## General Motors 'Previews of Progress' To Show at Memphis High School Mon.

"Liquid sunshine" powers a portable radio. A small boat-shaped vehicle floats on a cushion of air. And a "misbehaving" suitcase illustrates principles used in modern guidance systems.

Memphis High School students will see these and other interesting demonstrations when the famed General Motors science show, Previews of Progress, appears at the school on Monday, May 6, at 1:30 p. m.

"We seek through Previews to inspire young people to make science and engineering their career and provide the trained talent America must have to keep pace with the promise of the future," John F. Gordon, president of General Motors, declares.

Bruce Schroffelt and Jerry Bishop of General Motors Public Relations staff will narrate the 45-minute, non-commercial pre-

sentation. They are one of seven teams that take the show to more than a million students each year.

One of the highlights of the show is a fuel cell, a device that converts chemical energy into electrical power. Potentially one of the most significant scientific developments of the century, the fuel cell manufactures electricity with much greater efficiency than is now obtained from conventional power plants.

In the show, a few drops of "liquid sunshine" added to the cells provide enough energy to operate a portable radio.

Another example of solar energy, the amazing Sunmobile, will be demonstrated. The 15-inch model car depends on eight photovoltaic cells for its operation.

The buttonlike cells on the hood of the car convert light rays into electricity which drives a small electric motor inside the car. A 300-watt lamp is used to simulate the sun's rays in the show. As the light strikes the cells, the Sunmobile moves smoothly across a table.

In addition to sun power, the Previews audience will see a Ground Effect Machine in operation. The small craft that resembles a boat is designed to skim over land or water on a cushion of air.

The operation of the Previews GEM is simple. Air pulled through (Continued on Page 8, Sec. 1)

### Local Citizens Donate \$973.52 To Co. Society of Crippled Children

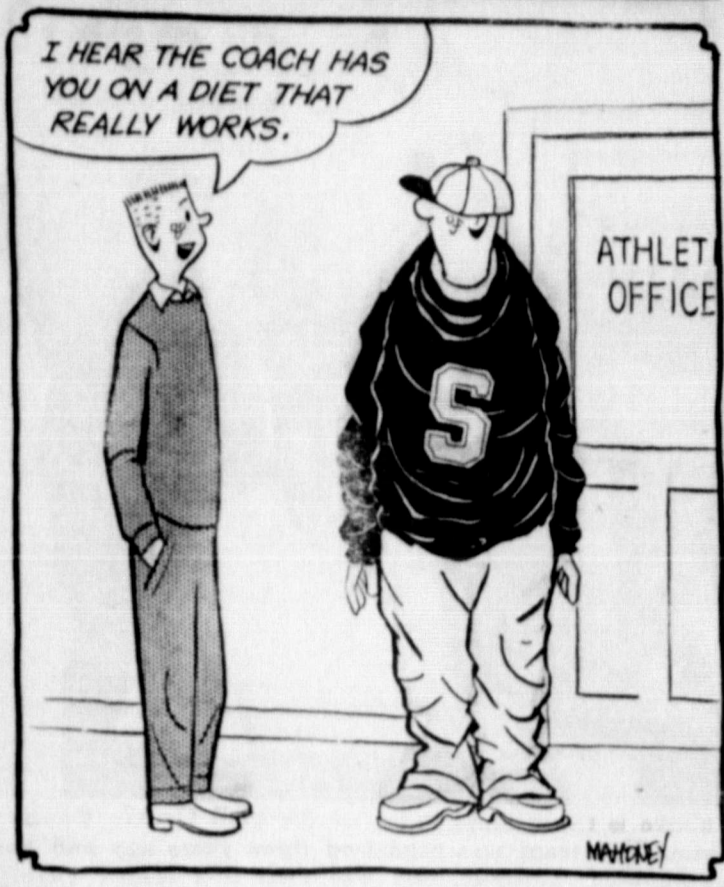
Durham, chairman of the County Society of Crippled Children, has expressed thanks to those who helped to make the fund raising campaign a success.



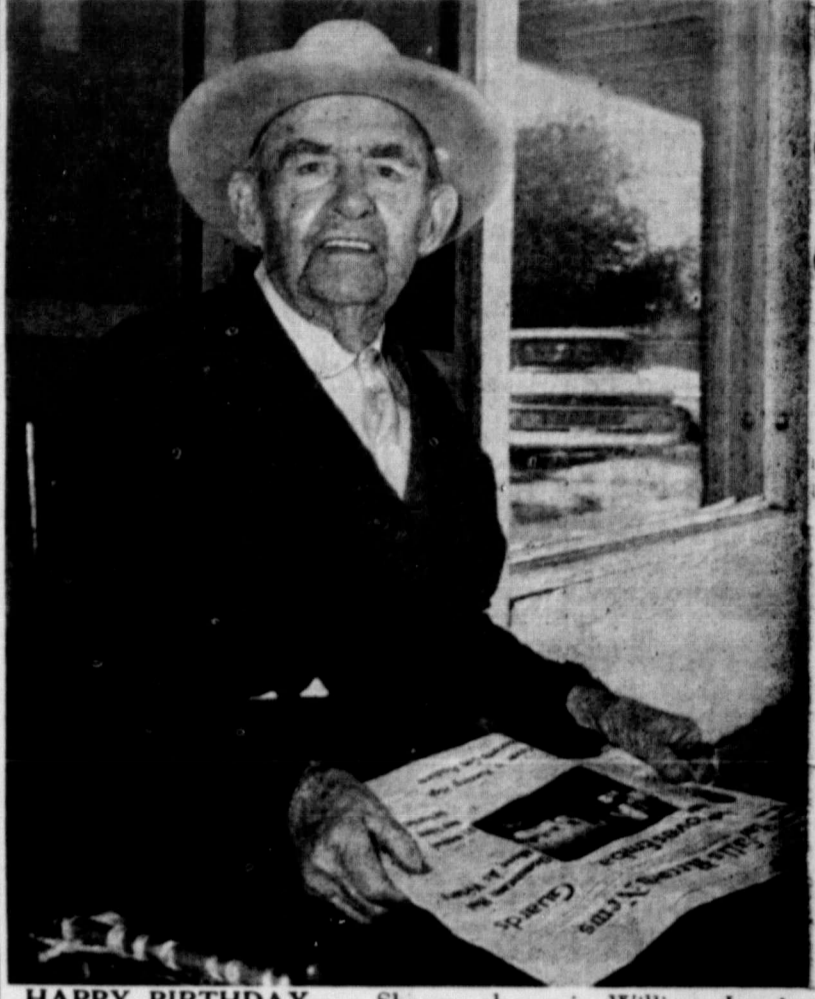
Nancy Rea played a medley of piano selections including "Bonanza" and "Ruins of Greece."

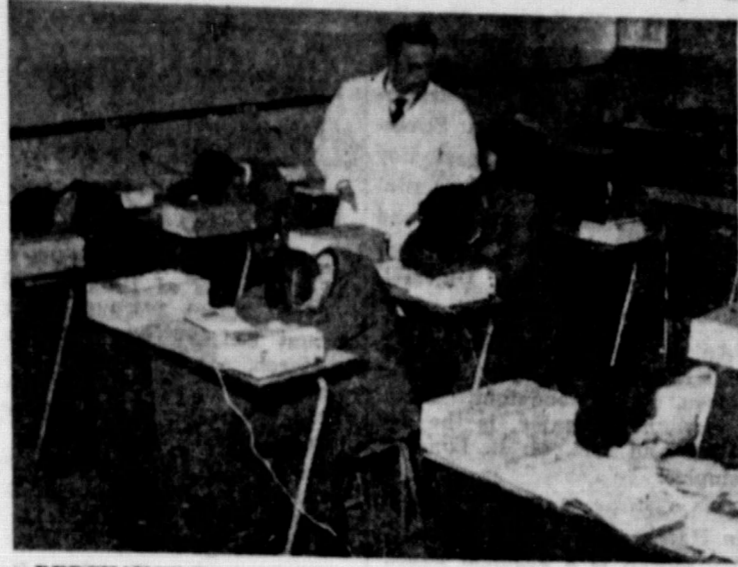

**Management of Bermudagrass Pastures**

There are several important things to consider in the management of irrigated Bermudagrass pastures. These important factors are proper irrigation, correct types and amounts of fertilizer and proper use of Bermudagrass. With the combination of these factors maximum pounds of grass will be produced. The amount and extent of irrigation water applied may vary. If Bermudagrass is irrigated every two weeks approximately, the maximum water needs will be met. Water alone will not make the greatest amount of grass. The correct types and amounts of fertilizer are needed for the greatest production. In experiments on the high plains and in

north Texas with irrigated Bermudagrass different fertilizers were used. The greatest production of grass came from the use of 4 applications of 80 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer. Generally the soils in this area of Texas are low in nitrogen and Bermudagrass needs a greater amount of nitrogen than any other element, although a small amount of phosphate could be applied during the springing operation or on the first years growth. Experiments also have proven that proper grazing or use of Bermudagrass, all other things being equal, can improve the production by as much as 6,000 pounds of grass per acre. To properly use or graze Bermudagrass an average stubble height of 4 to 6 inches should be maintained at the end of the growing season. Another important consideration in proper use of Bermudagrass is the amount of growth in the spring before grazing is started. Bermudagrass should be approximately 8 inches high before grazing starts. Bermudagrass with proper irrigation, fertilization and grazing can be a very profitable crop. Your local Soil Conservation Service office will be glad to help you with any problem or question you might have.

## Example' Farm Used To Explain Wheat Program

ment has increased.

Bear in mind, when you vote in the referendum, that you are voting only for the year 1964. You are not adopting a long-term program.

Now, here is how the program will work for a Hall County farm with a 90-acre allotment. This is what is termed a "large" farm, since it is more than 15 acres.

Say the actual yield for 1964 is the same as the "normal yield"—that is, the average yield established by the Hall ASC County and Community Committee based on a five-year period. (Normal yields vary from farm to farm and the basis for the issuance of certificates and diversion payments).

If the normal and actual production (20 bushels per acre) is 1800 bushels, certificates will be issued for 80 percent, or 1440 bushels. That will leave 360 bushels of non-certificate wheat.

If the market price is the same as the loan rate of \$1.30 per bushel (national average) the farmer will receive \$2.00 per bushel for wheat covered by certificates, and \$1.30 per bushel for non-certificate wheat.

Certificates will be issued on 80 percent of normal production for the farm, and all production beyond the 80 percent is non-certificate wheat.

In this example, because the farmer signed a statement that he would divert his acreage cut to conservation uses, he receives an additional \$120.00 as a "diversionary payment".

The amount of non-certificate wheat for a farm will vary, of course, depending upon whether the farm produces more or less than his normal yield.

## Attendance Report Is Given By MHS

Memphis High School officials released the attendance report for the fifth six-weeks and Superintendent of Schools W. C. Davis commented: "Poor attendance is costing the Memphis District the price of one teacher's annual salary."

The figures released were on grades 12 through 8. Despite what is popularly believed, best attendance is being made by boys. The top three best attendance percentages were: 1. 9th grade boys, 95.96 per cent; 2. 8th grade boys, 94.34 per cent; 3. 12th grade boys, 94.24 per cent.

The total membership of grades 12 through 8 was 269. Total attendance was 7,028 days while the total absence was 572 days. The total daily attendance was 251.01, a loss of 18 on daily attendance, school officials reported.

The total percentage of attendance was 92.96 per cent and 73 tardies were reported.

**But regardless of the actual production on the farm in 1964, the number of certificates to be issued would remain the same, except for a reduction for those farms planting less than the 80 percent of their allotments.**

A farmer possibly can, by voluntary reduction in his allotment of up to 20 percent, eliminate from his program any non-certificate wheat. In this case, he would receive an additional diversion payment at a higher level some two-thirds greater than for the mandatory rate.

That is because the payment for voluntary diversion is \$1.00 per bushel, while that for mandatory diversion is 60 cents per bushel times the normal yield.

A few Hall County farms will plant less than 15 acres and will be considered a "small farm". For those farms the program will operate much the same as for the bigger farms.

A "small farm base" will be established for them based on the average acreage planted in 1959, 1960 and 1961.

The allotment for them will be 10 percent less than this base.

Any small farm may divert as much as the larger of the allotment, or the "small farm" base.

Small farms that did not plant wheat in those three years are not eligible to grow wheat in 1964 as the old 15-acre exemption provision has been eliminated.

The purpose of the seminar is to study the articulation issues involving the English program in the high schools of Colorado and the colleges and universities. In subsequent summers plans to hold seminars in other subject-matter areas are being discussed.

Mrs. Kennedy is the Head of the English Department of Broomfield Junior and Senior High School. In September of 1964 the high school will move into a new million dollar building. There are nine teachers in the English department of the school at present.

### Fourth Graders Hear Program On City Water

During a study of water for the home in the science and health study of fourth grade of Travis School, the question was raised about where Memphis obtained its water. Frank Browder Foxhall, manager of the Donley County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, consented to visit the room, and gave the students a very interesting talk on the municipal water supply.

He took them on an imaginary trip to Giles, and with the use of the blackboard, they saw the underground stream from which several early settlers got their water by hand-dug wells 30 to 50 feet deep. They learned how these wells were sealed off two years ago to keep Memphis water free of surface contamination and thus making it possible for the city water supply to be state approved. He explained how no water from the upper underground stream could enter the pipes which are sunk in concrete to reach the deep underground water. No "run off" water can enter the pipes through which the water flows to Memphis, Foxhall said.

In answer to questions, Foxhall said that as the season for camp-outs, picnics and the like gets in full swing, it is very important that only pure drinking water be used. This can be had by filtration, boiling or chlorination, he said. The fourth graders voted it one of the best classroom programs they have had.

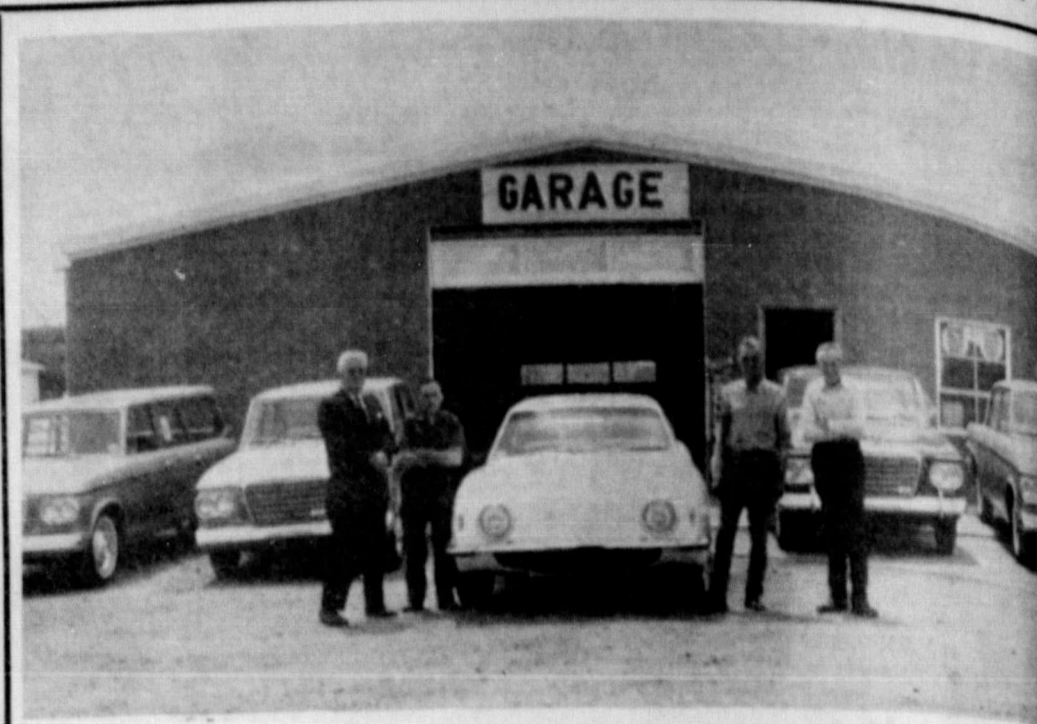
