Harvest Figure Is 14,766 Bales

The temperature in Memphis and over most of Hall County dropped below the freezing mark last weekend with J. J. McMickin reporting recordings of 28 degrees on several nights at the official weather station. Along with the dry weather, this brought on the heaviest harvesting season of the season and boosted the county's ginning figure to 14,766, over 2,500 bales above the Dec. 3, 1964 harvest total. Light rain Wednesday stopped most harvesting as the moisture was just enough to wet the top of the ground and the cotton plants. Rainfall was measured at .04 here, McMickin said. A survey of the 14 county gins indicated that the harvest is get-

ting into full swing as some plants have been running around the clock. Indications were that most of the cotton was harvested from defoliated fields; however, farmers will begin stripping where the cold temperature has killed the plant growth as soon as possible. The USDA Cotton Clipping Office here added another classer Monday, John H. Holder of Waco. The office has classed about 43,000 samples so far as compared to 37,000 on Dec. 2, 1964, K. E. Voelkel, officer in charge, said. "This is about 20 per cent of our anticipated season," Voelkel said. Voelkel predicted, with good weather, his office would be in full swing by late next week. The results and percentage figures of last week's classing at the Memphis office is as follows: Cotton classed last week showed 27 per cent White grades, 65 per cent Light Spotted, and 8 per cent Spotted. The predominant grades in each of the color groups were: Strict Low Middling White, 14 per cent; Middling Light Spotted, 44 per cent; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 19 per cent; and Middling Spotted, 7 per cent. Each family in Hall County should have a family representative present at this tax educational meeting before starting the reports on income and taxes concerning the yearly income activities. Mr. Brints also announced that Hal Geldon of the Amarillo Social Security Office will have a representative of his office at the meeting to discuss the "Medicare" provisions under Social Security.

With the Estelline Bears football team playing in the Regional contest at Jacksboro Friday night and the Groom football team playing in another regional game it appeared that the Estelline tournament would have to be postponed but this is not the case.

Groom school officials withdrew both boys and girls teams from the tournament.

Estelline school officials announced that Estelline would enter two girls teams in the girls division and Memphis has consented to enter two boys teams in the boys division.

All Friday night games have been postponed, so instead of the tournament being a four-team round robin it will be straight elimination, playing for first, second and third places.

In the girls division, Memphis will play Estelline B at 4 p. m. Thursday afternoon. The Estelline A team will play the Lakeview girls team at 6:30 p. m. Winners will play Saturday at 7:30 p. m. and losers will play at 5 p. m. Saturday for third place.

Farmers Approve Cotton Marketing Quotas!

The nation's cotton farmers voted 94.8 per cent in favor of federal marketing quotas, price supports and direct payments on their 1966 crops. Hall County followed the national trend by approving marketing quotas by over 95 per cent.

Probably the newest wrinkle in the agriculture picture as far as cotton production is concerned is new legislation on the sale or lease of cotton acreage allotments within the county or within the state.

For the first time since the allotment practice was introduced in agriculture, farmers or land owners are allowed to sell, purchase or lease acreage allotments within the county boundaries. Texas counties voted in the referendum recently on the question of whether or not to permit cotton allotment transfers outside a county by sale or lease, and it was decided on an individual county basis. It required a two-thirds majority for passage.

Hall County, like most of the Panhandle counties, voted against this practice. Only 61 of over 250 counties voting agreed to permit cotton acreage to move outside the county. No allotments are allowed to be transferred across state lines.

Quite a bit of talk has been done about transferring acreage allotments from one farm to another. Primarily, however, the new law states that the period within which selling, leasing, or buying of acreage allotments must be done between June 1st and December 31st of each year. Farmers interested in this practice have until December 31st, 1965, to make whatever allotment adjustments they desire for the 1966 cotton crop. Lynn L. McKown, ASCS county office manager announced.

Under the new law, the USDA exercises no control over the price of the allotment. The cotton law penalizes buyers who obtain allotments from bare-to-the-acre land and move allotments to farms with better yield histories. One hundred acres is the largest allowable transfer.

McKown explained that a farmer who owns farms with cotton allotments in several counties in the state can transfer allotments from one of his farms to the other as long as he does so during the period of time specified, regardless of the vote of the counties in which his farms are located.

Considering that only 61 of Texas' counties approved out-of-county transfers there is little to encourage one to believe that the Texas Panhandle will end up with any great increase in cotton allotments because of the practice. It has been predicted that if all "unwanted" acres in these counties were moved into the Panhandle it would amount to less than a five per cent increase in the current allotment.

McKown said that allotments on soil bank land within the county boundaries can be sold or leased by the soil bank land owners under the new law so long as this is done by the December 31st deadline.

There have been no actual transfers of allotments in this county due to the fact that the projected yields have not been approved as yet by the State Committee as established by the Community Committees. Until the projected yields for the farmers are known farmers cannot figure lease or sale agreements. These figures should be available soon.

Due to the late passage of the Agricultural Act 1965, many problems of administration have developed and information about many aspects of the Agricultural Act are possibly not as complete as many would like. The 1966 cotton crop will be planted and harvested under the new cotton section of the Agricultural Act of 1965 with its price support payments, diversion payments and price support loan.

Unsung Heroes in Vietnam

War is always deplorable, regardless of when or where it occurs. But we tend to have greater sympathy for those who fought in Korea and now in Vietnam than those who fought in World War II.

During World War II, everybody was quite conscious that we were at war. Everybody was called upon to sacrifice, whether it be those who stayed at home or those serving in the Armed Forces.

Sugar was rationed here at home. Cars became unobtainable, good merchandise was off the market for the duration. Gasoline was rationed, it was difficult if not impossible to carry on a business because of the help shortage.

Fighting men, in most instances, felt that all Americans were in it together. Men in uniform felt appreciated. They were treated with honor when they were home on leave, when they were hitch-hiking on the highways.

But it was different when we were fighting in Korea, now in Vietnam.

We are not geared to a war economy. We are not psychologically and emotionally adjusted for war. We in the United States never had it so good. Our gross national product is highest in history and climbing. We experience no shortages, no rationing, no curtailment of travel. We see a man in uniform hitch-hiking and we couldn't care less.

Meanwhile those serving in Vietnam are making sacrifices just as great as those made during World War II. When today's soldier is wounded in Vietnam it hurts just as much as those in-

flicted on Tinian or Saipan. When he is killed, he is just as dead as those who lost their lives in Italy or on the Marshall or Gilbert Islands.

During World War II, the man in uniform felt that the war he was in was necessary and just. Strangely enough, those now in Vietnam feel the same way... despite the antics of the pacifists, nuts, draft card burners, demonstrators who charge that the war is unnecessary, those who contend that we have no business over there that, we are fighting a war that cannot be won.

During World War II there never was a time that one in service had any doubts about victory. Today it is different... no one

can promise an American soldier that we can win a decisive military victory. No country has ever surrendered short of internal collapse. Yet... we hear less complaining from those now in Viet Nam than we heard from those who were involved in World War II.—Tulia Herald.

Stotts is the first herdsman from the Southwest to win the award since it was established in 1958.

The award known as the John B. Brown Memorial Trophy is presented annually to the top herdsman working with Angus cattle. The committee making the selection basis the award on the herdsman's ability to care and select cattle, manner in which his exhibits are presented, his attitude, sense of co-operation and general behavior on the show circuit, reputation in his community, participation in local affairs and the excellence of his work with his cattle at home. The interest he shows in becoming an Angus breeder is also considered.

Stotts has been with the Bradley Ranch for nearly seven years and in that time he has shown 68 champions in four states. The get by Bandolier of O. H. 75, that Stotts fitted, won enough points to be named to the "Sire of the Year" by the Angus Journal in 1963. Another one of his top wins came in 1961 when a heifer he was exhibiting stood second in class to the International Grand Champion.

from harvest to harvest. Mao Tse-Tung and his Red henchmen have failed repeatedly in efforts to find answers to the nagging problems of gearing the economy to the needs of a rapidly growing population now numbering some 700 million.

In my opinion, Red China is now and has been the guiding light behind the conflict in Viet Nam. If and when this is resolved as a local conflict, there is no doubt in my mind but that Red China will foment and support another outbreak in whatever area appears to be most fertile for trouble at the time. Until this policy no the part of Red China and the Soviet Union is reversed, the possibilities of world peace will continue to be dim.

YOUR COUNTY AGENT SAYS

A light frost on sorghum or sorghum stubble regrowth may cause it to be a dangerous pasture for cattle. Sorghum plants under stress may have a tendency to build up prussic acid in the plant. Cattle can be killed by consuming only a small amount of this prussic acid, advises County Agent W. B. Hooser.

Sorghum plants or sorghum regrowth can be safely pastured within a week after the plant has been killed and there is no possibility of any regrowth from the crown of the plant. Most of the danger, says the county agent, comes from fields that have been partially killed, but on warm days make some regrowth.

Under normal conditions Sudan-grass can be safely pastured. During the fall when the plant is stunted by light frost, there is a slight possibility of a build-up of prussic acid in the plant. This seldom happens, but when it does, cattle that pasture on Sudan-grass can be lost.

Alfalfa should be completely dormant before pasturing in the fall. There are two reasons for this: (1) The fall growth should be left no as long as the plant is growing to store nutrients in the roots for the next season's growth. (2) As long as there is green succulent growth at the crown of the plant, there is more danger of bloat in cattle pasturing the alfalfa. After the plant is dormant, there is much less likelihood of bloat.

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
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Riding Club Organized And Officers Elected

method of harvesting were contributing factors to the percentage of cotton reduced in grade because of Bark. Two per cent of the cotton classed resulted in at least a one grade reduction, and this also meant 50 points or \$8.50 per bale penalty on the market.

Staple lengths showed 8 per cent were classed 29-32 inch and shorter; 65 per cent, 15-16; 17 per cent, 31-32; and 10 per cent, 1 inch and longer.

Micronaire readings were lower than last week with 70 per cent in the desirable range of 3.6-4.8 compared with 79 per cent the previous week. Other readings were: 2.7-2.9, 4 per cent; 3.0-3.2, 12 per cent; and 3.3-3.5, 14 per cent.

Pressley tests showed that the fiber strength of the cotton in this area was practically unchanged from last week. Eighty per cent of the cotton tested was in the grouping 80,000 pounds per square inch. Sixteen per cent tested 75,000-79,000 and 4 per cent were in the range of 70,000-74,000.
