Six Still Hospitalized As Result Of Wreck Sunday

Six persons are still hospitalized as the result of a two-car wreck before the Lesley Baptist Church on Highway 256 Sunday afternoon at 5:55. The wreck sent 11 persons to the hospital.

Placed on the critical list were Mrs. D. C. Hall of Lesley and Mrs. Juanita Wall of Plainview. Mrs. Hall was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Mrs. Wall is a patient of Hall County Hospital.

Also taken to the Amarillo hospital was Carolyn Wall, 11-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe S. Wall, a passenger in the fam-

ily car, who is still hospitalized. Still hospitalized here, besides Mrs. Wall are Mr. Joe Wall and daughter Nancy, and Mr. C. D. Hall of Lesley, who is listed in serious condition.

Hospitalized following the wreck but having been released this week were Patricia Ann Wall, 16, Joan Ellen Wall, 15, and Larry Wall, 12, all children of Mr. and Mrs. Wall.

Treated for minor injuries but not hospitalized were two passengers in the Hall car, Lucy Leger of Bonham and Charles D. Thomson of Ector, Texas. These two men have been working on Mr. and Mrs. Hall's new home which is under construction.

Investigating officer, Highway Patrolman Don Collins said the wreck occurred when the Hall car, which was traveling east on Highway 256, driven by D. C. Hall, attempted to make a left hand turn into the church parking lot and was hit almost head on by the Wall car.

Shortly after the wreck, a fire broke out in the Hall car and the 1961 Chevrolet was completely gutted by fire. Damage to the Wall car, a 1962 Plymouth, was also extremely heavy.

Firemen were summoned from Memphis to extinguish the cars and the burning highway. The accident is considered to be one of the worst in this area in many years with nine persons hospitalized.

School Board Calls Election For April 3

The board of trustees of the Memphis Independent School District called for the regular trustee election to be held Saturday, April 3, in the Council Room of the Municipal Building for the purpose of filling two positions on the board.

The terms of Lawrence Kenon and R. B. Phillips are expiring. Superintendent of Schools Shannon Doss announced that he had received a petition requesting that the names of Lawrence Kenon and R. B. Phillips be placed on the ballots for re-election.

The deadline for filing names to be placed on the ballot is March 3, he said. Absentee balloting will take place in the Hall County Clerk's office.

The trustees appointed Thomas Clayton to serve as election judge and Mrs. Claud Johnson, Mrs. Lloyd Phillips and Mrs. Jack Boone to serve as clerks.

The trustees handled several other items of business at their Monday night meeting.

Probably one of the most significant motions passed concerned compliance with the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare regulation, under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P. L. 88-352) effective Sept. 1, 1965. Supt. Doss explained that this will be at the conclusion of present contracts.

The board approved the extension of the principals' contracts another year onto their present contracts. Those affected were C. E. Voyles, High School; Charley Chambless, Junior High; Mrs. Brunetta Morris, Austin; and Miss Ethel Hillhouse, Travis. The board also voted a \$500-a-year increase in salary for Principal Chambless.

Supt. Doss reported to the board that the final count on the 1965-66 census roll totaled 1,055, a gain of 12 over last year's census figure of 1,043.

"We will have a total of 837 white students and 218 colored students, the census showed," he said.

Supt. Doss explained that plans

now call for the Memphis School building to be open for Public School Week the night of March 2nd. Any additional plans will be announced later.

Supt. Doss also reported that an in-service training class is now in progress for teachers in grades one through six, and is being conducted by Clifford Bradshaw. The 12-hour course is designed to provide needed information to elementary teachers concerning the modern math program, which will be taught next year in the elementary grades.

The board approved the 1965-66 bus routes and heard a report on this year's transportation figures.

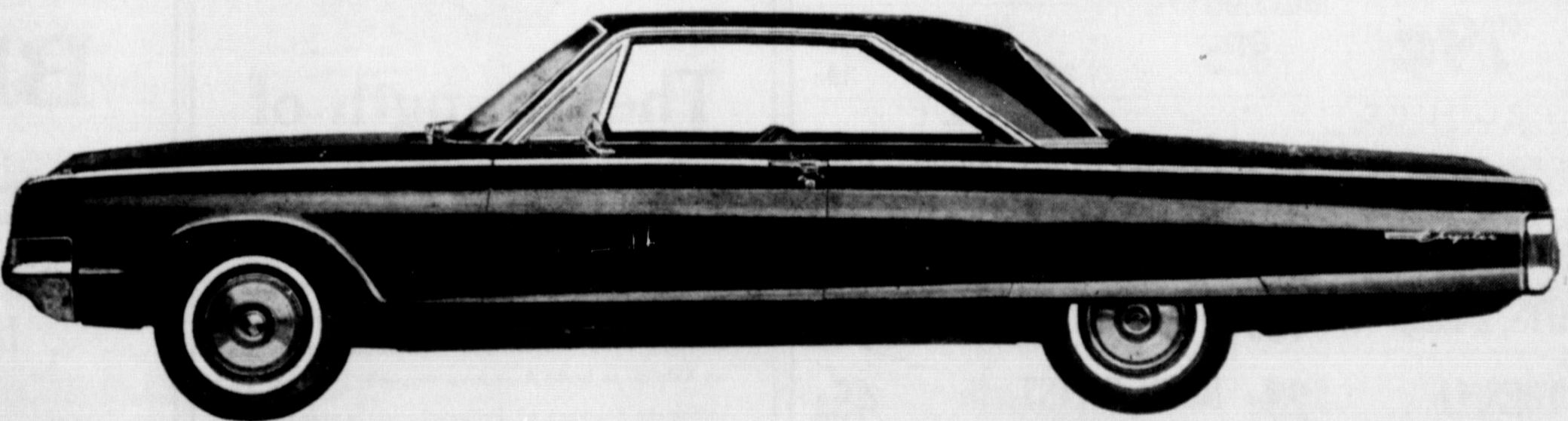
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F. H. A. Chapter Entertains With Best Beau's Banquet

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W. S. Heatly Introduces Bill to Increase Pay For School Teachers

State Representative W. S. Heatly last week introduced a bill embodying Governor John Connally's recommendations for teacher pay increases. He stated that over one-third of the total membership of the House had signed the bill as co-sponsors.

"I want to emphasize that this is a pay raise for teachers—not a delaying tactic, not a roadblock to anyone, and not an idle gesture," Heatly stated. "It is a bill designed to promote public education in Tennessee by attracting and retaining experienced and skilled career teachers through higher salaries and a continuing program of financial advancement."

"The sponsors are confident that our bill will have the support of thoughtful educators who realize that Texas should attempt to correct first the great inequities in salaries paid for experience and teaching."

According to Heatly, there has been considerable misinformation distributed about this pay plan. To clear the record, he said, these points should be noted:

1. In minimum salary increases, the bill provides \$40,200,000 for the biennium, of which \$32,160,000 is state funds and \$8,040,000 is local fund assignments.
2. It provides \$2,400,000 in state funds to the teacher retirement system as a result of the in-

creased salaries.

3. It provides \$10,000,000 in state funds for additional selective salary increases if matched by the local districts.
4. It maintains the 80-20 ratio of state-local financing under the Minimum Foundation Program.
5. Whereas the state now pays the full cost of textbooks, the bill places this program under the Foundation program and its 80-20 ratio.
6. Whereas the state also pays the full governmental cost of teacher retirement (6% of total professional salaries up to \$8,400), the bill places this system in the Foundation program. As a result, the state share would be 4.8% and the local share 1.2%.

"These two changes in the Foundation program would, of course, increase local participation in public school financing by approximately \$20 million for the biennium. I would point out to school trustees, however, that textbooks and teacher retirement are as much a part of local school systems as teacher salaries, and there is ample justification that these costs be met on the same 80-20 basis," Heatly added.

"I point out also that Governor Connally, on the sound theory that local government needs additional sources of revenue if it is to meet its responsibilities, has recommended repeal of the state's portion of the Ad Valorem tax. This bill also provides free tuition during the summer session at any public college or university for a teacher working toward an advanced degree."

Hall County SCD Lists Report On Last Year's Conservation Projects

The Supervisors of the Hall County Soil Conservation District have released the following information concerning district activities and accomplishments during 1964.

The Hall County District has 1,032,888 acres of agricultural land and includes all of Hall and Childress Counties and a small portion of Motley and Cottle Counties. The District is subdivided into five zones with a landowner from each of these zones that make up the five-member Board of Supervisors. The present Board is made up of the following members: Wayne Hutcherson, Zone 1; Bill Bradley, Zone 2; Lee Scrivner, Zone 3; Ernest Rea, Zone 4; and Kenneth Ellis, Zone 5.

During 1964 the supervisors approved 72 new district cooperators on 46,262 acres. Complete basic conservation plans were developed on 101 farms and ranches covering 56,316 acres. A total of 73 farmers and ranchers revised their conservation plans comprising 37,247 acres. Out of a total of 17,454 district cooperators in the district, 1,166 applied one or more conservation practices during the year.

Following is the amount of the more important conservation practices applied during 1964: 17,628 acres of brush was controlled;

crop residues properly managed on 38,088 acres; grazing was deferred on 24,999 acres of rangeland; 10,064 feet of diversion terraces were constructed; 14 farm ponds were built; 24,450 feet of underground irrigation pipelines were installed; 1,042 acres planted to grass for tame pasture; 1,471 acres of rangeland seeded to grass; 532 miles of standard terraces were built and 7.5 miles of parallel terraces were installed.

Parallel terraces are gaining in popularity with landowners in the district as evidenced by the 7.5 miles built during the year. Parallel terraces are something new in the district and supervisors feel that this is a step forward in the terracing program and will continue to gain in interest among the farmers throughout the district.

Much of the conservation work carried out has been through the Great Plains Conservation Program. Twenty new Great Plains contracts were signed in 1964. This program has been a great help in getting needed conserva-

tion measures applied on participating farms and ranches. It is a program that provides financial assistance in applying conservation practices according to a systematic schedule to build a farm or ranch into a more stable operating unit.

The ASC Committees of Hall, Childress, Motley and Cottle counties were very instrumental in getting conservation work done through the ACP cost-share program.

Construction in the Kent Creek Watershed is well underway. All the detention dams except one were completed and construction is in progress on the channel improvement work below the dams.

A new Board of Directors were elected in Hall and Donley Counties Water Control and Improvement District Number 1 located west of Memphis. The directors are working toward getting this watershed back in an active status for planning and development of the project.

The district information program received very good support from the radio station and newspapers in the district. Their cooperation and help in informing the public of district activities has been an asset to the district.

is at work while the other one developed countries not only for humanitarian and Christian reasons, but because we are dependent on them for many of our necessities and because they may well be the key to the peace of the world. A tidal wave of revolution is sweeping over the entire nations as they demand emancipation from colonialism and seek to establish their independence. But self-government creates economic and social problems. Communism and the West are in a fierce struggle to gain advantage in solving these problems, the outcome of which will decide the fate of the world.

In discussing Changing Faces of Women, Mrs. W. C. Dickey stated that in the drive for racial equality, another equality battle may need to be cleared—that of

equal rights for women. We give praise for the women doctors, scientists, ambassadors, judges, and legislators, but we should constantly strive to break the barrier that prevents more women from holding high level jobs. This end, there is a Commission on the Status of Women in the United Nations and last year the General Assembly of the U.N. adopted a resolution underscoring the importance of women's participation in national development programs. Initiatives are being laid at various nations by women to discuss what they can do to help themselves. The daughter of Nehru of India said, "It is a great loss to a nation when women fail to have places on the policy-making boards of their countries."
