G. McIlhany of Wheeler. A second such measure by Rep. Pol of Dallas, dealing only with publication and distribution of comic books, was also passed by the Senate and sent to the House for further considera-

shot. At the meeting Monday, Miss Foreman said there were more than 300 children in the county schools who are eligible for the vaccine.

Any child who is unable to take the shots with his class, because of sickness or some other valid reason will be able to take is on and alternate date. However, should the parents fail to bring the child in until after the project is completed, they will have to pay the commercial cost of the

The vaccine will be available commercially in a very short time and the prescription cost will be about \$6 for the three shots, plus doctor's fees for giving the vac-

In field trials conducted last summer 4440,000 children in 44 states were given the shots and there were extremely infrequent reactions, and these in general of little significance.

The National Foundation spent 16 million dollars in conducting these field trials and tabulating the results. When the pharmaceutical companies that produced the vaccine for the tests were going to stop production, the Foundation decided to invest nine million more for vaccine, so if it were successful, there would be a supply on hand for use in fighting polio this season
