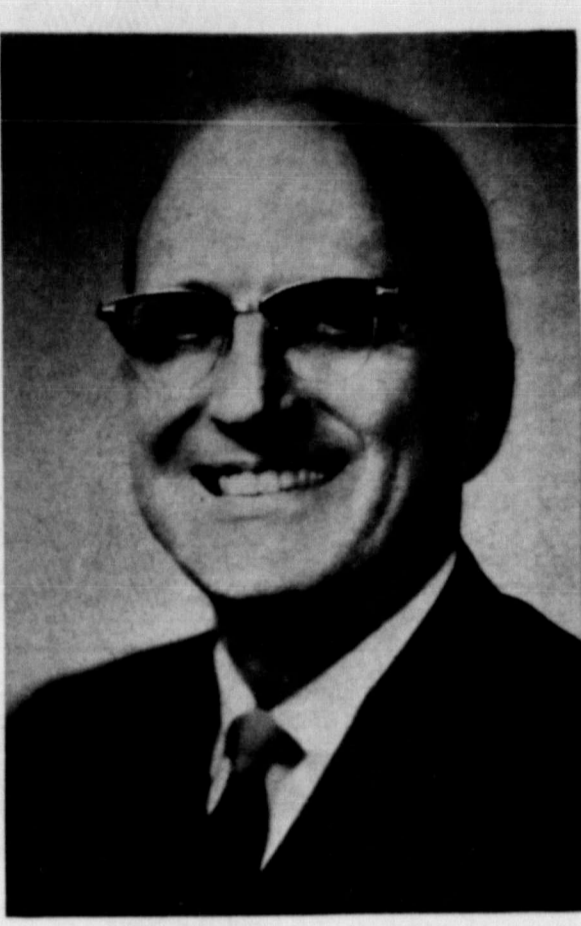
Interment was in Fairview Cemetery with services under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

The youths of Memphis have counted the compress manager among their friends through the 30 plus years he has made Memphis his home.

Home-room mothers bake fancy cakes, depicting the four seasons. Mrs. Cochran decorates the room, using some theme such as cow-boys or circus, and all the children enjoy a complete birthday celebration.

floor for debate, the committee had cut the requested amount by \$92 million to \$935 million, a total that stood \$21 million lower than the sum advocated by the fiscally-conscious U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

That \$935 million amount was cut still further. I offered one amendment that pared another \$5.5 million from the appropriation. Another Democrat, Rep. Sam Gibbons of Florida, successfully pressed an amendment paring another \$1.6 million.

My amendment eliminated from the bill a sum earmarked for remodeling the Old Patent Office Building in downtown Washington for use as a gallery to house valuable portraits and other art works. I noted in presenting the amendment that I hesitated to do so because I might be branded as lacking in cultural appreciation. But I declared that considering the financial pressures on the nation, the building could be better used to house essential government operations. When the vote was tallied, my position prevailed by the close margin of 112 to 106. Mr. Gibbons' amendment, passed by voice vote, eliminated a proposed \$1.6 million in architects fees and planning costs for a National Air Museum to house and display historic aircraft.

Another amendment, one offered by that great Democratic Party conservative from Virginia, Rep. Howard W. Smith (chairman of the House Rules Committee), would have cut another \$10 million from Interior's request. It would have eliminated the purchase of what Howard Smith, in his usual good-humored way, described as "marshland for the use of migratory ducks to go back and sit down on and spend the winter." He said, "The ducks have been right patient with us. I wonder if they would be willing to wait a year or two. I do not think it would do the duck hunters much harm." However, despite the efforts of those of us who joined Mr. Smith in advocating patience among ducks and duck hunters, the amendment failed of passage by one vote, by 122 to 121.

I'd like to emphasize this point: All over the United States there are groups that advocate Federal expenditures for favored projects. The budgetary items cited to you above were backed by well-organized groups of Americans—art lovers, airplane enthusiasts, duck conservationists. The art lovers and the fans of old airplanes suffered setbacks; the friends of ducks won their round. You can count on the art and airplane people to be back next year for another round at the Federal treasury. Most Americans, being natural joiners, are members of one group or another that has its eye out for Federal assistance of some kind, and the result is difficult pressure on the Congress.

At any rate, those of us who are working within the majority party to keep spending down did meet with some success last week. Our efforts, I assure you, will continue.

Washington Notes

There is the feeling in some quarters that if wheat producers turn down the 1964 Wheat Program in the May 21 referendum Congress will produce another wheat program this year. I am convinced that this will not be the case. I quote from the remarks of the House Majority Leader, Rep. Carl Albert of Oklahoma, who discussed this prospect Monday, April 1, on the House floor: "The 1964 Wheat Program provides wheat growers with clear and unmistakable economic choices in this referendum. . . . The wheat farmers have a choice under the

law, and in my judgement the Congress will take them at their word. I am convinced that there will be no new wheat legislation this year." On the same day, the Majority Leader of the Senate, Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana, said this: ". . . I see no need to consider new legislation on wheat this year." And the Majority Whip of the Senate, Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota, said, "It seems to me the prevailing attitude of Congress is if wheat farmers reject the 1964 Wheat Program it is because they prefer the alternative in the law."

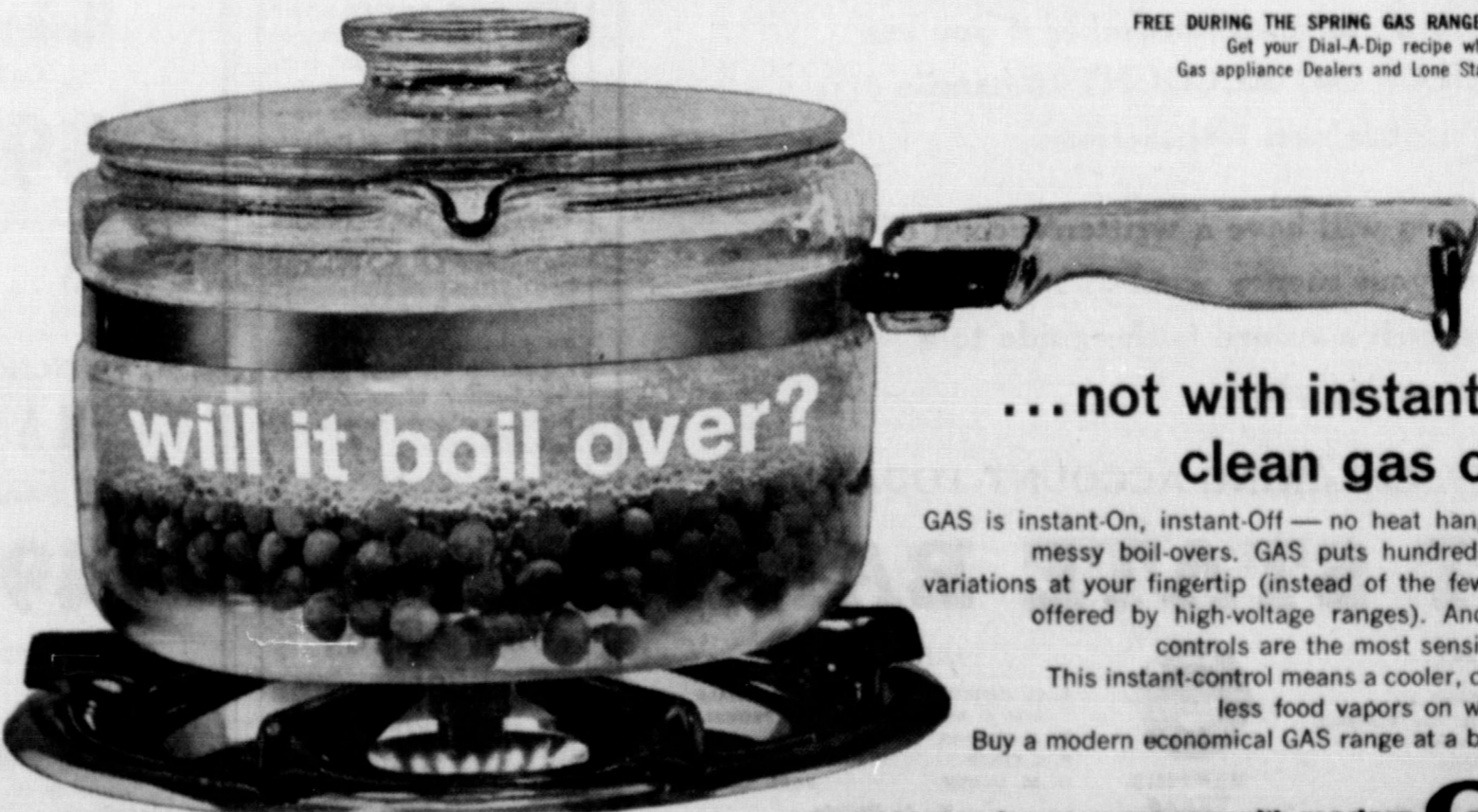
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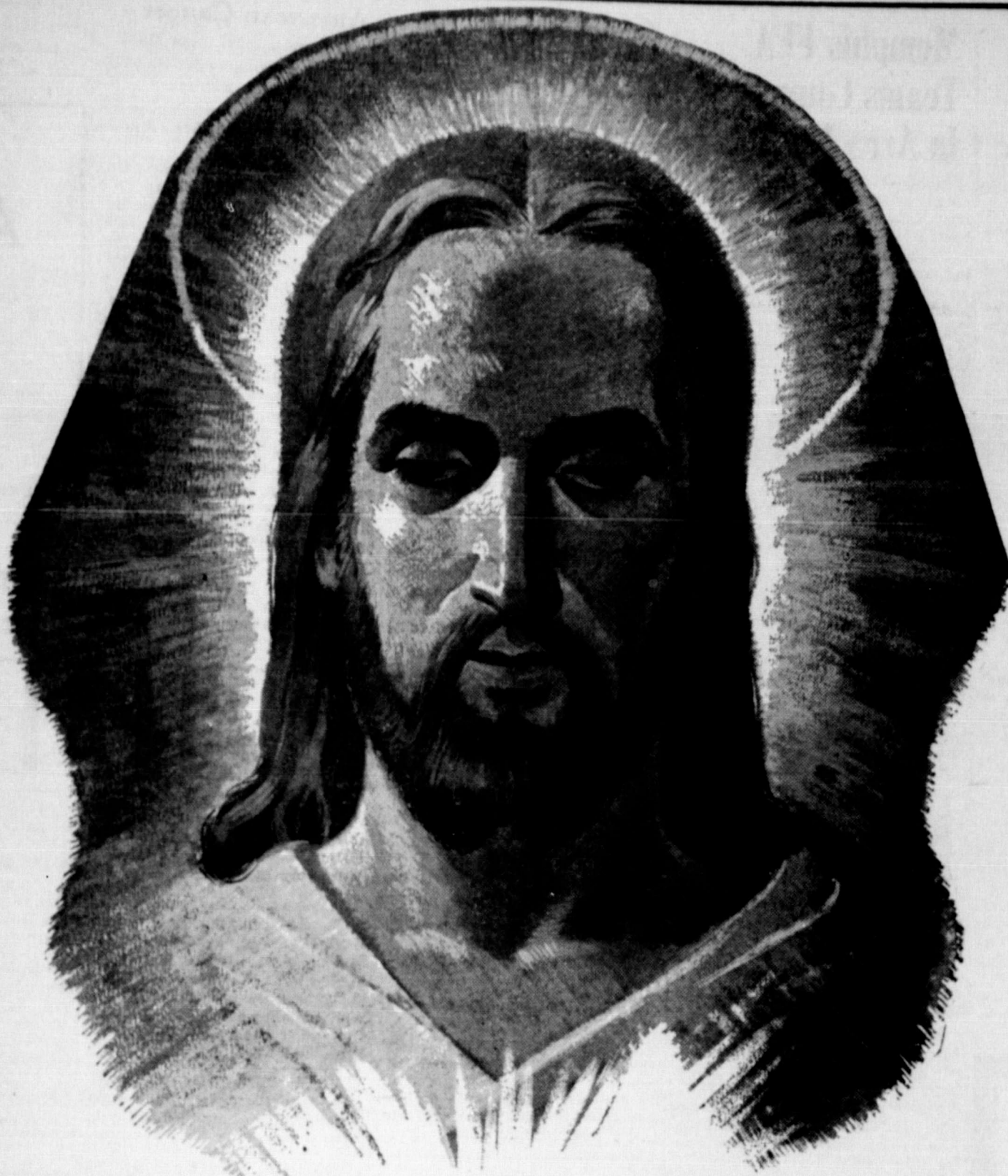
