Now is the time to mow weeds

in the Hall County Soil Conservation District on land that was planted to native grasses and on rangeland says Charley B. Cape of the Soil Conservation Service.

It takes 90 to 118 gallons of water to produce one pound of ragweed or sunflower, in comparison to 60 to 80 gallons of water to produce one pound of grass. Now is the time for you to decide which type of vegetation that you are going to produce in your farm or ranch. Three of the best ways to control weeds are chemical spraying, mowing, and do not overgraze pasture.

Due to the state laws on chemicals the best way now to control weeds is by controlled grazing or mowing. Cut the pasture in two by fencing and give one part a rest while you are grazing the other part and use some cultivated land
