Scout Training Pays Off

County Ginnings Total 6,857 Bales

Hall County gins had turned o a total of 6,857 bales of cotton survey made Tuesday disclosed. The survey was made by William M. Cross of Clarendon, farm placement interviewer for the Texas Employment Commission. At the same time, Donley County gins had processed 1,474 bales.

A check of last year's ginning total for Hall County shows that about 20,000 bales had been ginned up to this point. However, the difference in totals is due, as everyone familiar with the situation knows, to the lateness of the 1955 crop. Prospects now indicate that this county may well produce about as much cotton as

it did last year. Cross said that ginners in the Turkey area estimated that about 50 per cent of the cotton was open, while in the remainder of the county, estimates ranged from 30 to 35 per cent. Cotton probably has opened later in the north central part of the county than elsewhere because of torrential rains (Continued on Page 12)

Frost Seen Here; First Of Season

First frost of the season was reported to have been seen Monday morning in lowlands in the Memphis area. Information gained in talks with a number of farmers is that it nipped vegetation in low areas but plants on higher ground apparently were not killed. Low here Monday morning was 31 degrees, according to John McMickin, weather observer.

This represented a sizeable change in weather conditions, as the maximum temperature the preceding Thursday was 92 degrees. Amarillo recorded a high of 89 degrees, the highest reading for that date ever re-

corded at the weather station. A cold front passed through the area Thursday night, holding temperatures the following day to a top of 76 degrees. A cold air mass moved into the area Sunday afternoon, preceding Monday morning's frost but temperatures had since warmed up, resulting in a high of 86 degrees Tuesday and 84 degrees Wednesday, McMickin said. However, colder weather was forecast for tonight (Thursday) and Friday.


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Good Public Relations Important



WHAT IS YOUR CREED?

Often I am asked, "What is your creed book called?" When I answer, "the New Testament," perplexity is evident upon the face of the honest inquirer. "But," says he, "What are your cardinal doctrines?" To this I reply that every single command set forth in the New Testament is essential. He then asks, "Do you mean you subscribe to no manual, discipline, creed book, or confession of faith?" To this my answer is in the affirmative. "How can this be possible?" wonders the propounder.

There are many creed books, manuals, confessions of faith, and disciplines bound upon men by religious organizations. The authors of these books declare them to 'help explain the New Testament.' This of itself teaches those who wrote these various creed books believe not the Bible when it declares we are 'throughly furnished' by the inspired word. (II Tim. 3:16-17) If God gave us a book, does it need a fallible man to make it plain to us? Surely not.

Most subscribers to human creeds declare that the creed they follow teaches the same thing as the New Testament. When thoroughly questioned they must relent, for:

IF A BOOK CONTAINS EXACTLY WHAT THE NEW TESTAMENT TEACHES, ADDING NOTHING AND SUBTRACTING NOTHING, IT COULD BE ONLY ONE BOOK, THE NEW TESTAMENT, If a creed book contains more than the Nest Testament the person who adheres to it transgresses the teaching of God (II Jno. 9; Rev. 22:18). If a creed book contains less than that commanded in the New Testament the person who subscribes to it transgresses God's law (Rev. 22:19). If it contains only what the New Testament teaches, it must be the NEW TESTAMENT.

Creed books, disciplines, manuals, confessions of faith tend to divide followers into sects, schisms, denominations. Division is sinful: (Jno. 17:20-21: I Cor. 1:10-13: I Cor. 12:12; Eph. 4:1-6). One group will never subscribe to anothers manual-But every fellowship can unite on the plain teaching of the New Testament.

Let us lay aside all human creeds and unite on the commands given by inspiration of God, those of the Bible.

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



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
