EDITORIAL Don't Be Confused!

Hall County has been blessed with bountiful rains, but many residents are alarmed about the ever-present danger of funnel clouds, which can appear at any given moment anywhere in the area. All of us should be concerned, because we have seen what a twister can do to a town. The pictures and eye witness accounts of the Hale Center disaster were earth-shaking and should be a lesson to all of us.

Memphis was in the path of three tornadoes that night. Because of this, a tornado alert signal was given. In order for our readers to understand the complete story of our local situation, we will discuss the events of the night of June 2.

Hale Center citizens were alerted by the Weather Bureau and the Texas Highway Dept. of Public Safety 20 minutes before the storm hit the town. The same night, both the Highway Patrol headquarters in Amarillo and the Texas Weather Bureau, contacted Sheriff Elmer Neel and reported that a storm cloud. containing three twisters was headed toward Memphis, and if it did not turn, Memphis was in the path.

Sheriff Neel said he was at the City Hall making up his mind to blow the alert when he received the second call from the Weather Bureau stating the storm, at that time was in the Quitaque area, was proceeding toward Memphis. Sheriff Neel blew a long steady blast on the siren to alert residents. Firemen of the tornado watch assembled at the Fire Station, and it was reported that the north siren did not sound because the power was off, so a second alert was sounded to alert the north part of Memphis.

Now, with most of Memphis awake, the telephone at the police station and fire station were tied up by local residents calling to see what was going on, and completely blocked this means of communication. Callers wanted to know if it was a fire or tornado alert. It was raining heavily and Memphis experienced a heavy lightening storm at this time.

The men at the City Hall had to rely on short wave communications with Amarillo to find out the progress of the storm because of the heavy, local traffic on the telephone system. Sheriff Neel stated that the watchers were informed that the system was turning and would pass between Memphis and Law has become Johnson's as well. Memphis men went out on the highways south of the city to try and spot the funnel cloud and report its progress.

Sheriff Neel said the men found and sighted the funnel within a mile of where the Weather Bureau reported their radar was tracking the system.
