You know where you are. At first this requires that attention be given to directions and distances, but after a time it becomes automatic.


Actually, this rule may be translated: Use common sense This involves always taking the precaution to keep yourself ori-ented, which means that you are sure of your directions at all times. It also involves remembering how far you have gone in a certain direction.

Keeping oriented is easy in clear weather-being able to see the sky, the sun, moon and stars will tell you the points of the compass. But a compass is es sential on a cloudy day or night, when there are no recognizable landmarks. COLLEGE STATION-Savings of 10 percent of more in fuel bills can be made by most farm tractor operators if they give attention to proper fuel storage and fuel system adjustments, says W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural ingineer.

Evaporation during the hot sumner months takes a toll of fuel in storage. Partially filled tanks exoosed to the sun may lose three to four percent of their contents within a month. Shaded tanks lose one percent or less. Over a period of three months unshaded tanks may lose up to 15 percent but those in the shade only 6 percent. Painting storage tanks with aluminum or white paint will aid a cutting evaporation losses, says the engineer, because the light olors reflect the sunlight. Too. he adds, a small storage tank fill d every two weeks will cut the storage period and the losses from evaporation which climb with long torage.

The farm tractor which is serviced regularly and kept in ton operating condition is also the nost economical to operate from he standpoint of fuel consump on, says Ulich. He recommends a daily check of the air cleaner all hose and fuel line connection and carburator. Most of this hecking can be done at a glance
