## Harvest Of \$6 Million Cotton Crop Nears End In County

Harvesting of Hall County's six million dollar cotton crop is almost finished, with only a very few bales left yet to be harvested. A final survey of the 14 Hall County gins showed that 47,768 bales have been harvested.

K. E. Voelkel, officer in charge of the USDA Cotton Classing office here, announced today that the office is closing for the season at 5 p. m. today.

Voelkel said that 166,000 samples were classed by the office this season from the 57 gins in the 18 county area the office serves. Last year, the office classed 213,000 samples.

The office opened on October 5 this year and is closing on Jan. 21. Last year the office opened on Sept. 30 and closed on Jan. 20.

Mr. Voelkel explained that 56 of the 57 gins subscribed to the micronaire service offered by the office this season.

Season figures on the cotton samples classed for the year were as follows:

Quality — predominate quality was light spotted, with 24 percent Middling Light Spotted and 24 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. Three percent of the cotton was reduced in grade due to micronaire service offered by the excess bark.

Staple — The predominate staple length for the harvest was 15/16 of an inch which included 65 percent.

Micronaire — Seventy-four percent of the cotton classed fell into the desirable range of 3.5 to 4.9 on the micronaire scale.

Fiber Strength — The Presley fiber strength reading for cotton classed at the Memphis Cotton Classing Office was the highest (Continued on Page 12)

In the girls game, the final score was 32 to 27 in favor of the green and white. Tommie Payne scored 16 for Lakeview and Cheri Rapp scored 16 for Estelline to be the top scorers.

In the boys game, Ronald Mullin scored 13 points in leading his team to a 44 to 32 victory over Lakeview. Kirby Hatley was leading scorer for the Eagles.

Quitaque teams still hold the top spots in District 12-B after the week's play. Last Friday night they won a pair of games from Lakeview teams. In the girls contest, Quitaque won 35 to 28. Tommie Payne was high point girl, with 21, while Pat Brenson made 15 for the winners.

In the boys game, in the closing minutes, Quitaque boys rolled up a big lead to win the contest 70 to 56. The third quarter score was 42 to 37 and midway in the final stanza Lakeview lost two of the starters on fouls. Kirby Hatley was high point with 15 for Lakeview, while Eddie Munk scored 24 points.

## Turkey FFA Project Show To Be Held Saturday At School Bus Barn

The Turkey FFA Project Show will be held Saturday, Jan. 23, at the School Bus Barn, according to an announcement made this week.

Classes will be set up for fat barrows, gilts and sows. Approximately 30 animals are expected to be entered in the show. All animals must be in place by 9:00 a. m. Saturday.

The FFA Chapter members will compete in a judging contest Saturday morning. Classes for the contest will include gilts, barrows, ewes and bulls. The judging contest is expected to draw some 30 to 35 entrants with medals and ribbons to be given to the top five individuals.

This is the first show to be held in Turkey since 1959 and every effort is being made to re-establish the event on a yearly basis, it was announced. The trophies and ribbons are being presented by Memphis Compress, Turkey Farmers Co-Op Gin, West Texas Gin, Pastmaster Gin and Setliff Elevator.

## Poll Tax Sales Number 550

Approximately 550 poll taxes had been paid this week, about one-fourth of the number purchased last year, Mrs. Melissa Anderson, tax assessor-collector, reported.

Mrs. Anderson reminded county citizens that they have next week in which to purchase poll tax receipts from her office in the Courthouse at \$1.75 each.

To be an eligible voter if you are between the ages of 21 and 60 in any city, school district, county or state election, a poll tax is required.

Mrs. Anderson said that county residents over 60 do not have to have a poll tax exemption certificate. This is a requirement in cities over 10,000 population only.

## EDITORIAL

### Pay Your Poll Tax!

It's happened again. Citizens of Hall County seem to think that the only time they need a poll tax is during a presidential year or any other national election year.

But this isn't necessarily a true assumption. Many are the times that more tax increases are voted upon during off election years than during the years when a large majority have purchased poll taxes. These elections are as important, or in some instances more important (as far as the community and county are concerned) as the national and state elections.

A trip to the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office Monday revealed that only one-fourth of the poll taxes have been purchased—if the same number makes the purchase this year as last. The number was 510 receipts sold. That means that in any election called in Hall County, or any school district or city, in Hall County, there are only 510 persons between the ages of 21 and 60, who are eligible voters. Now, all those over 60 are exempt, and Hall County has its share of those over 60.

We feel that there will be less than 1,000 receipts sold this year, which is much less than half of the voting strength of our county. The deadline being only eight days away to make the purchases, it is doubtful that many will take the necessary precautions to plow down the required \$1.75.

Seldom is there a year that passes when a bond issue is not called for. However, even if the poll tax was not used for this, it is necessary for voting in the annual school board elections and city council elections, or any special election that might be held.

We urge all residents of Hall County who are between the ages of 21 and 60 to make the necessary purchases and become eligible voters. Majority rule is the basis for democracy; and how can we have a majority vote if only a few are eligible to cast votes?

### Law Breakers On Increase

One of the most interesting and significant end-of-the-year figures we have seen is the figure acquired at Hall County Courthouse from court records—the total fines paid in the two Justice of Peace courts and the County Court.

The figure is by far the largest in Hall County's history, \$40,736.00. A discussion with Hall County sheriff's office personnel, along with highway patrolmen, revealed that major crime, felony cases before the grand jury, declined during the year, but all other offenses skyrocketed during 1964.

The major bulk of the fines and court costs were paid in Justice courts on traffic violations, especially offenses of the trucking laws. But this did not mean that all other misdemeanors or crimes were not on the increase. Sheriff Elmer Neel said that County Court had a busy year as did the J. P. Courts on all types of offenses.

Sheriff Neel said felony crimes were behind last year's number and that this was one fact for which everyone can be thankful. Sheriff Neel said the highest figure prior to this year in total number of fines was somewhere in the neighborhood of \$22,000. This year's figure is almost double that.

Citizens are encouraged by local law enforcement officers as well as highway patrolmen to observe traffic laws, and avoid violations of all laws. Laws are made to protect human lives and property. To be effected they must be enforced.

It's a well-known fact that in those localities where traffic laws are enforced, wrecks and injuries decrease. Citizens should insist upon strict enforcement.

#### Standing Room Only

Back when we were in college we studied the "Malthus Theory" of population, a theory first advanced in 1789 by Thomas F. Malthus of England, and at the time there seemed to be plenty of evidence that Malthus was all wet.

The Englishman said that the world faced misery, perhaps extinction, because population increases faster than the means of subsistence.

This occurs, he said, because population increases by geometric progression while the means of subsistence increases by arithmetic progression.

In case you have forgotten what the difference is between arithmetic progression and geometric progression, it is quite a difference. In arithmetic progression it goes 2, 4, 8, 16, 32, 64, 128, etc. In geometric progression, it goes 2, 4, 16, 32, 64, 128, etc.

So if Mr. Malthus was right, it can easily be seen that if people are multiplying that much faster than their supply of food, eventually there will be trouble ahead. Lately there has been much talk about our "population explosion," and because of this geometric progression factor, people are causing problems in most parts of the world by just being too numerous.

Due to medical advances, the world death rate is now much lower than it has ever been while the birth rate is about the same.

This causes more people. In fact, the population of the world grew 1 per cent a year before 1900. Now it is growing over 2 per cent.

World population was held down in early days by war, famine, disease. These things have been reduced, especially disease. Back in the 1940's, when we studied the Malthus theory, it was pointed out that where his theory was all wet was that modern methods and research in agriculture had enabled the world's farmers to produce food in greater quantities than ever dreamed of in Malthus' time, thus his theory was out of balance.

But in recent years he has been proved right. Experts in every country are worried about the population explosion. One expert, Dr. Raymond Ewell, vice president for research for the State University of New York, says that the world is on the threshold of the biggest famine in history. Not America, but the three poor continents of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

He foresees famine of serious proportion in India, Pakistan and China in the early 1970's followed by Indonesia, Iran, Turkey, Egypt and several other countries within a few years and then followed by most of the other countries.

As the Constitution prescribes, the President will say, "I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States and will to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States." Let no enemy of our system believe that these words are mere formality; they are sanctified for the people as for the Presidents who say them. The armor of the United States is its Constitution, binding its people in unity and liberty, and the words of the oath are part of the Constitution. The armor is welded by its guarantee that free men shall choose their leaders. For this reason, Inauguration Day is as much a day on which the American people honor themselves and their forefathers as it is a day on which we honor a President.

Not a minute's walk from my office is the intersection of New Jersey Avenue and C Street, S. E. From a house at this intersection, on March 4, 1801, Thomas Jefferson walked the two blocks to the

new Capitol building to be administered the oath. Jefferson's 1801 inaugural was the first held in Washington. His entrance to the Capitol was punctuated by "a discharge of artillery." Addressing the Congress and the crowded house gallery, Jefferson said:

"I know, indeed, that some honest men fear that a republican government can not be strong, that this Government is not strong enough; but would the honest patriot in the full tide of successful experiment, abandon a government which has so far kept us free and firm on the theoretic and visionary fear that this Government, the world's best hope, may by possibility want energy to preserve itself? I trust not. I believe this, on the contrary, the strongest government on earth. I believe it is the only one where every man, at the call of the law, would fly to the standard of the law, and would meet invasion of the public order as his own personal concern. Sometimes it is said that man can not be trusted with the government of himself. Can he, then, be trusted with the government of others? Or have we found angels in the forms of kings to govern him? Let history answer this quest."

History has answered Thomas Jefferson's question. History also will note that following the 1965 Inaugural ceremony, as on March 4, 1801, "the remainder of the day was devoted to festivity; and at night there was a pretty general illumination."
