## **VA Changes Home** Loan Requirements

Veterans purchasing homes with the aid of GI Loans will be required to make a down payment of at least two percent, and the maximum time for repayment of oans will be set at 25 years, Robert W. Sisson, manager, of the VA regional office, Lubbock, announced.

Similarly moderate credite reuirements are being placed in effect by the Federal Housing Adinistration for homes purchased ith FHA insured mortgages.

Since April 23, 1953, the VA has had no mandatory down paynent requirement, and the mortgage repayment period could run as high as 30 years.

Todays action, Sisson said, was taken after a thorough study of national economic conditions, es pecially those prevailing in' the residential construction and mortrage financing fields. The new rejuirements are expected to help protect prospective GI oLan apolicants against increased prices of homes, overextention of credit and financial risks further, they should tend to stabilize the mortgage market by eliminating the 30 year no down payment loan which currently is being traded at widening discount margins.

hTe new requirements are not retroactive. They are not applicable to purchase of home for which VA has issued certificates of reasonable value prior to July 30, or in cases where requests for appraisals actually have been received in VA offices prior to July 30.
