



EDITORIAL

The John Birch Society

Many newspapers in this nation, and especially in the state and Panhandle have been acquainting their readers with The John Birch Society, covering its beliefs, its aims, and its desires for this nation.

What is the John Birch Society? It is, according to its founder and absolute ruler, a wealthy New England manufacturer named Robert H. W. Welch, "an arch enemy of international Communism and our only hope of defeating Communist domination of the United States." Its avowed goals. as set forth by its leader, are to achieve "less government, more individual responsibility, and a better world.

That's a program which most of the Americans can agree with wholeheartedly. However, the way the society plans to achieve these "worthy" goals would make the average patriotic American take up arms. He proposes, in essence, to establish an American dictatorship with Robert H. W. Welch as its head

His promise is simple: The Communists, he declares, are already two-thirds of the way along in their master plan for world domination. They have, Welch declares, already taken control of the government of the United States. This being true, the only thing left for patriotic Americans to do is to become subversive, go underground, and undermine the government. Welch asks unquestioning obedience and absolute loyalty for himself of his followers.

He sees nothing wrong with dictatorship. He admires dictators. He wastes no admiration on democracies, however. "Democracy," says the leader of the John Birch Society, "is merely a descriptive phrase, a weapon of demagoguery, and a perennial fraud.

Winter Weeds Can Be Controlled In Home Lawns

Winter weeds in any lawn can be eliminated with chemicals, according to George McBee, extension pasture specialist.

The chemicals should be applied when the weeds are growing and before seed are formed. To control upright or semiprostrate ennual weeds such as burclover, henbit and rescue grass, McBee says the chemicals should be applied when the plants are no more than three inches tall. If they are above this height, he advises a close mowing and then waiting for three or four days of regrowth before making the application.

Low-growing plants such as carpet burweed should be treated when the plants are young and before they bloom. Thorough coverage of the leaves and stems with the chemical is a must for all weed control.

McBee says the most commonly used chemicals are 2,4-4 and endothal. Disodium methylarsonate and amine methylarsonate can be used for spot treatment. Naptha and ammonium nitrate are other chemicals often used. Lawn grasses will be killed by naptha but spots should cover over in a few

The specialist warns that care should be exercised when using any chemical and that the manufacturer's recommendations must be followed clasely. He suggests that interested persons may obtain a copy of L-425, "Chemical Weed Control in Lawns from the county agent. Each of the recommended chemicals along with spot or spray treatment solutions discussed. The leaflet also con tains other suggestions for lawn Play It Safe care and maintenance.
