### Licenses Must Be On Vehicles Before Thurs.

Next Wednesday is the last day to purchase license plates for motor vehicles, Mrs. Melissa Anderson, Hall County Tax Assessor-collector, announced this week.

Motorists must have the plates on their vehicles before midnight, March 31, she explained.

The Tax Collector stated that her office has sold 1,391 car tags, 316 commercial tags, and 304 farm tags so far. "We still lack selling about 1,000 passenger tags and many commercial and farm tags," she said.

Motorists are urged to purchase their license plates for their motor vehicles as soon as possible. Sales have been increasing steadily and there is always a last-minute rush at the Tax Assessor's office.

Theodore Swift, 77, a resident of Hall County 62 years, died at the Hall County Hospital Sunday.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. Gene Jorgenson, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home. Graveside services were held by the Memphis Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Swift was born in Wise County and moved to Hall County in 1902. He married Laura Akers in 1917 in Hedley.

He had been a school teacher 20 years in Hall and Donley Counties and was county superintendent of schools in Hall County before he started farming. His farm was located one and a half miles southwest of Memphis.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church, the Garrett Memorial Sunday School Class, the Memphis Masonic Lodge, and the Memphis Garden Club.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Theodore, Jr., of Dallas; two brothers, Jim of Clarendon and Grover of Miles City, Mont.; seven sisters, Mrs. Esther Ingram, Mrs. W. A. 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## EDITORIAL

### The Tragedy Of Traffic Progress!

Possibly the greatest tragedy of modern man and the darkest spot on an otherwise steady story of growth in transportation is the continuing increase in traffic fatalities in our state. Traffic fatalities in Texas exceeded the 3,000 mark for the first time in history during the 1964 calendar year, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported.

Col. Homer Garrison, director of Texas DPS reported that the traffic death book for 1964 was closed at noon Monday, March 15, with a total of 3,006 fatalities on the streets and highways of Texas. "The total for last year represents a 10 per cent increase over the 2,729 lives lost in 1963," Garrison said. "Coupled with this tragic loss of life is the staggering economic loss of almost \$487 million."

One of the reasons for the increase in traffic accidents from 399,917 in 1963 to 454,762 during 1964 was the increase in the number of miles driven. The number of miles driven in the state increased from 52.3 billion in 1963 to slightly over 55.6 billion last year.

But the truly tragic aspect of the picture is that the death rate (the number of fatalities for each 100 million miles of travel) was 5.4 during 1964, compared to 5.2 during 1963. The 1964 figure was the highest death rate since 1957, when it reached 6.0.

And citizens cannot expect the picture to get any better. But we are reminded of the story of the man who was worried and heartsick because things were not going as he felt they should. A friend of his told him to cheer up, things could get worse. He cheered up and sure enough, things got worse.

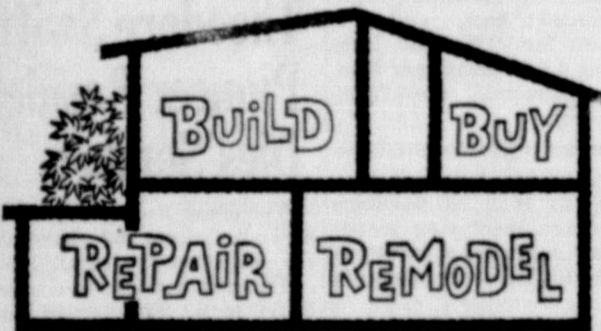
"We are well into the 1965 driving year, and statistics indicate that fatalities are far ahead of last year's tragic record. Unless each driver accepts the responsibility of operating a motor vehicle properly, we can only look forward to an even greater total of death and suffering for the present year. Col. Garrison said.

Garrison said that acceptance of responsibility and the resolution on the part of each driver to follow the rules of safety could aid materially in reducing tragedy during 1965 and the years to come.

Modern man has progressed in transportation to a point undreamed of by our forefathers, but with this progress has come death, injuries, and heavy property damage. Will we ever be able to reverse the trend of increasing death rates, year year? Not unless the driving public accepts the responsibilities. Only the driver behind the wheel can avoid accidents. We must remember every time we put the key in the ignition that the majority of accidents happen within five miles of our home, if we are involved.

### The Right Of Privacy

A trial in New York City has featured the playing of a recorded conversation in which three men counted and discussed money they allegedly were preparing to deliver as a bribe. The intended recipient, the prosecution charges, was an upstate mayor who had figured in national news a couple of years ago.

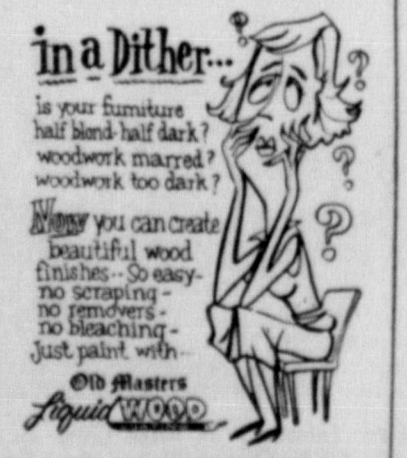
This sort of electronic evidence is becoming more and more a factor in court proceedings. To a still greater degree, where the results of wiretapping are not directly admissible, they give the police leads from which they are able to pick up offenders.

But obviously there need to be limits on police invasions of privacy. And the uses of electronic listening are not limited to the police. Manufacturers of concealed listening devices report an extensive market not only for official purposes (such as counter espionage) but also by private detectives and the security forces of commercial firms.

Careful establishment of the rights of individuals in this area is important. For "the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects" include security from wiretaps and hidden microphones.

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# Wind Damage On 20,000 Acres

Technicians of the Hall County Soil Conservation District have time out recently to make a survey of wind damage and erosion on Hall County farm land.

It is reported that approximately 20,000 acres of land in Hall County have been damaged by either the loss of top soil or siltation from nearby fields.

Approximately 400 acres of small grain has also been damaged by blowing soil. Most of the area that has been damaged was in cotton in 1964 and does not have sufficient cover to control erosion.

The control of wind erosion during severe drought is in the interest of the public and landowners alike, the technicians stated. Blowing soil endangers the health of everyone. It adds to the cost of maintenance of our public roads and public utilities.

Blowing dust also damages growing crops and pastures. Conservation practices to control wind erosion has been applied to approximately 490,000 acres of land in Hall County this year, the technicians said. These practices include cover crops, proper management of crop residue and surface roughening tillage on cropland and maintenance of a good cover of grass on pasture and rangeland.

The local Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Hall County SCD will be glad to assist in working out a complete conservation program for each farm and ranch that will aid in the control of wind erosion.

ty SCD is in condition to blow at the present time. This represents about one-fifth of the cropland in the county. Some of this land has been listed but does not have adequate clod forming material to control wind erosion.

Mrs. C. D. Morris introduced the program on Communications, the prospectus of which was "Dials, for selecting the best." Mrs. Morris stated that several types of communications were to be considered. The quotation from S. B. Morse, "What hath God wrought?" emphasized the telegraph.

Mrs. Bob Gordon brought a very unique and inspiring meditation, "God's Post Office", in which she compared the life of a Christian to a post office. One would hardly connect a post office with anything exciting or romantic, but through that little window come messages that change lives. Any day's mailbag may be packed with joy, sorrow, despair, or delight. A post office is not a source of messages; it is a medium. The post master does not keep the mail, but sends it out to others. Christians are post offices for God, receiving and conveying messages for Him.

Mrs. C. D. Morris' topic was "The Newest and Best in Books." She discussed various types of books, with special emphasis on books for children. She pointed out some things that parents and teachers can do to promote good reading in children. Some of these are make good books available to children, study the child and the book for the best selection, select well written and well illustrated books, identify with characters in books, develop the sense of wonder in a child, and take time to read aloud to the child. She discussed the awards which are made each year—the Newbery Award for the best story book, and the Caldecott

Award for the best picture book. She then displayed and read extracts from an award winning book from each group. A very colorful interest center featured a display of recommended books for children, new ones and old favorites with new faces.

Mrs. Clyde Smith very ably discussed "The Battle Over TV Ratings." She stated that the TV networks rating methods are the answer to how TV shows are chosen and why some of them disappear. The A. C. Nieson Service is the biggest of its kind, rating everything from light bulbs to TV shows. It is described by its critics as a five and dime method, and charged with being inaccurate, and non-representative. Letters of protest about ratings have little influence on network officials, who feel that they represent too few rating points. The chief rating method employed is that of the Audimeter which, when connected to sets across the country, is supposed to record a cross section of what the nation is watching. It records only that the set is tuned to a station, not whether it is being watched, or whether it is enjoyed or is hated.

Mrs. Rayford Hutcherson's subject was "Communications In Today's World." She stated that language is the most important element in any culture. It is one of man's most triumphant accomplishments. Yet this wonderful gift of language often goes unappreciated. We communicate in a world surcharged with tensions, whose very destiny may well depend on the wise and judicious use of language. To meet the demands of this Herculean task of communicating, man has set in motion countless machines and devices, such as the IBM machines. Still the individual is responsible for acquiring adequate word power for his own communication needs. Words move men to action. "Behind words lies meaning, and behind meaning lies life."

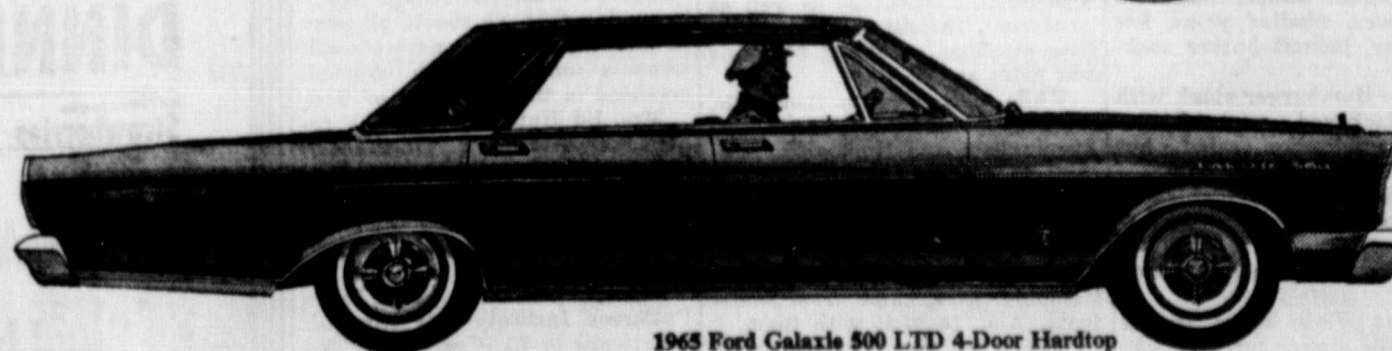

### Hall County District News Soil Conservation

A recent irrigation survey in the Hall County portion of the Hall County Soil Conservation District shows that approximately 19,729 acres are irrigated. All but 700 acres are irrigated by sprinkler method using 154 sprinkler systems. In 1958, approximately 8827 acres were irrigated, 8,177 acres were irrigated by sprinkler method using 110 sprinkler systems.

Sprinkler systems are well adapted to the conditions found in the Hall County Soil Conservation District. Sprinkler systems can be used on the more sandy soils that would be impossible to irrigate using other methods. They can be used on rolling topography where land preparation for surface irrigation would be uneconomical. Sprinkler systems are also well adapted where infrequent supplemental irrigation is needed to meet crop requirements. Sprinkler systems are also well adapted to the use of small supplies of water.

When properly designed, sprinkler irrigation systems conserve water because a uniform application can be applied where and when it is needed. The system can be designed where it will be necessary to make only one or two moves each day and release labor for other farm jobs.

Your local Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Hall County Soil Conservation District will be glad to assist you in working out an irrigation system that will meet the needs of your farm.

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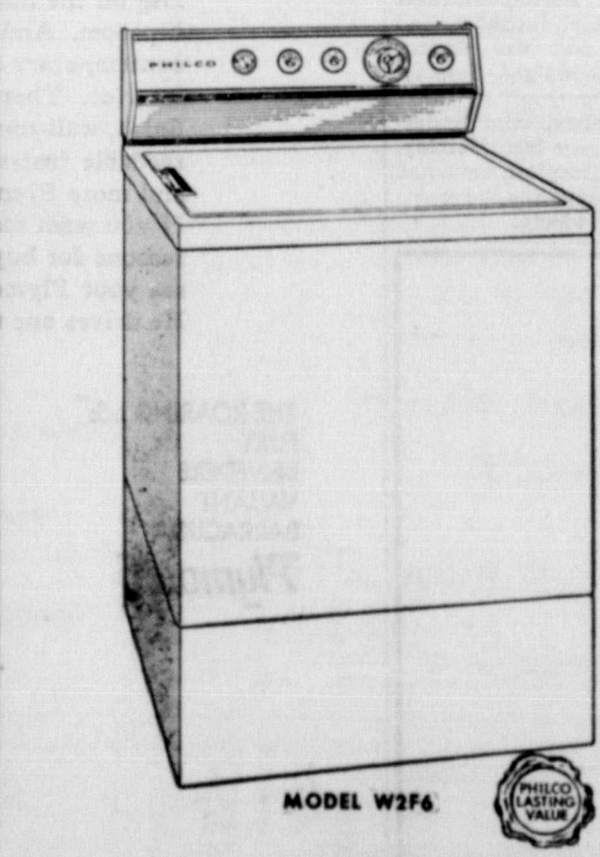
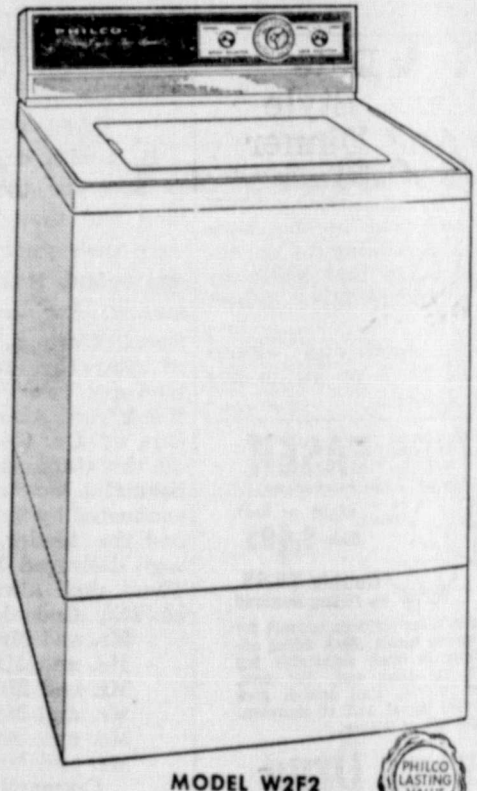
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### Report From Washington

**Improved Police Training**  
I have long believed that a police academy similar to our present military service academies would be of tremendous benefit to the police officers who are now being trained. It would take the place of their States and local academies in the fight against crime and delinquency.

Federal government owns the material, and equipment parts of this country that are excellent locations for training facilities that can be quickly transformed to meet the needs of such an academy. Amarillo Air Force Base eventually closed, as is anticipated by the Department, it could be one of the best locations for such an academy and would be ideally suited from the standpoint of available facilities, and this location, but also from the standpoint of the basic philosophy of freedom tempered with the discipline.

President's Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice, when appointed, assigned to answer this question: "Is the Nation as a whole providing adequate educational training opportunities for those who administer the laws?" The Commission's recommendation that a national police academy be established. Such an academy would benefit many who enter the law enforcement field to obtain education, better equipment for a career that could increase their earning power. It would provide a well-trained and well-law enforcement officials which the many counties, and municipalities as

well as the States and the Federal government could staff their law enforcement agencies. These men would be well equipped in many fields but would also be able to work in a coordinated effort with other agencies—national, State, and local—toward a more effective effort in suppressing crime. Men so trained would demand and receive the highest respect from everyone, including the criminals themselves, the latter being most important in good law enforcement.

There are those who would immediately cry, "National Police Force." No responsible person who believes in the democratic institutions of our form of government would advocate or support a national police force. On the other hand, they would welcome the opportunity to advocate and support a training program that would enable our democratic institutions and our form of government to be protected from crimes, delinquency, Communism, and other challenges and attacks upon the citadels of free men.

Since 1935, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has conducted the very excellent "FBI National Academy" here at its headquarters in Washington, graduating in the past 30 years some 4,000 police officers who attended one of the two 12-week sessions held each year. Graduates of the FBI National Academy are serving in police and sheriff's departments in the Panhandle. The purpose of the FBI academy had not been to train a large number of police officers. It has emphasized the training of experienced career men in the law enforcement arts so that they will return to their department capable of providing better administration and leadership and in passing a long, through improved training programs within the departments, some of the knowledge they have

I believe that the good work done by the FBI in its school would be vastly complemented by providing a training academy to school a large number of police officers new to the profession and whose work will be on the "beats" and in patrol cars before they may expect promotions into administrative ranks.

The fight against crime requires trained police officers. I feel very strongly that the problems created by crime and delinquency have reached the point in this country where affirmative action must be taken to provide better training.
