Council Postpones Decision On Court's Hospital Offer

Plans Complete For Hall County Picnic

"All plans for the Hall County Picnic which will be held Sunday, Sept. 17, are now complete," J. M. Ferrel, Jr., president of the organization, said today.

The food committee met Monday and worked out last-minute details for preparing and serving the meal. The menu will include barbecued beef, pinto beans, onions, peaches, pickles, bread and drinks. Although no plans have been made for desserts, all those who desire are asked to bring

cakes, pies, cookies or salads.

Four beeves, furnished by Mrs. Bray Cook, Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Monzingo, Mrs. W. C. Dickey and the First National Bank, will be barbecued for the occasion by Pete Land and Flip Breedlove. Assisting with the barbecuing will be members of the Memphis Fire Department with Loyd Ward, Ed Hutcherson and Pat Britain serving as chairmen.

Planned along with the picnic is homecoming at the various churches in the city. Families can attend services, and go directly to the City Park for the free barbecue meal and an afternoon of visiting with old-time friends.

An added convenience has been planned this year for the visitors. Buses will be run at 30-minute intervals from the city square to the park. This is planned for the visitors' convenience as well as to eliminate crowded parking conditions. Visitors may park their cars on the city square and ride a bus to the park.

An impromptu program and business session will be held during the afternoon, the president said.

"We are making plans for an even bigger crowd than attended the 70th anniversary celebration last year, President Ferrel said.

All former Hall County residents and all local citizens are invited to attend. The picnic is for everyone, the president said.

The Memphis City Council Tuesday night turned down the Hall County Commissioners Court offer to lease the County Hospital facilities, at this time.

In an order passed unanimously, the Council stated, "The City Council expresses their appreciation to the Commissioners Court, but at this particular time we are not in position to negotiate for a lease contract and when the Hospital is completed consideration of lease negotiations will be taken under consideration."

The Council passed the order following a 10-minute discussion. Also brought before the Council Tuesday night was the possible establishment of a combination community building and municipal building, drawn on the plans of the present site of Memphis Lumber Company.

The plans, submitted by Tony Craig, president of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce and Hall County Board of Development, contained 28,000 square feet of floor space. The proposed building would house new facilities for a fire station, jail, City Council room, offices, living quarters, auditorium with seating capacity of 2,000, joined onto by another room with kitchen facilities where clubs could hold meetings, Chamber of Commerce office, Boy Scout den, closets, rest rooms, and several other miscellaneous facilities.

The Chamber president stated that he has been unable so far to come to any figures on the project, but he wanted to appear before the Council to get the aldermen's ideas concerning the feasibility of the project. The project, as it was introduced, contained facilities of a parking lot which (Continued on Page Twelve)

Services To Be Held Today For Bill Luttrell

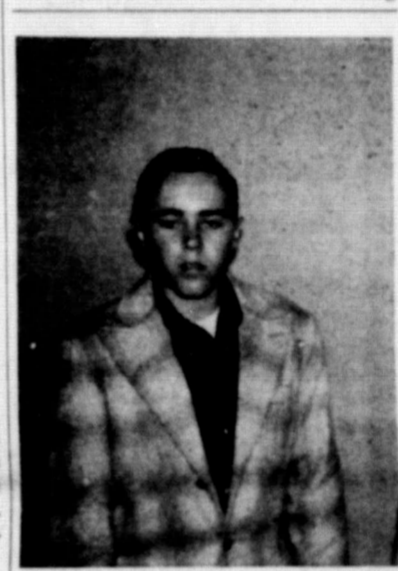

School Enrollment Here Shows Increase

A total of 846 students have enrolled in the four Memphis schools, W. C. Davis, superintendent, announced today. This shows an increase of 113 students over last year's enrollment of 733.

A breakdown for the four schools included: Austin Elementary, 181 students; Travis Elementary, 242 students; Memphis High School, 272 students; and Morningside School, 151 students.

Forty-one teachers are employed in the four schools. There are 31 teachers in the high school and two elementary schools, and 10 teachers in the Morningside School.

A number of new courses have been added this year to give each

student a well-rounded curriculum, Mr. Davis said.

Three full Spanish classes have been added with Mrs. Hubert Dennis as instructor.

Ben Davis is teaching a full class in auto mechanics.

Mrs. Ben Wilson, Jr., has been employed as home economics teacher, and full courses are offered in this field.

In the mathematics department courses in solid geometry and trigonometry have been added. Clifford Bradshaw has been employed as instructor.

At the Morningside School, 25 boys are working out for football and a team will be featured this year. Coaches are George Berry and Assistant Mac Neal.

Cyclone, Bear Cubs To Tangle Here Fri. Night

Area football fans will have a chance to see two of the county's teams in action Friday night at 8 p. m. when the Memphis Cyclone and the Estelline Bear Cubs meet.

The Cyclone has been picked as a favorite in the clash; however, the game will be the third such encounter in three years, with each team having a win and a loss to their credit. The Bear Cubs defeated the Cyclone one touchdown in 1959. The Cyclone downed the Bear Cubs by one TD in 1960.

Estelline Coach Jimmy Adams stated Tuesday that his squad received several injuries in last week's encounter with Price College, which they lost 44-12. The coach said that his team will be coming to Memphis Friday night to give the game all they've got.

The boys were in good spirits, he added.

On the Estelline injured list are QB Jesse Corona who has a bruised left hip, End Tony Stephens who has a leg injury, and Darrell Collins, right guard, who has an injured shoulder.

Probable starters for Estelline include: Corona, QB; Billy Ferrel, FB; Maurice Hood, left tackle; Billy Bowman, right tackle; Jimmie Thomas, left guard; Tony Stephens or Larry Moore, right end; Darrell Collins or Rusty Wood, right guard; Bruce Richardson, center; Freddie Futch, right half, and Frankie Longbine, left half.

Coach Adams said his line averages 155 pounds and the backfield 150.

Coach Don Lambert of the Memphis Cyclone had a note of optimism in his voice this week when he said his team was in bet-

ter condition than they were the first day of workout as far as injuries were concerned. He said the boys were showing good hustle this week. He attributes part of the increased spirit to the appearance of Bunky Adcock in uniform, and part to the cool weather.

The probable starting lineup for the Cyclone will be: Dwight Gailey, LE; Jacky Bridges, RE; Rex Grisham, LT; Dale Sexton, RT; Don Gailey, LG; Dee Miller, RG; Ronald Ables, C; Bunky Adcock, QB; Bill J. Commissioners Hear Hospital Reports Sat.

County Attorney Sim Goodall submitted a report of his and Attorney Paul Spillman's trip to Austin and their meeting with Mr. Nuhm, director of Hospital Service, State Dept. of Health, Austin, to the Hall County Commissioners at a called meeting Saturday.

The text of the report follows: "Mr. Nuhm advised that our application was in good shape and that we were at the top of the

priority. He did say we would need to provide the following: 1. Schematic drawings, 2. outline specifications, 3. tentative cost estimates including, a. cost of construction, b. architect's fees, c. soil testing and equipment cost; and general narrative description of the facility.

"These items will all need to be prepared and furnished by Mr. Roberts, your architect prior to the meeting of the Board on Sept. 10.

"Mr. Nuhm further advised that Hill-Burton funds would not meet the cost of land or initial office supplies or other expendable items.

"Mr. Nuhm stated they had built over 200 hospitals in recent years and from this experience suggested that:

"1. You hold out \$1,000 per bed for an operating fund to take care of initial purchases of supplies and with which to operate (Continued On Page Twelve)

Report From Washington

Trade With Cuba

Last week I discussed pending investigations of trade policies concerning Red bloc countries in Europe. This week I want to discuss some problems that are very close to our shores and which I feel should be made known to the American people.

On January 3, 1961 this government severed diplomatic relations with the Castro regime in Cuba. For years the Cuban economy had been measurably subsidized because of an agreement under which this country was buying approximately 30 per cent of our domestic sugar needs. This purchase amounted to approximately three million tons of sugar per year from Cuba. At a price of \$100 per ton, this would mean that this country was spending over \$300 million a year for Cuban sugar. This Cuban sugar quota al-

location had been withdrawn on July 6, 1960. This constituted a partial economic embargo. Subsequently, restrictions on exports to Cuba were laid down which prevented the shipment to Cuba of any goods unless classified as foodstuffs or medical supplies. However, between October, when these restrictions were invoked, and January 1, 1961 it appears that the United States imported from Cuba \$7.5 million worth of tobacco and manufactured tobacco products; \$5.3 million worth of foodstuffs such as lobsters, fruits, vegetables, and so forth; and \$2.2 million worth of metals. This means that although exports to Cuba other than foodstuffs and medical supplies were prohibited, imports from Cuba were not prohibited. The result was that Castro was obtaining American dollars with which he could purchase

any American goods he wanted to buy from other countries.

Between January and April 1, 1961 the United States imported \$3.8 million worth of foodstuffs, \$6.7 million worth of tobacco, \$2.2 million worth of metals and manufactured metal products, and so forth. In other words, Castro has continued to get American dollars.

The record shows that between July 1, 1961 and August 1, 1961 the United States imported from Cuba goods in the amount of \$4,142,768. We exported to Cuba goods under the restrictions above referred to in the amount of \$338,791. Hence, you can see that our present policy, outside of the sugar embargo, is not hurting Castro in the least. In fact, he may not be hurting because of the sugar embargo, for the following reason: it will be remembered that the three million tons of sugar taken away from Cuba was reallocated to other foreign countries. A substantial amount went to British Guiana and the Federation of West Indies, which is also in the news because of the recent election of a man alleged to be an extreme left winger. Other portions went to other Central and South American countries, many of whom are doing business with Castro. How are we to know that the sugar imported into this country to replace that formerly acquired from Cuba is not in fact Cuban sugar transhipped through the other countries?

The Congress is presently considering legislation which would prohibit the shipment in interstate commerce of any goods, wares, or merchandise imported from Cuba. It has been argued that the most effective action that could be taken would be a simple bar of any imports into this country from Cuba. This could be done by specific legislation, or it could be done by this government invoking the provisions of the Trading With the Enemy Act. Many feel that the elimination only of the shipment in interstate commerce of goods imported from Cuba might open the door for illicit trafficking in these goods. In other words, they argue that if the goods are allowed to be imported into the United States efforts will be made to move them across state lines, either legally or illegally, by conningling or otherwise. They argue that if the importation of these goods into the United States in the first instance is positively and effectively prohibited, the desired result as against the Castro regime will be achieved without the danger above mentioned. The matter is being studied by a Committee of which I am a member at the present time, and you can rest assured that if I have my way there will be no doubt but that the goods cannot be imported into the United States in the first instance; that any importation of the goods into the United States will be in violation of the law; and that if any of the goods do come into the United States illegally, then any transportation of them within a State or across State lines will be in violation of the law.

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Hornets Sting Cyclone in First Game, 28-14

Memphis Cyclone lost a football game to the Tulia on Friday night, 28-14, at Tulia stadium before a good crowd of spectators from both teams.

The game was wide open, with Memphis scoring twice on punt returns and twice on passes, while Tulia scored the first time on a 60-yard drive series, and the second time on the next series following a 62-yard drive series.

Halfback Doug Peters in the first quarter scored a 15-yard punt return for the Cyclone's first touchdown. Quarterback Perry Wright scored a 15-yard pass to the Cyclone's first touchdown. End David Cole, climaxed a 65-yard drive series late in the second quarter.

Half-time score was Tulia 8, Memphis 8.

HB Gary Don Haight scored early in the third period, on a punt return 62 yards to the goal line. Then, early in the fourth quarter of play, HB Wright caught a deflected 40-yard punt to rack up the fourth and TD for the Hornets.

The scoring plays of the Cyclone were beautifully executed. Quarterback option plays, HB Eddie Jones and HB Peters throwing key blocks. Center Ables threw a block that QB Wright loose for the

Caraway returned the kick to the Tulia 32-yard line. On the third down from scrimmage, after two plays netted four yards, HB Bales broke loose on a reverse and scampered 38 yards to the Cyclone 26 before being pulled to the ground by Defensive Back Perry Wright. Two more plays netted the Hornets 12 more yards and a first down on the Cyclone 14. On a third and five, a Tulia back fumbled and a Memphis lineman recovered, giving the Cyclone the ball on their four-yard line.

Memphis drew a penalty on the first play from scrimmage, which nullified a 20-yard pass gain. Two carries by FB Eddie Jones netted seven yards, and two more runs by HB Bill J. Pounds added 5 more to give the Cyclone a first on their 24. The team drew a 15-yard penalty to put them back in a hole, and Pounds punted the ball 40 yards on the fourth down.

HB Bales for Tulia ran the ball all the way back to make the score 6-0. HB Bales and HB Haight crossed near midfield, and Bales kept the ball, going on to score. The extra point try was no good.

Frank Hooper kicked off for the Hornets, and Wright ran the ball back to the Memphis 20. On the first play, Eddie Jones broke through for a 19-yard gain to the Memphis 39. Carries by Peters, Jones and Wright netted 16 yards for a first down to the Tulia 45. HB Pounds picked up 13 yards to the Tulia 32. Jones made six more on a line plunge, and then Tulia was penalized 15 yards.

With a first and 10 on the Tulia 11 in the closing seconds of the first quarter, Pounds car-

ried for 4 yards to the 7 and Peters carried to the 5.

Second Quarter of Play

On the first play of the second period Peters carried for no yards and the Cyclone was faced with a fourth and 4 situation. QB Wright called a quarterback keeper and behind fine blocking plunged over to score. Jones carried for the two points and the Cyclone went ahead 8-6.

Ellis kicked off for the Cyclone and HB Bales returned the ball to the Tulia 47. On the third down following a 15-yard penalty, Tulia fumbled and the Cyclone recovered on the Tulia 44. Three plays netted a first down to the Tulia 37 but Tulia recovered the ball on a fumble on their own 31. However, they fumbled on the next play and the Cyclone took over on the 42. The Cyclone drove for another first to the 32 but fumbled the ball and Tulia recovered on the 32.

Second Half Play

Memphis took over the ball on their own 19 yardline after the kickoff by Tulia, and lost the ball on a fumble two plays later on their own 29. Tulia was penalized 15 yards for holding and failed to make a first down. The Cyclone punted on the next series and HB Haight ran the ball back 62 yards to score. A pass to End Cole added two more points and the score was Tulia 22, Memphis 8.

Tulia kicked the ball to Memphis who returned it to the 30 yard line. Bill Pounds picked up 12 yards on a carry to the 42 and four more carries by Jones, Wright, Pounds and Jones picked up 13 more yards. Three more plays netted 12 more yards to the Tulia 34 and three more carries by Cyclone backs left them facing a fourth and one yard for a first. At this point Tulia's line rose to stop the fourth down attempt and Tulia took over on their own 28.

At the start of the third period, it took Tulia seven plays to move the ball to the Cyclone 25. Tulia drew a 15-yard penalty, to put them back to the Cyclone 40. On the next play, KB Caraway passed to HB Haight, the ball was deflected by Defensive Back Pounds however, Haight caught the ball anyway for the score. A pass attempt for extra points was

First off, the Cyclone received no major injuries in the encounter with the Hornets; secondly the Memphis 11, without the services of Guard Dee Miller and QB Bunky Adcock were able to move the ball all night, picking up 16 first downs to Tulia's 12; thirdly, three untested backs, Bill J. Pounds, Doug Peters and Perry Wright, turned in fine performances on the field. And fourth, but not last, fans were proud of the Cyclone's hard charging offensive and defensive line. They opened holes in the Tulia forward wall most of the night. However, as first games go, the Cyclone showed many mistakes which cost dearly.

Bunky Adcock began working out with the squad Monday and is expected to see only limited action Friday night against Estelline. However, Coach Lambert was sure that Dee Miller would be back at his old defensive end position and offensive guard slot.

An apology to the Cyclone's 198 lb. junior tackle, Rex Gris-

wide and the score stood Tulia 28, Memphis 8.

The ball changed hands several times at this point in the game until about two minutes were left Memphis took over the ball on their own 23, which started their final TD drive.

HB Pounds picked up five yards on a reverse. On the second play, from the 28 yard line, HB Peters carried around right end, picked up fine blocks by FB Jones and Bill J. Pounds, broke into the secondary, reversed his field behind blocks by QB Wright and Dwight Gailey, and scampered 61 yards before being pulled down from behind by Haight on the Tulia 11-yard line.

Eddie Jones blasted for 4 yards and Pounds carried for no gain. Then, QB Wright ran the option play, got a key block by HB Peters and Center Ables, and danced and spun his way across for the score. Peters carried for the extra points but fell short of the necessary yardage. The game ended two plays later.

Memphis gained 282 yards from the line of scrimmage and eight yards on passes. FB Jones carried 17 times for 71 yards for an average of 4.1 yards per carry. HB Peters carried 8 times for 72 yards for a 9 yards per carry average. HB Pounds carried 18 times for 100 yards for a 6 yard average and Wright carried six times for 31 yards for a 5 yard per carry average.

It may include, in addition three snows or blues, or it will be possible to have 5 snows and/or blues with no specks and honkers.

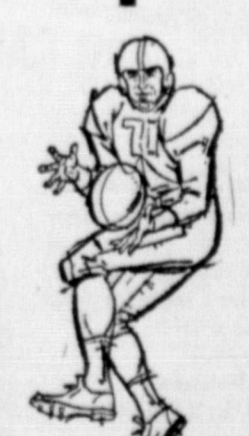
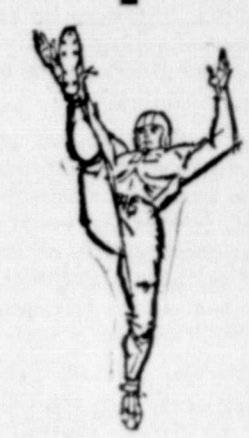

Move Starts For County Hospital Donations

A campaign will be introduced in the very near future to seek donations to the Hall County Hospital in the form of equipping rooms. The project was discussed at the Hall County Commissioners Court meeting Saturday morning.

County Attorney Sim W. Goodall explained to the Commissioners that the Hill-Burton committee will match dollar for dollar any donations given a county for equipping rooms in the hospital. Also, the county attorney explained, it will be possible for those desiring to divide their donations over two years to do so, for the purpose of deducting the money from the income tax.

It was the feeling of the commissioners that the money raised in this campaign and the matching funds from Hill-Burton be used by the county as surplus operating money after the hospital is built. It was the court's desire that as much money be saved in the construction of the hospital as possible so that if the hospital goes in debt, the surplus operating fund can be used to keep the county's property evaluation from being raised above its present level.

The county has already received a donation of \$1,000 from Atty. Paul Spillman, which will be matched by \$1,000 from Hill-Burton. Atty. Goodall was talking to the commissioners in terms of a possible \$20,000 donation campaign.

Also discussed at the Saturday meeting was whether individual door plaques would be used. This decision will be made by the time the donation campaign is launched.

County Attorney Goodall also discussed the job of contacting local doctors to see what equipment they might wish to donate to the county hospital. He said that a portable X-Ray machine has already been offered as a donation. The County Attorney explained that Mr. Nuhm, director of health service, advised them to accept only the best equipment.

The exact plans for the campaign have not been finalized, but a number of people have expressed an interest in donating to the hospital, and the commissioners court is planning to give them an opportunity in the very near future.

Voters said "no thanks" to the proposed Ochiltree county hospital in Friday's election, defeating the \$800,000 bond issue by a vote of 642 against and 452 for the proposal.

The issue as presented called for \$800,000 in hospital bonds, \$800,000 in matching Hill-Burton funds and \$50,000 from other sources for the total estimated cost of \$1,650,000.

Considerable opposition to the hospital bonds came because of the federal funds to be applied to the cost, with many voters opposed to accepting the money.

Do we think about the wildlife only during the hunting season, or do we think and plan for wildlife all during the year? To insure a good crop of wildlife each year, we need to plan for them. The primary and most important needs of wildlife are food and cover. Without sufficient cover and food birds and animals cannot exist. Wildlife must have a year round supply of food. They must have ample year round cover in which to hide, nest, raise their young, and for protection from the weather.

Conservation measures have a good effect on wildlife. Cover crops and high residue crops provide cover and food. Permanent grasses, native or planted, provide food and cover as well as resting areas. The proper use of rangeland provides wildlife with almost all their needs—year round food and cover. Other ways of improving wildlife habitat are: leaving several rows of unharvested feed standing around field boundaries, protecting odd areas, such as gullies and untillable spots, from fire and grazing. Also these areas may be planted to vegetation that provide food and cover. Shelter belts and fence rows are good locations for wildlife, if they are not burned or grazed off.

For information concerning the improvement of wildlife habitat and providing food and cover, contact the local game warden, county agent, or Soil Conservation Service technicians.

With the hunting season underway, sportsmen should remember a few safety measures. Do not load your gun until you are ready to use it. Treat every gun as though it were loaded—even if you know it isn't. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger. Never point a gun at anything unless you intend to shoot it. Do not climb over or through fences with a loaded gun in your hands. Never mix hunting and drinking.

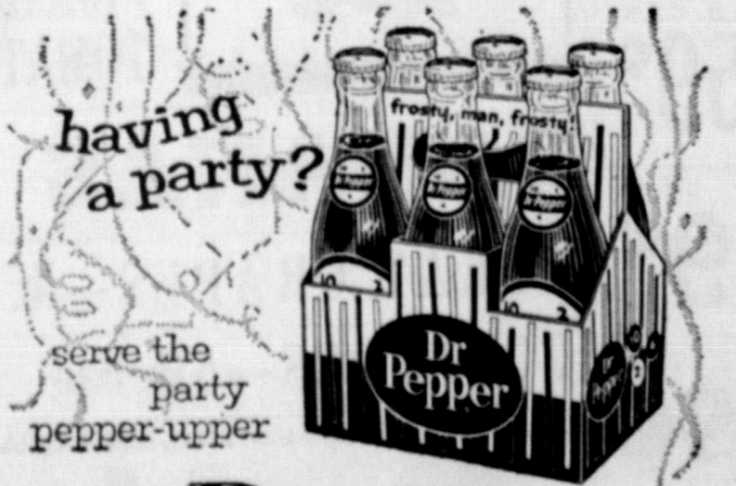

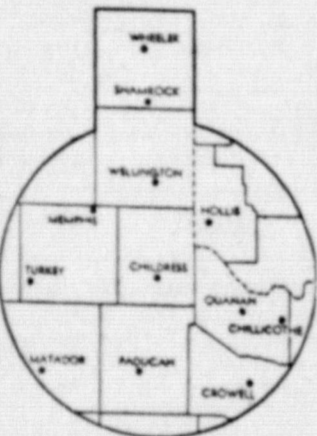

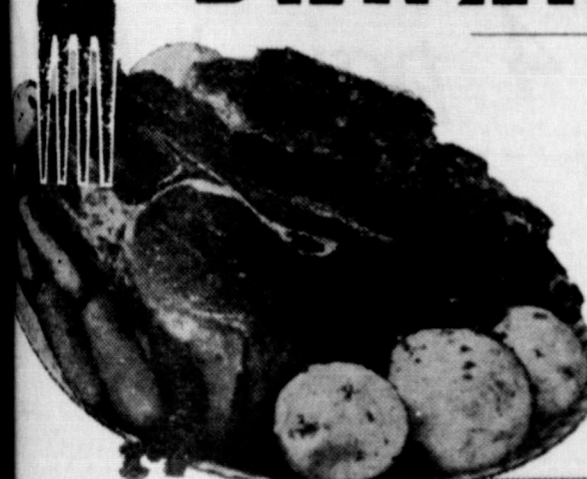

until the hospital has settled down to a 'pay as you go' basis.

"2. That you ask for donations of money for the purpose of equipping rooms (which money will be matched).

"3. That you ask for donations of equipment from the local doctors, for example instruments, and lab equipment, (These items or their value will not be matched by Hill-Burton funds).

"4. That you appoint the men you wish to serve on the hospital board to a committee to work with you and the architect.

"5. That you designate someone to sign the paper work relating to the Federal participation.

"6. That you designate someone as a spokesman to appear on Sept. 10, in Austin.

"7. Do not accept donations of old and out-dated equipment to use in the hospital. Past experience has shown the people are unhappy with it.

"8. That you have two deluxe rooms for patients that are willing to pay more for the extras."

At the Saturday morning session, Attorney Goodall stated that Attorney Spillman had not signed the report at that time. Attorney Spillman signed the report, as submitted, Tuesday.

The Court passed an order that the report be received and added to the minutes. Also, the Court passed an order that Attorney Goodall sign the paper work in regards to Hill-Burton funds.

The Commissioners passed an order that Atty. Goodall attend the Sept. 10 meeting of the State Board in Austin, accompanied by Mr. Roberts, the architect.

Following the passing of the orders, Mr. Roberts, who was present at the meeting, took the floor and presented the revised plans of the County Hospital.

Mr. Roberts stated that the old plans for the hospital contained 16,500 square feet and needed cutting. He stated that two weeks ago Bill Coger, assistant to Mr. Nuhm, was in his office and he discussed the cutting of the hospital size. He said Mr. Coger helped him cut many of the things from the hospital.

The revised plan contained 15,900 square feet, a reduction of 600 square feet. The building will face the east, and contains 30 beds in 21 rooms. As the plan stands, there will be 12 single rooms and nine doubles.

He said that each room will have a commode and lavatory facilities.

In response to a question by one of the Commissioners, Roberts said that the plan he had probably would be changed by the Hill-Burton committee in Austin several times before construction began. He stated that the building would have to be constructed according to the Uniform Building Code which requires a Type D-2 building for one containing 15,900 square feet. The building code is compiled on fire safety requirements.

In response to a cost question, he said that he really only had a rough figure. The figures given were: building cost, \$318,000; paving of parking lot, \$5,000; contingency figure, \$6,500; five per cent architect fee, \$16,500; equipment, \$49,500, for a total of \$395,000.

Following the architect's discussion, the Court passed an order that Mr. Roberts submit the plans he presented to the Court, Saturday, to the Hill-Burton committee meeting Sunday, Sept. 10.

Atty. Goodall then discussed the portion of Mr. Nuhm's suggestions to the Court on the possi-

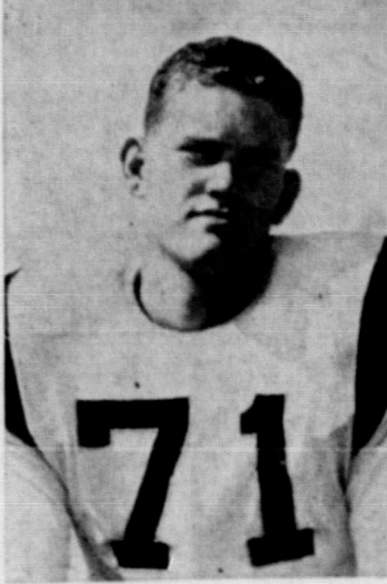
