## Nabers, Clements, Adcock Win

The Lakeview girls doubles tennis team, Winnie Nabers and Karen Clements, won the state Class "B" championship last weekend in Austin.

Bunky Adcock of Memphis tied for first place in the high jump event with two other youths in Class "A" competition.

The Memphis girls and Estelline boys, also in the doubles tennis competition, lost out in the first round of play.

In their first match the Lakeview girls defeated Chilton 6-2, 6-0. They met Fort Davis in the second event and downed them 6-1, 6-0. In the final competition Saturday they defeated Old Glory 6-2, 6-1 to take the state championship.

In the state Class "A" high jump event, 14 youths were competing. Adcock of Memphis cleared the bar at 5 feet, 10 inches, as did two other youths, Robert Evans of Troup and Virgil Phelps of Whitesburg. The bar was then moved to 6 feet, and all three of the jumpers were unable to clear it at that mark. They were then recorded as tri-champions and each received a first place medal.

The Memphis girls doubles tennis team, Leslie Helm and Deeda Hickey, lost out to Calallen in the first round of play 6-1, 6-1. The Calallen girls are last year's state champions and went on to win again this year.

The Estelline boys, Teddy Jay Barnes and Rolfe Wooten, competing in Class "B" doubles, lost out in the first round of play. Their situation was similar to that of the Memphis girls in that Estelline lost to Sabinal in the first match, and Sabinal went on to win the state crown.

Elaine Seay of Estelline, who was in the journalism competition, has not received final word on her placing. She placed third in news writing, fifth in headline writing and has not received placing in the other phases of the contest.

E. "Gip" McMurry led the balloting here Saturday in the race for County Judge, receiving a total of 1028 votes. The present County Judge, Tracy Davis, seeking re-election, received 716 votes and the third candidate, Bill G. Kesterson, received 273 votes.

In the race for County and District Clerk, Ruby Goodnight won re-election by a vote of 1107, as compared with 587 for Mildred Stephens and 326 for Sybil Gurley.

Mrs. Lucile Wright defeated Mrs. Hester Bownds in the race for county treasurer by a vote of 1389 to 632. Mrs. Bownds was seeking re-election.

Clyde Fowler won the race for County Democratic Chairman, defeating the present chairman, Herschel Combs, 991 to 854.

At Lakeview, there will be a run-off in the race for Commissioner. H. W. Spear, present Commissioner, received 169 votes, Aubrey Robertson 157 votes, and George Blewer 66 votes.

At Turkey Curtis O. Tunnell received 169 votes and Guy O. Smith 130 votes in the race for Justice of Peace, Precinct No. 4.

Marshall Formby led the balloting in Hall County in the Governor's race with 889 votes. However, on a statewide basis, John Conally and Don Yarborough will meet in the run-off.

For State Representative, 82nd District, Alex Saied of Childress carried Hall County, 963 to 889, over the present representative, W. S. Heatly of Cottle County. However, on the overall district total, Heatly won.

Elsewhere in this issue of The Democrat appears a tabulated report on the balloting by boxes.

All of the Democratic Precinct Chairmen were re-elected in their various boxes. The only contest on the ballot was at Plaska where the incumbent, A. C. Sams, won 26 to 23 over Harold Hodges who was seeking the office.

At Lakeview a write-in campaign developed against V. C. Durrett, where James Skinner received 17 votes, Del Wells 2 and Coleman Duke 2. Durrett received 172 votes.

## County Democratic Convention To Be Held Saturday

Delegates from each voting precinct in Hall County will hold their Democratic County Convention in Memphis Saturday afternoon, May 12. The session will be held in the County Court Room in the courthouse, and will be called to order at 2 o'clock.

A total of 69 delegates are eligible to attend, according to Herschel Combs, county chairman. Largest delegation will represent Memphis No. 1 voting precinct, which will send 19. The other Memphis precinct will be represented by 14 delegates, the same number as will come from Turkey.

The party leaders will elect six delegates to represent Hall County at the State Democratic Convention Sept. 18. Also to be discussed and voted on will be resolutions, which will be submitted after adoption here to the state meeting.

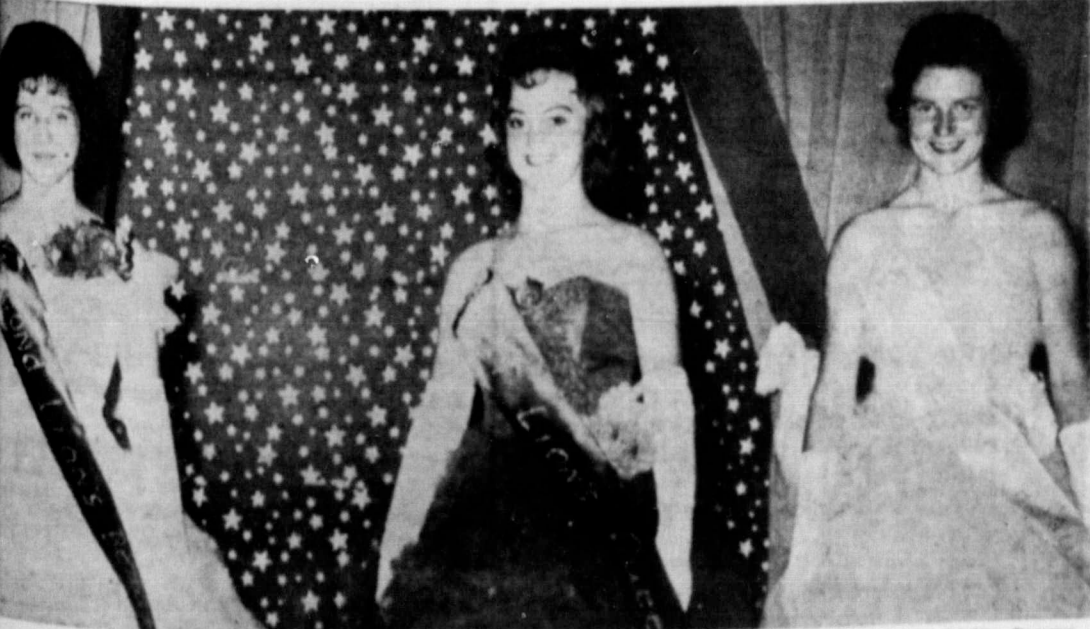

## EDITORIAL

### How the U.S. Department of Agriculture Serves You

Next Tuesday, May 15, marks the 100th Anniversary of the founding of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. On that date in 1862 President Lincoln approved an Act of Congress creating the department, "the general design and duties of which shall be to acquire and diffuse among the people of the United States useful information on subjects connected with agriculture in the most general and comprehensive sense of that word." And this effort toward the increasing of the capabilities of the American farmer have met with more success than any other phase similar effort anywhere in the world. After its founding in 1862, the Department was elevated to the eighth Executive Department in the Federal Government with Cabinet rank in 1889. The Department is headed by Washington, D. C. by the Secretary of Agriculture. He and his staff direct the programs and activities assigned to the Department by Congress in every part of the United States, and in many Foreign countries employees administer programs authorized by Congress.

The activities of the Department include many different phases. There are seven USDA agencies engaged in research and the department also works closely with States, schools and other public and private agencies. In addition to research on crops, farm and land management, livestock, human nutrition and home economics, the department also does general economic and statistical analysis, marketing economics, farm economics and foreign economic analysis.

Another important phase of the Agriculture Department is education. The cooperative Extension Service is the field education arm of the Department and land-grant colleges. Its work is jointly sponsored and financed by federal, state and local governments. In every rural county, extension workers conduct an educational program designed to help farm families and others use research findings and other government aids. Through this program extension workers provide assistance toward more efficient production and marketing of agricultural products, improved family living, and the advancement of community affairs. The department also provides a variety of publications and other information.

The Agricultural Marketing Service branch of the Department carries out marketing and distribution programs and works with the states on marketing problems. This includes the use of physical and biological sciences to solve problems of market quality, transportation and facilities. Also included in this division is the collection and dissemination of market news on farm products.

The Soil Conservation Service develops and carries out a national soil and water conservation program through 2,900 soil conservation districts. They also carry out the USDA responsibilities in projects to protect small watersheds and prevent floods and in river basin investigations. They also administer the federal part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey and has leadership of the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is responsible for acreage allotments and marketing quotas to help keep supplies in line with demand. Also included in their work is the feed grain program to divert corn, barley and grain sorghum acreage to conservation use; the wheat stabilization program; the conservation reserve; helping obtain adequate farm and commercial storage of farm products; administration of the sugar act, wool act and international wheat agreement.

Other phases of the Department includes the Commodity Credit Corporation, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, the Farmers Home Administration, the Rural Electrification Administration, and the Food and Materials Division of the ASCS which is responsible for the Department's role in the defense picture.

Throughout the years the Department of Agriculture has meant a lot to the people of rural areas such as Hall County and it will continue to have a great influence upon us here in the months and years to come. There are many problems in the agriculture field which remain to be solved, however, the Department has made great strides forward in the 100 years since its founding to promote the progress of agriculture from a hand operation to one which is highly more productive with less manpower. Food costs in the U. S. are actually far lower than they are in Europe or Russia and the credit for this should go directly to the American farmers and the Department of Agriculture.

A good thing to ponder over is what would happen if we should all be suddenly called upon to exert physical energy to maintain our way of life? How many of us could stand the gaff of actually putting out any physical strength for even a short period of time? The answer is that many of us would fall by the wayside after very little physical exertion. Truth is, we are a lazy group and getting lazier day by day.

Young folks need a vehicle to take them places, they no longer can walk any distance. They lead the life of Riley, seldom, if ever, exerting themselves physically. The President, with Bud Wilkinson as his representative, has started a move to correct the physical fitness problem in the schools. This is a good idea and is making progress. Perhaps we can stem the rush to complete inactivity in future generations by handling the matter in the schools.

And while the President and his Youth Activity Committee, headed by Wilkinson, are making progress in the schools, private individuals should take the hint and do something about the degeneration of present day adults. Who can blame the kids for being lazy when many of them have a set of parents that feel they are doing someone a favor if they so much as turn their hand in physical or mental activity. We inhabit the coffee shop all day, fall out of bed just in time to get to work—that is if we have a job; feel worn out when we get there, and do as little as we can from starting time to quitting time. And, if asked how we feel, the usual answer is: "Oh, I'm so tired."

Perhaps our survival doesn't depend so much on present day adults being physically fit. Maybe it's the school kids coming on who will have to defend our pride. Even so, the complete indifference on the part of many that we should actually do anything has its effect on the business and economic life of our nation. One reason why prices are so high is because too many people won't work. They are tired all the time. They are growing fat with soft living.

Too many workers have an indifferent attitude toward their employers. Often it is true that workers goof-off merely because they do not appreciate the effort made in their behalf by their employer. All workers should realize that someone has gone to effort and expense to provide their job. It is just common decency to render service for the effort made by the employer.

The President's physical fitness program with school children will be beneficial in the future. However, the future is in the distance and adults with enough appreciation to be thankful for their very existence should do more than waste their time in complete abandon and indifference of one's purpose in life — to be an asset to humanity, not a liability.

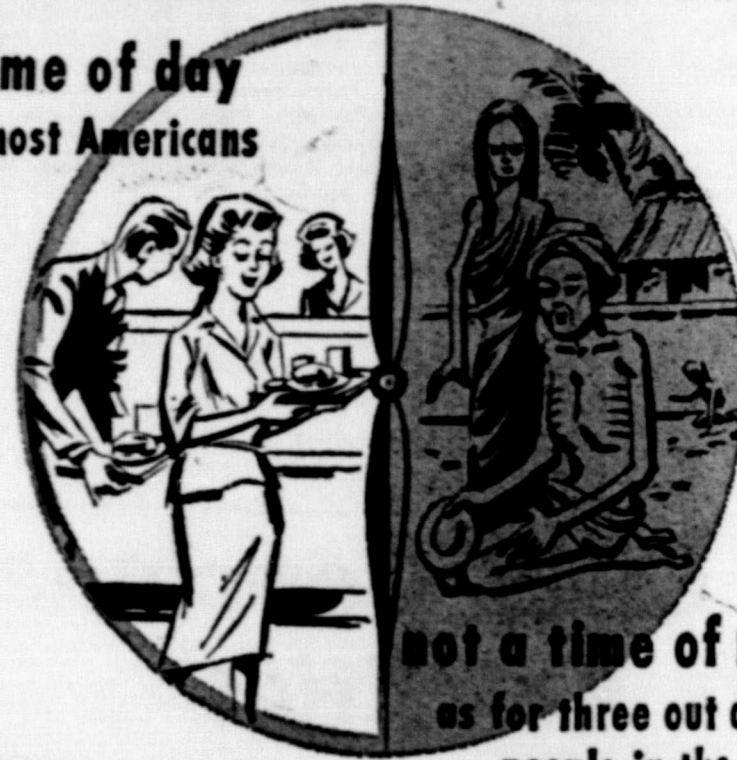

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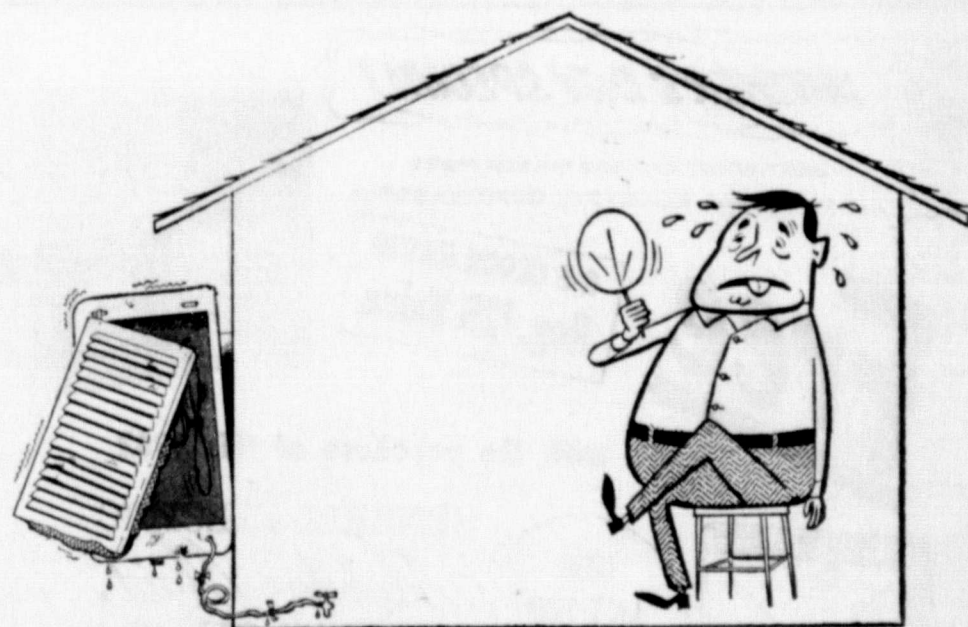

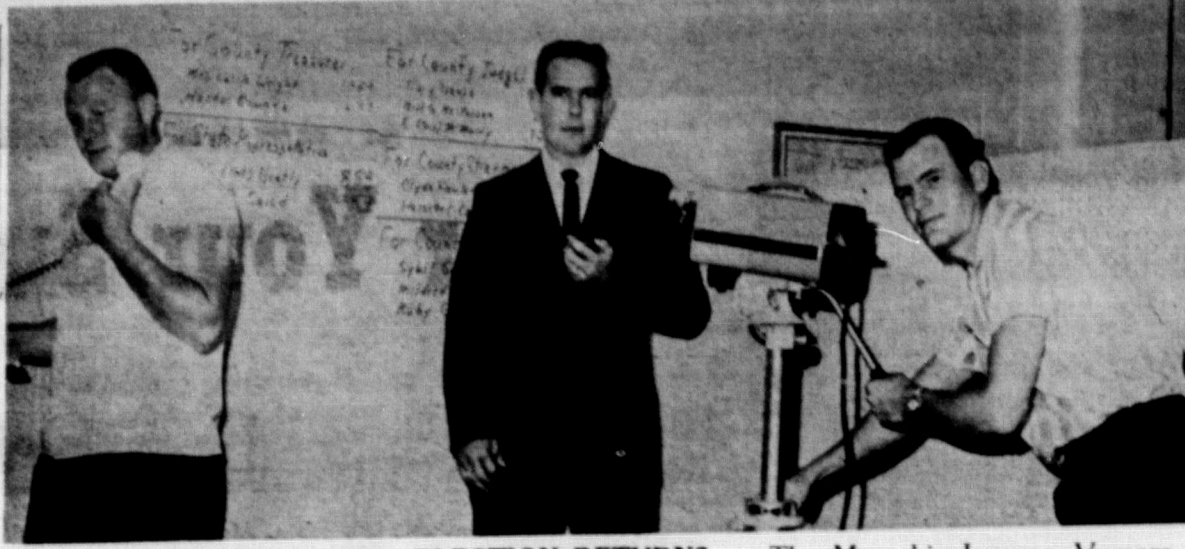
### Memphis Makes Contribution To Aid Camp Kiowa

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### Report From Washington

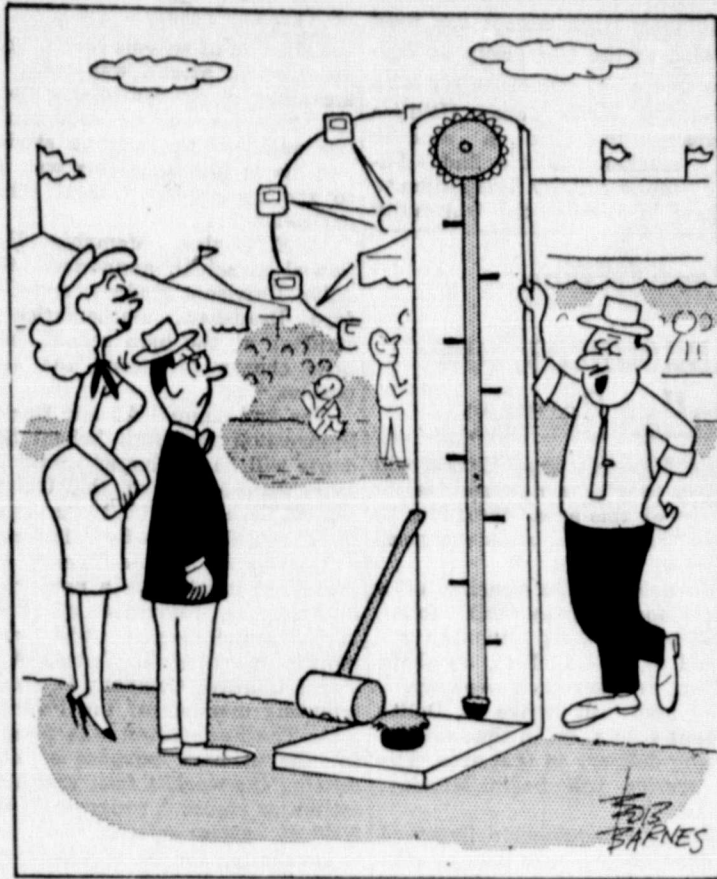


#### Communications

House of Representatives passed three bills this session which will have a revolutionary effect on communications, not only in this country but throughout the world. The effect in this country will be a broad overall effect, going into each and every family. The first bill that was passed was the Educational TV Channels Act, which is designed to implement the channels reserved in the spectrum for educational broadcasting.

Federal Communications Commission to require that all television receivers shipped in interstate commerce or imported into the United States for sale or resale be equipped at the time of manufacture to receive all television channels; that is, the 70 channels in the UHF portion of the radio spectrum, as well as the 12 in the VHF portion. The difference between VHF and UHF can be likened to the difference between a small pie (UHF) and a large pie (VHF). Due to the wide range of VHF, the license holders were quick to grab up all available frequencies, because it gave them a larger market and an opportunity to have a larger business and to make more money. As a result, UHF licenses went begging. The FCC has allocated space in the radio spectrum sufficient for a total of 2,225 stations — 1,544 UHF stations and 681 VHF stations. Five hundred of the VHF stations are already on the air. However, only 103, or about 7 per cent of the 1,544 UHF stations are actually on the air. If the American people are to enjoy the fullest benefits of television service, a major portion of the unassigned UHF channels must be

put into operation. It was this problem that prompted the All Channels Television Receivers legislation.

There are approximately 55 million television receivers in the hands of the public; however, only about 9 million, or about 16 per cent, are capable of receiving UHF signals. The overwhelming bulk of television set production is limited to VHF receivers, and the situation is growing steadily worse. In 1953, more than one-fifth of the television receivers were equipped to receive UHF. In 1961 only about one-twentieth were so equipped. The absence of sets equipped for UHF reception simply made

impossible the profitable operation of a UHF broadcasting station. In fact, 100 UHF licensees have had to go out of business. This situation was fast developing into a most serious concentration of power in all economic fields associated with television. The proper administration of this new legislation will result in the opening of many possibilities for new business and new and expanded television reception, without endangering or interfering with present reception or receivers.

In fact, it will solve the problem in a much better manner than was being pursued by the FCC. Exist-

ing television sets will not be effected in any manner. I am advised by manufacturers that a converter can be attached to an existing set for a relatively small cost to enable reception of all channels. If a person does not desire to receive UHF broadcasts, nothing need be done. He can continue to receive the present stations without interruption. The method being pursued by the FCC would have been to separate different geographical areas so that one area would be all VHF and another would be all UHF. Had this proposal been followed through, those who found themselves in an all UHF area would have had to buy a converter or a new all-channel receiver. It would also have brought much confusion and economic injury to present VHF station owners.

The third bill referred to in the communications field is probably one of the most important to pass the House of Representatives in its history. This is the Communications Satellite Act of 1962. This act not only opens the door for this country to lead the way in us-

ing outer space for communications purposes, but it does so on the free enterprise philosophy. The corporation to be created under this act will be one in which the public will have the right and privilege to purchase stock. It will run like any other private free enterprise corporation in the communications carrier field. It will not be government owned or dominated. It will have the authority to create, maintain and operate communications satellite systems that will make possible the transmittal of information from this country to any portion of the world in almost the flash of an eye. It will permit us to break through Iron or Bamboo Curtains with truthful and honest information without delay. This means of communication can provide an avenue for the greatest possible service to mankind throughout the world. Proceeding to the full utilization of this new medium, by and through the application of our basic free enterprise philosophy, will give added luster to the freedom and dignity of man as recognized under our system.
