As most residents of Memphis and Hall County are well aware, our former neighbors and friends will be coming back to our home towns and county to visit in four weekends from now. What they find will have a lot to do with the impression left on their minds after the celebration.

The City of Memphis has announced that the week of September 6 through 11 is to be special cleanup week in Memphis. So far, however, few of the organizations have announced

publicly any plans for participation.

Mayor H. J. Howell has announced that the city crews will pickup whatever trash has been placed in the alleys during this special week. Residents are asked to burn as much of this trash as they can. The Memphis Junior Chamber of Commerce has announced a project of cleaning up along the railroad track for their part in the endeavor.

But what about other things which need to be done? Are we going to get the weeds cut down along the streets and even near the square before the celebration? Are our alleys and vacant lots going to be as trashy looking as they are now, or are we as citizens going to do our part, or are our organizations Flying Saucers going to put forth special efforts to answer this call to cleanup?

Admitted, Memphis looks better this year than it did last summer at this time. The cleanup campaign and the beautification campaign have already done much good work and a drive over Memphis reveals the fruit of much labor. To really enjoy the festivities we need to get our house in order. It takes a little hoeing, raking, lifting, burning and work but when you look back and see the results, you can tell your work is bringing forth much fruit.

Let's do our best to clean up our property before the celebration and do what we can to help those who really need help in cleaning up their property.

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

As far as we are concerned, we are ready to admit that there are Washington comes news from a government survey stating that such things as flying saucers.

During the past 15 years there have been many instances reported where people have sighted strange objects in the sky, things that were verified by other people, and still unexplained.

These objects were explained away by calling them optical illusions, balloons, ordinary aircraft, and the planet Venus.

But that evidently is not all of the explanation required. Just a few weeks ago a lot of people in the Fort Worth and Oklahoma City area saw flying objects in the air. 




