
High winning paper--a 72 out of 80--but was awarded second place because of the time element of the contest.






ELANA HIMES TO PLAY IN ALL-STAR GAME



FINAL PLANTING DATES

Final planting dates are June 20 for cotton and June 30 for grain sorghum. Producers are required to replant cotton and sorghum acreages through these dates. If a disaster condition occurs after these date, replanting is not required for program purposes. Planting for the first time after these dates could cause a problem if the crop is insured with multi-peril insurance check with your agent first.

At this time, 0/92 is available only for small grains and feed grains. Only 50/92 is available for cotton. As in the past, cotton must be planted to earn deficiency payments regardless of moisture

REPORT OF ACREAGE

As soon as spring seeded crops such as cotton, grain sorghum, and ACR covers have been planted, they may be reported on form ASCS-578. Again this year we will take your report of acreage on the computer. The final date to report spring seeded crops is July 17.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

For those of you who are unsure of your acreages or just want the guarantee, we offer measurement

The rate for the service is \$20.00 per farm, plus \$.02 per acre after the first 25 acres.

The final date to request measurement service is also July 17.

CRP SIGNUP

The 9th CRP signup will be held July 17 through August 4, 1989. This program allows higly erodible land to be planted to a permanent grass in return for annual rental payments for the ten year period.

LOANS

The last day to place 1988 crops of grain sorghum and cotton into the price support loan is May 31.

ADDITIONAL ADVANCE PAYMENTS

A second cycle of 1989 advance deficiency payments

has been announced. The additional 10 percent advance amounts to \$.0214 for cotton, \$.05 for wheat, and \$.09 for grain sorghum. The second cycle advance will be paid in CCC-6's after May 15, 1989. Payments of less than \$200.00 will be issued in a check.

HOLIDAY

If you are working for the government, you can get information about anyone or anything in hours, but if you are an ordinary citizen, you can wait years—and many do. Do you think that's fair? Many people who don't think there should be such a double standard are writing their legislators in support of speedy release of information under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

Since its passage in 1966, the FOIA has been used hundreds of thousands of times by scholars, journalists, historians, churches and everyday people to remove the cloak of secrecy from government

The press has used the act to expose everything from wrongdoing in the executive branch to mere ineptness in the conduct of government; from revelations of child abuse at the U.S. Military Academy day care center at West Point to the disclosure by the Church of Scientology that the government had conducted chemical and biological tests on unsuspecting citizens.

In the last few years, the government has come under increasing attack by critics who contend it has sought to weaken the act's disclosure provisions. Among other things, critics cite changes made at the be

hest of the Justice Department in 1986 that expanded the government's ability to withhold certain law enforcement information.

Rep. Gerald Kleczka, D-Wisc., is expected to reintroduce a bill that, among other things, would require the government to reveal wrongdoing while preserving its ability to maintain the confidentiality of legitimate law enforcement records. A number of groups, including the Society of Professional Journalists, People for the American Way and the Church of Scientology, likely will resume a campaign to remove many of the barriers that have blocked the speedy release of information under the FOIA.



Texas A&M scientists devise method to convert methane to ethylene


COLLEGE STATION — Scientists have developed a catalyst to directly convert the main component of natural gas into ethylene, a chemical currently in short supply but widely used in a number of everyday products from plastic bags to milk jugs.

The process, developed at Texas A&M University, could lead to more plentiful supplies of ethylene by transforming methane from natural gas into ethylene currently derived from petroleum.

Ethylene, now in short supply, is an important basic ingredient for a number of industrial products, particularly the plastics that go into items ranging from polyethylene wrappers and milk jugs to running-shoe soles and chemical products such as ethyl glycol antifreeze.

M-44 CERTIFICATION PREDATOR ANIMAL CONTROL SCURRY-BORDEN COUNTIES

A training meeting to certify individuals interested in the M-44 predator animal control device will be offered Thursday, May 11, 1989, 8:30 - 11:30 a.m., Room B, in the Scurry County Coliseum, Snyder, Texas.

The M-44 is a patented spring operated device used with a toxicant to control covotes. A fetid or "rotten" bait is used with the device to attract the coyote. When the animal tries to pull the bait from ground the spring

ejector releases propels powdered cyanide salt into the animals mouth. This causes no pain and is of such nature that the animal dies quickly. It is the most humane device yet developed for covote control and is much less hazardous to humans or livestock than other devices.



On March 14, 1989, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application which proposes to revise its Toll Restriction Tariff in Section 21 of the General Exchange Tariff. The Commission received the application as Docket No. 8700.

The application proposes to reduce the monthly rate for Toll Restriction residence service from the current \$15 a month to \$5 a month per residence access line. This proposed application will affect approximately 2,487 residence customers who presently subscribe to toll restriction. It is estimated that the proposed rate schedule will reduce the Company's annual revenues from this service by approximately \$298,000, which is less than one percent of the Company's total intrastate revenues. If the application is approved, the effective date of the rate reduction will be set according to the Commission's Order.
