





The Long Distance Service price changes will also impact AT&T's PROsm WATS Texas offering, which offers subscribers a 10% discount on all long distance calls within Texas. Prices for AT&T's REACH OUT* Texas offering will also change. The price for initial hour usage will increase from \$12.55 to \$12.95; the additional hour price will increase from \$11.40 to \$12.00.
