#### Area Has Duster, Thunderstorm

Weather in this area the past week included a bad duststorm and a thunderstorm. Temperatures generally were mild to hot.

The thunderstorm moved in from the south just before daybreak Monday, but failed to reach Memphis. Frequent lightning and thunder accompanied it. S. E. Winkler, who lives about four miles southeast of Estelline on the Tell highway, said .20 of an inch of moisture fell at his place, accompanied by some hail. He stated that the shower seemed to play out about halfway betweeen Newlin and Salisbury.

Monday morning was good but strong winds started blowing that afternoon, bringing the duststorm which continued into the night. In contrast, Tuesday was a beautiful day.

According to John McMickin, local weather observer, the mercury covered the following ranges this past week: Last Thursday 40-67 degrees; Friday 36-87; Saturday 39-90; Sunday 65-91; Monday 57-88; Tuesday 57-80; and Wednesday 40-71. This morning's low was 37 degrees.



COLLEGE STATION - Almost 800 million pounds of this rountry's food surplus was donated to school ch'ldren-and needy persons in the country and abroad buring the last half of 1955, re-Agriculture.

In this country, surplus food went to about 11 million school Mildren, about a quarter million ersons in charitable institutions, 100,000 Indians, and about two and a quarter million persons in needy families. Altogether, food distributed to these groups totaled nearly 300 milion pounds.

Foods were also distributed to hangry people in 70 foreign counmes around the free world. Eighnon-governmental United Rates Welfare agencies took part in this disposal, distributing almost million pounds of food during the latter half of 1955.

New Cotton Seed Insecticide

A new insecticide, which if applied to cotton seeds produce plants that kill early season insects, has been accepted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and is now being produced commercially.

This new insecticide with "built-in" protection—Thimet, developed by American Cyanamid Company—is applied to the seed before planting. It is systemic—a chemical that finds its way into the growing plant and is carried in the sap stream in large enough quantities to kill insects feeding on the plant. This is the first systemic insecticide applied to seeds which has satisfactorily controlled insects on the growing plants. the growing plants.

In addition to replacing early-season spraying or dusting, Thimet eliminates uncertainties about proper timing in applying insecticides. Commercial distribution to seed treaters is now confined to Texas and Mississippi, but will be extended to other cotton-growing areas in the United States and abroad in time for next year's planting. Widespread field demonstrations of the new insecticide will be held under the direction of local county agricultural agents in southern cotton areas. Tests will also be continued on Thimet treatment using both seed and direct spray methods. Promising results have been achieved with corn, peas, beans, lettuce, peanuts, potatoes, tra-fruits and tobacco seedlings.



#### **Teacher Shortage** Seen as Worsening In Coming Year

LUBBOCK-The critical teacher shortage in West Texas may become even worse in the coming year, Mrs. Jean A. Jenkins, Texas Tech Placement Service, has

All areas of public school teach ing are expected to have more openings this year than can be filled by students graduating from Tech, Mrs. Jenkins said. Severest shortage will probably be in elementary education, mathematics and science, she added.

A report on 1954-55 activities of the Tech Placement Service shows how critical the teacher shortage already is.

A total of 345 school superintendents listed teaching vacancies with the Placement Service between September, 1954, and last August, the report states.

There were 384 vacancies elementary education, with 43 Tech graduates available; and 105 vacancies in science, with 6 graduates available.

One reason for the shortage of teachers in mathematics and science is industry's demand for people trained in those fields, Mrs. Jenkins pointed out...

A difficulty in filling the elementary school positions is that many of the Tech garduates in education are married and unable to go where jobs are, she added.

Requests for teachers were reported from New Mexico, Arizona, Mississippi, Kansas, California, Oklahoma, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Nevada, as well as Texas.
