 The Committee fo Economic Development this week called for programs to get many people and much land out of farm-ing as a means of eliminating crop surpluses and improving
agricultural income. The Committee, which describes itself as agricultural income. The committee, which describes itself as
of 150 busit, non partisan and non political group, is made up of 150 businessmen and educators.
This all may sound good to those people on the comittec in their mahogany-lined offices, but what would they say ir we
began advocating the lowering of tarifs in order for some of
them to compete with foreign manufacturers. They would chem to compete with foreign manufacturers. They would
cream so loud that it could be heard round the world if they were going to have to compete against Japanese or Germa
labor. Yet they try to put the same shoe on the farmer's foo and expect it to fit
thousands of acres of desert to irrigation a couple of years ago Of course not, some of them probably had money invested in the projects and wanted to make their profits when the cool
clear water flowed in, at the taxpayers expense. It has been predicted that some of the land will actually cost about $\$ 2.000$ per acre when the entire expense of the dams and canals is duce the number of farms and farmers to reduce the produc
tion. Why not start with the land that was put into use las and let those of us who have been depending on agriculture
for 50 years continue to follow our way of life? The committee would seek to eliminate surplus farm pro-
duction by ending price supports, except in periods of fin duction by ending price supports, except in periods of financial
emergency, and by encouraging the retirement of whole farms emergency, and by encouraging the retirement of whole farms
from production. We do not like government restrictions on
farmers either, but what does the committee want? Do they believe American farmers should be made to compete with
Mexican peons, for example. That is exactly what they are ad hey ever say. "Lower the tariffs and let us compete on the world market with our manufactured goods." Not in a hundred years. What they are really saying is "Let us buy farm pro-
ducts cheap and then continue to get the high price for our manufactured goods. This way we can make a larger amount
of profit and who cares about a few million individual farmers anyway." What is fair for Jim should be fair for John.
