

Efforts are be ing made by many universities and groups in this country to the United Nations with a vote afford educational opportunitie to these peoples from these new nations of the world. 



Tax Delinquency Also a Problem

One of the big problems facing any taxing unit, whether it be a school district, a city, or county, is the problem of delinquent taxes.

Each year, without exception, there are those who fail to pay their taxes. The reason for this failure, is many times attributed to lack of funds, during a lean year.

It was reported by tax assessor-collectors here that in the past two years, many due back taxes have been collected, and the delinquency list has been reduced to about two and one-half per cent.

Considering the fact that many counties have a delinquency figure of five, six and seven per cent, Hall County tax officers are not facing such a critical problem. However, two and five-tenths per cent still amounts to near \$3,000 for the county, and a lesser amount for the city and school.

Considering the figures that only 10 per cent of the delinquencies are redeemed within the year, this means that each year \$2,700 is not collected.

Taxes are broken down into personal property taxes and real property taxes. Delinquent real property taxes are never written off the tax role. As in the past, tax suits can be brought against owners for delinquent taxes.

However, personal property taxes are carried for a few years and then dropped from the tax role if they are delinquent. It is the duty of all citizens to render and pay personal property taxes, and it is to real property owners an advantage to keep their property clear of delinquent taxes. No real property can be sold unless the taxes on that property have been


