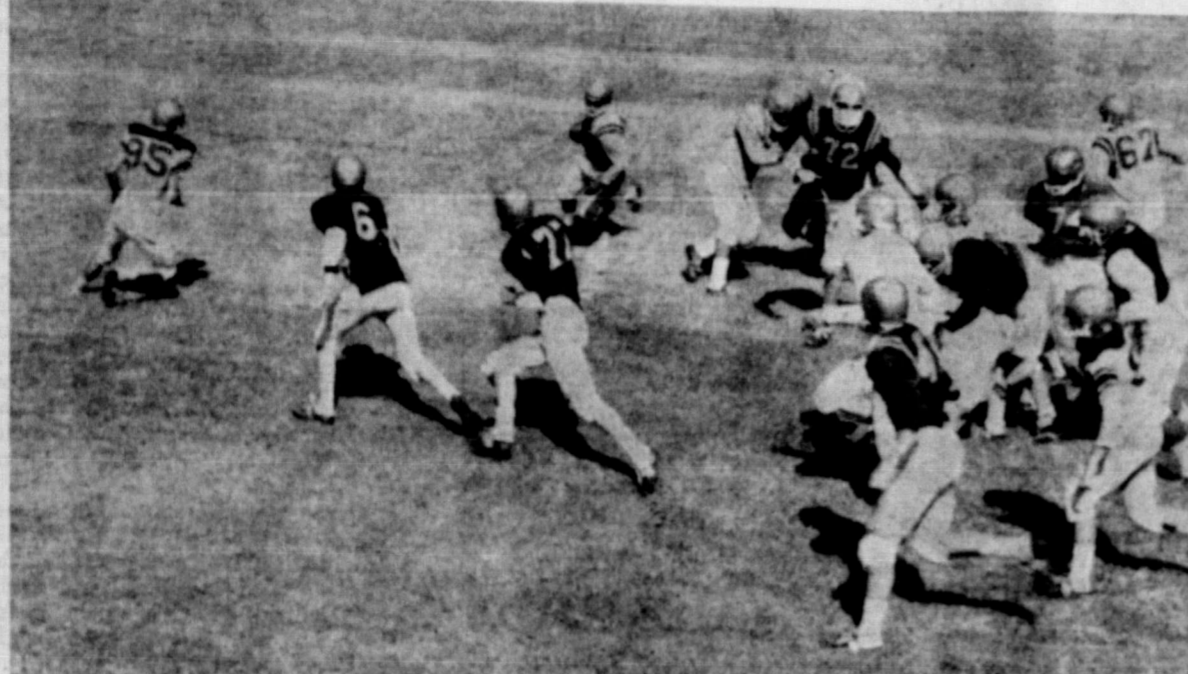
Turkey Schools Register Friday; Classes Monday

Residents Are Reminded Of Citywide Clean-Up

Members of the 1913 Study Club wish to remind Memphis residents that the September Improvement Program is drawing nearer, and much last-minute work still needs to be done. An official Clean-Up Week has been announced for Sept. 6-11 by Mayor H. J. Howell in conjunction with the beautification project sponsored by the club.

Mayor Howell urged all citizens to make a real effort in cleaning up their property, and said that city trucks would pick up trash if it is placed in the alleys. The Memphis Jaycees have announced that they will clean up along the railroad track through town as their contribution to the special week.

The Community Improvement Program was begun in the spring by the 1913 Study Club for the purpose of cleaning-up, painting-up, fixing-up, tidying-up and trimming-up the whole city in preparation for the 75th anniversary of Memphis and Hall County which will be held in September.

The city has been divided into six areas for competition, and outstanding blocks in the judging will receive a marker and mention in The Memphis Democrat. Prizes will be awarded to homeowners, with \$25 as first place, \$15 for second prize and \$10 for third place. Decisions for contest winners will be based on how much the home dweller does and what he had to do so that a modest home could win first prize as easily as a larger home with more space.

Ribbons will be awarded for honorable mention homes and for best kept alleys.

All yards and grounds in Memphis will be judged, club members stated, based on outside appearance of houses, yards, gardens and alleys.

R. Lockhoof Wins Local Golf Meet

Reed Lockhoof of Childress, a junior student at North Texas State University, turned in an even par round of golf in the finals of the Memphis Invitational Golf Tournament to remain at 12 over par for the tournament and to win the meet with a total 54-hole score of 216.

Lockhoof, son of Walter Lockhoof of Childress, is the grandson of Mrs. Flora Reed of Memphis and stayed with his grandmother during the tournament.

This is Reed's first tournament win, he reported, during his five years of playing golf. The tall Childress boy, who is one of the contenders for the North Texas State golf team, shot a 69 qualifying last Thursday, only to tie with Lakeview's Dana Gibson. On a 19th hole playoff, Lockhoof won the medalist prize.

Taking runner-up honors was Jeff Harp of Amarillo, who finished play with a total of 224 strokes, eight strokes behind Lockhoof.

Memphis City Champion Allyn Harrison, who was a top contender through the first two days of the tournament, ran into difficulties Sunday and came in third in the meet, shooting a 227.

Other members of the championship flight and their scores were: Mickey Daugherty 230, Sam Goodnight 232, Dana Gibson 233, Jack Norman 234, and James Bray 235.

Winning the first flight in the tournament was Gene Lindsey, Memphis golfer, in an exciting finish. Lindsey was trailing George Morey of Childress by two strokes into the final two holes of the 54-hole match. By paring in, Lindsey captured a tie with Morey, both with total scores of

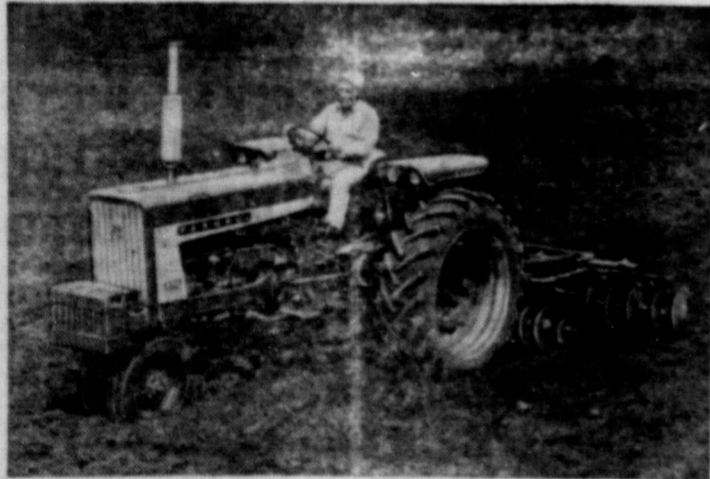

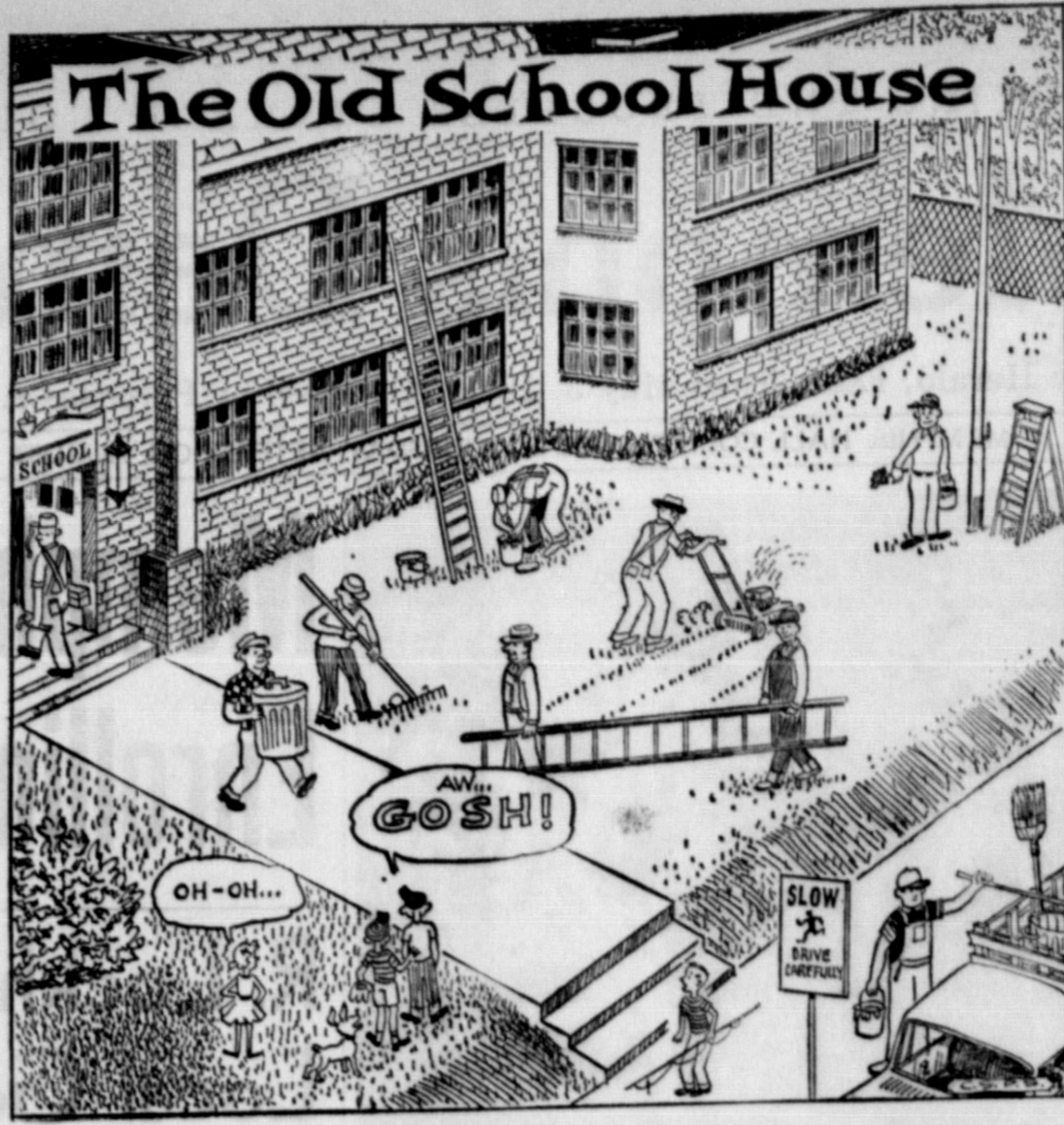

Flying Saucers

As far as we are concerned, we are ready to admit that there are such things as flying saucers.

During the past 15 years there have been many instances reported where people have sighted strange objects in the sky, things that were verified by other people, and still unexplained.

These objects were explained away by calling them optical illusions, balloons, ordinary aircraft, and the planet Venus.

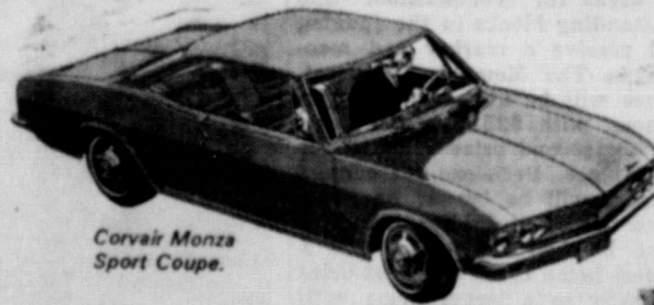

Wildlife Commission Releases Dates, Bag Limits For Fall Hunting Seasons

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week released a list of bag limits and seasons on the major game species in the Panhandle District. Some of the regulations have been changed so hunters should pay close attention to the regulations.

The Panhandle District includes Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Cochran, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Motley, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler Counties.

Following is the list of the bag limits and seasons:

Antelope—Open season shall be October 2 through October 5 by permit only. Bag limit one antelope per season.

Deer—Open season 2nd Saturday of November through November 29. One buck per person, or by permit only, one antelope deer may be taken on areas to be designated by the Park and Wildlife Dept. No person may kill or possess more than one deer taken in the Panhandle District.

Squirrel—Open season May 1 through July 1 and October 1 through December 1. Bag limit, five per day or in possession.

Ringneck Pheasant—Open season December 1 through December 7 in the Panhandle District. Bag limit, two cock pheasant per day and four in possession after the first day.

Quail—Open season, 2nd Saturday of November through January 31, except in Hall, Briscoe, Childress, Cottle and Motley Counties the season will open December 1 and extend through January 31. Bag limit, 12 quail per day, possession limit 36 quail.

Turkey—Open season 2nd Saturday of November through November 29. Bag limit, one turkey per season, either sex.

Hunting, Fishing Licenses Go On Sale Sept. 1

The annual scramble for hunting and fishing licenses will be eased this fall by earlier shipment of the permits to the approximately 2500 dealers throughout the state.

Bill Marks of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff, said arrangements have been advanced to have all licenses in the hands of dealers well before the new state fiscal year begins September 1.

The total consignment will comprise 775,000 fishing licenses and 736,000 hunting licenses of which 175,000 will be exempt hunting licenses.

In the past, efforts to make last-minute delivery to avoid conflict with the old license routine caused some inconvenience among sportsmen and also a sizeable problem for the harassed dealers, said Marks.

Marks wanted to make it clear that the new licenses will not be good until September 1 and that the old licenses will be invalid after this date.

The ordinary sports fishing license cost \$2.15 and the resident hunting license \$3.15. There are numerous exemptions, such as for those under 17 and older than 65 years. But in the case of deer hunting, these privileged persons need a special exempt license to provide the proper tags, which may be obtained for an issuance fee of 25c per license.

A Stratford resident 26 years, Mr. Hodges was born in Brownwood. He was a custom combiner and was a member of the First Christian Church.

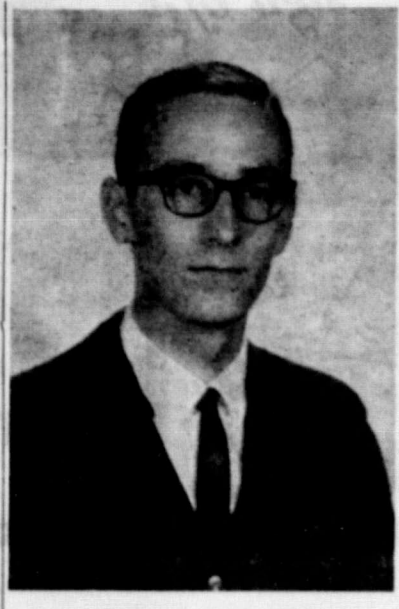

Memphis Families Take Canadian Trip

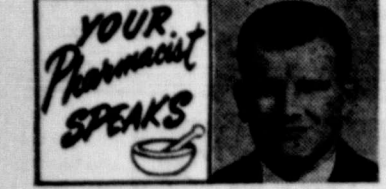

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Report From Washington

Lake Meredith Recreation Plan have received from the National Park Service its proposed development facilities for Lake Meredith. The report presents Park Service recommendations for spending \$1.1 million authorized by the Rogers Bill in 1963 to insure proper development at the reservoir. The plan will be reviewed by the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, with attention to be given by the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, which has jurisdiction over legislative projects such as that on the Canadian River. Construction will begin after approval, if any, are made following committee review and enactment.

Now, construction is completed on projects costing \$790,000. This amount authorized several years ago for access roads, boat ramps, and other projects to insure adequate access and accommodation of the public for fish and wildlife use of the reservoir. The \$1.1 million total provided by the bill enacted last year will provide supplemental facilities.

The National Park Service report presents in detail its plan for developing the eight designated recreation sites—Sanford-Yake, Blue West, Fritch Fort, Allabates, McBride, Plum

Creek, Bugbee, and Blue East. Work under the fish and wildlife authorization has begun at the first six of these areas; the new plan provides for completing these developments as well as providing initial developments at Bugbee and Blue East, both of which are located on the north shore of the reservoir not far from Sanford Dam.

Meanwhile, in Washington and Santa Fe offices of the Park Service a prospectus is being prepared for mailing to prospective concessioners who would make private enterprise investments in facilities at the reservoir. The bid invitations, I understand, will be ready to go out sometime this fall. The suggested concessioner program at Lake Meredith includes overnight accommodations; meal services; grocery or general store operations to provide camping, picnicking, fishing, boating, and sporting goods; souvenir or curio shops, transportation, boat rentals and sales; operation of mechanical boat-launching facilities; marina or dock operations; marine fueling stations; automobile and boat repair services, trailer park facilities—and, perhaps, a helicopter and small plane landing strip. Park service policy is not to suggest concessioner developments inside recreation areas when similar accommodations or services exist or can be developed by private enterprise outside the area but in the vicinity.

As an example of proposed development, the Park Service proposal affecting Sanford-Yake would be of special interest because this area is now perhaps most familiar of all to the general public. Thousands of persons have viewed the dam in stages of construction from the Sanford-Yake vista point high above the river bed. In this area, \$173,000 is being spent from the fish and wildlife allocation and \$155,000 is the proposed expenditure from the \$1.1 million authorization for road, launching ramps, parking areas, water supply, sanitary facilities, picnic area and other projects. An interpretive shelter (presumably containing a map of the project area and explanatory information) and extensive picnicking facilities are planned for the form overlook. The concession plan, when completed, may call for a concessioner-operated marina there. Another of the recreation sites already familiar to thousands of Panhandle residents is Fritch Fortress, also on the reservoir's south shore, a high peninsula providing a spectacular view of the lake and surrounding land. In addition to roads, launch facilities, picnic area and so forth mentioned in the report, the Park Service expresses the view that Fritch Fortress
