Burial was in the Rowe Cemetery and funeral arrangements were under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home of Memphis.



Estimated tax receipts are \$95,-000 and other revenues are esti-mated at \$109,100, making a total of \$204,100 in revenue. The balance on Jan. 1, 1956, will be \$54,000. Net at the end of 1956 is expected to be \$38,440.

This coming year's budget is \$14,850 above the current year's budget of \$243,250.

Receipts by funds are estimated as follows: jury, \$9000; road and bridge, \$137,000; general, \$60,800; permanent improvement, \$21,100; and officers salary, \$29,-500. Out of the general fund \$20,000 has been allocated to the officers salary fund.

Though the plant, costing a to tal of something like six million dollars, will be located in Moore County, it will be claimed by Ama-. which, we may rest as sured, already is fast at work making provisions for construction families, good-will movies --- and those things which woo the consumer out of the fringe areas into that city's shopping centers.

Dumas and Moore County have as their only edge the fact that the plant will be in Moore County and that children of its employees will attend school here. Of course, Dumas is a little closer than Amarillo-but only a few minutes closer and hardly a strong arguing point.

Dumas can be made to benefit in several ways from the new pro ject. For one thing there will be hundreds of persons working from time to time on the construction chore, which will require something like a year to complete. When the job is done, the num ber of employees at the Exell plant will approximately double over its current roll.

If we are to receive benefits which could easily pour into Ama-, then we must be preparrillo . ed to offer whatever is necessary to attract new people to Dumas. All available housing should be played up to the newcomer. If ample room can't be found, there should be combined efforts made to create some sort of temporary housing. This problem will come with the building crew and not with those who eventually will live at the plant site as employees. We must meet, become acquainted with and make feel at home those who will be new to our area and community.

Once housed here and made a part of the community, the new residents, though they may be temporary, will return ample favor to their hosts. -Moore County News
