Estelline Bears Capture Regional Crown Friday

The harvest of the 1965 cotton crops is in full swing in Hall County, a telephone survey of the 14 gins revealed this morning.

With a week's ginning of approximately 10,000 bales, the season total climbed to 24,741 bales ginned as of this morning, the survey revealed.

The 10,000-bale total is not a record ginning week for Hall County but it is quite respectable.

Compared to last year, the harvest of the 1965 crop is 8,103 ahead of a comparative figure of 1964.

The telephone survey also showed that some ginning points are caught up while others are as much as 200 bales behind.

Activity at the USDA Cotton Classing office in Memphis has been steadily increasing, and will be in full swing next week.

"We have received two additional classes, bringing our total to seven, and should receive another classer early next week.

Monday, J. W. Buchanan of New Orleans, La., arrived here, and this morning M. C. Hall of Greenwood, Miss., arrived.

As of tonight, the office will have classed approximately 60,000 samples as compared to 59,000 on the same date last year.

The quality of cotton classed last week showed that grades improved, the staple length and the micronaire readings decreased, according to percentage, while the Pressley tests were practically unchanged from the week earlier.

The most significant change in the grades was the increase in White cotton from 27 to 39 per cent, the decrease in Light Spotted from 65 to 57 per cent, and Spotted from 8 to 4 per cent compared with that of the previous week.

The predominant grades in each of the color groups were: Middling White, 12 per cent; Strict Low Middling White, 22 per cent; Middling Light Spotted, 41 per cent; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 15 per cent; and Middling Spotted, 3 per cent.

Staple lengths showed 9 per cent were classed 29-32 inch and shorter; 74 per cent, 15-16; 11 per cent, 31-32; and 6 per cent, 1 inch and longer.

The editorial and mechanical staffs of this newspaper wish to take this means of expressing a tribute to the memory of Mrs. J. Claude Wells (Pearl), who passed away Saturday morning following a stroke the morning before. Mrs. Wells was 84 years old.

At the funeral services Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist Church, many assembled to pay tribute. Rev. Gene Jorgenson, pastor of the church, gave a fitting eulogy in which he said that Mrs. Wells was motivated by love for her family, her church, and friends. The pastor said that only when one dies does those near them see their life clearly.

There was another side of Mrs. Wells' character of which most of her friends were not aware, and that was her deep love for this newspaper and the people who labored to produce it. This wasn't anything about The Democrat or anything in every issue she did not keep up with and pass judgement upon, either favorable or unfavorable.

When the staff put out an especially difficult issue, she would make a point of saying, "that is one of our best newspapers. . . I just don't see how you folks ever got it out."

It was through her personal appearances at the office throughout the years that endeared Mrs. Wells in the hearts of all those on this newspaper's staff.

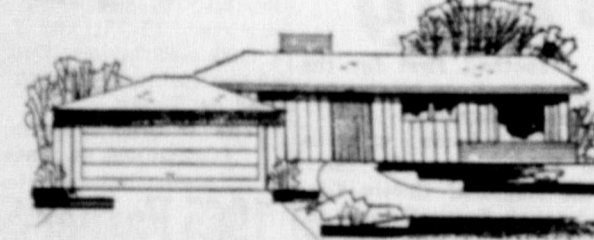

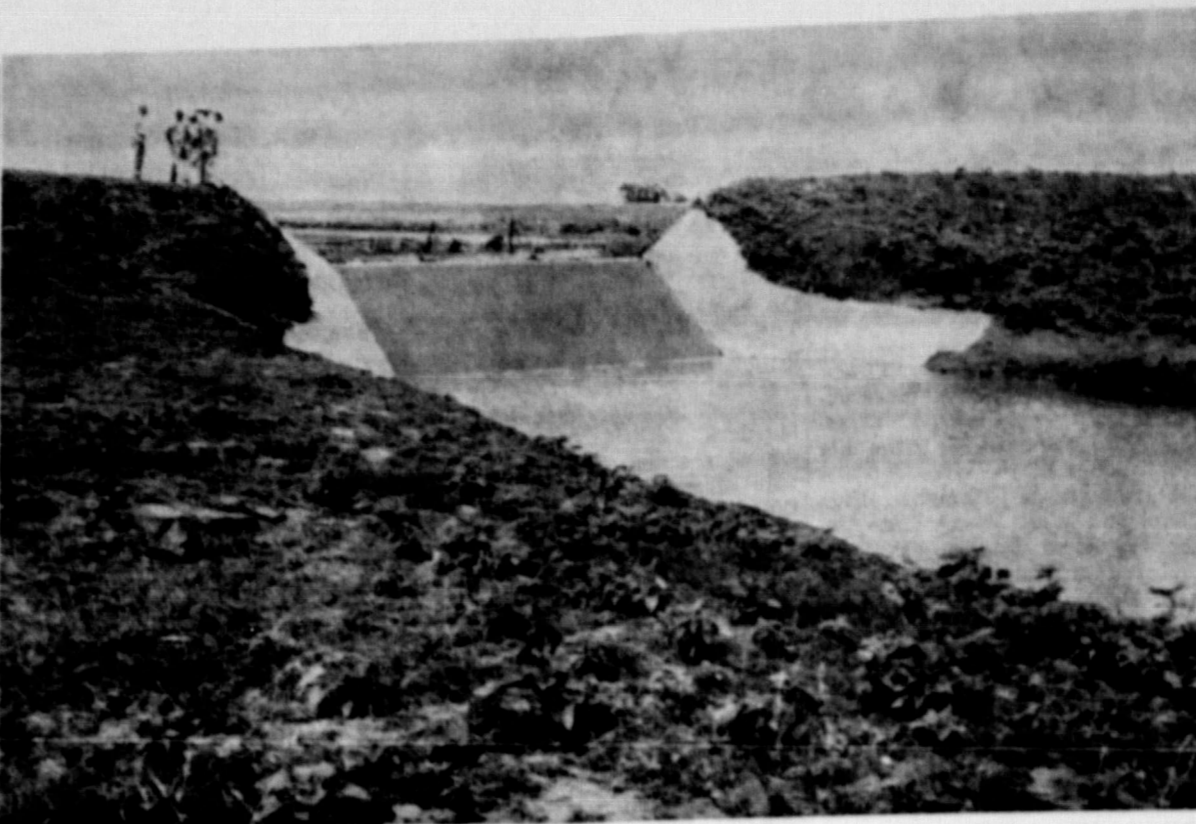

Postmaster Asks Please Address Letters Clearly

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. At Christmastime, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem, Postmaster Gene Lindsey said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered.

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of

poor wrapping or packing. Postmaster Lindsey urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

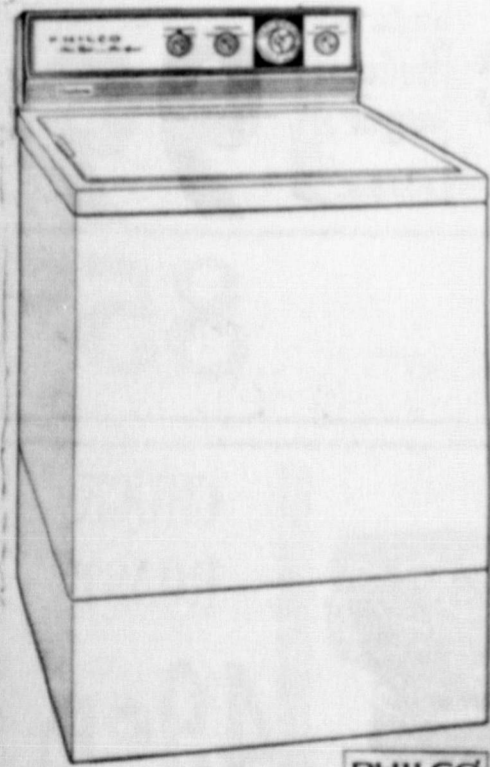

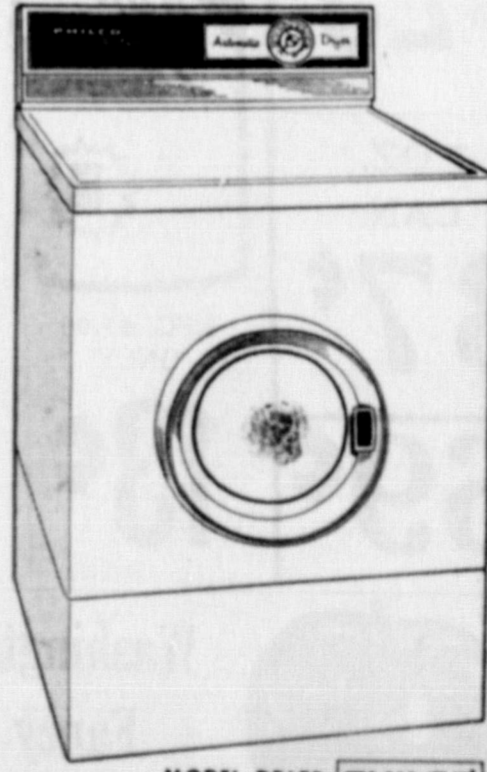

SCD Announces 4 Great Plains Conservation Contracts Are Signed

Cooperators with the Hall County Soil Conservation District signed four Great Plains Conservation contracts. The contracts were developed with the assistance of the local Conservation Service technician at the Hall County Soil Conservation District.

The Great Plains Conservation Program, Mr. Homer Tribble, is to construct a grassed waterway to take care of an outstanding problem. Mr. Tribble will construct a parallel waterway. His contract also carries out a complete plan on all of his

a part of a complete soil and water conservation plan worked out for his farm recently.

F. O. Ham of Turkey, Texas, plans to seed approximately 110 acres of native grasses on land converted from cropland. Approximately two miles of parallel terraces will also be constructed. This plan will assist Mr. Ham to convert his farm into a livestock farm.

Charley Brown and Jack Davis of Memphis, Texas, plan to smooth up some "gullied" areas, sprig bermuda grass, seed some native grass, control some mesquite brush and construct a parallel terrace system on the farm they recently bought. These practices will be cost-shared under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The Great Plains Conservation Program is a voluntary one. Its core is a complete soil and water conservation plan, based (1) on the soil, the plant conditions, the available water, and (2) on the problems and the needs of the individual farmer or rancher.

A farmer or rancher can get up to an average of \$2500 a year as the Government's contribution in cost-share payments for work on his farm or ranch. The cost-share rate varies from 50 to 80 per cent of the cost of establishing the conservation practices. The minimum contract period is 3 years, the maximum 10. The schedule of practices is based on what the producer feels that he would like to do each year. All practices may be completed in one year or scheduled over a period of years.

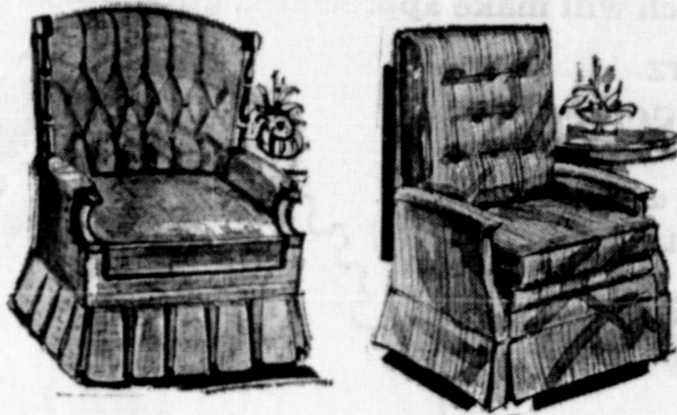

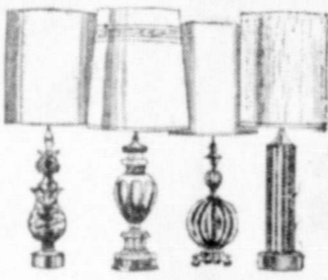

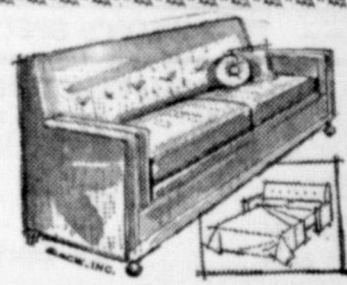

Fort Davis is a name well known to mule deer hunters everywhere.

It is in the Fort Davis area of Texas that the largest mule deer are found.

There is a reason, too. It is high country, surrounded by tall mountains and deep canyons. The valleys usually are verdant pastures of good grass. Browse on the sides of the mountains afford wonderful deer food.

Fort Davis itself is a small, quaint western town, with only a few residents except during the summer months when many tourists go to the area because of its historic background.

Now that group of tourists will increase, because Fort Davis has become a national historic site, established by the Department of Interior.

It is one of 18 such national historic sites. Uncle Sam, through an act of congress passed several years ago, acquired 447 acres of land from private interests. This resulted in perpetuation of the few remaining buildings, and restoration of others.

Fort Davis was established as an army post back in 1854. At that time ownership of the property was claimed by John James, a San Antonio surveyor. The fort was constructed as an outpost to protect the Texas frontier and early travelers heading west for California.

It was named after Jefferson Davis, secretary of war. Seven years later Davis became president of the Confederacy. Follow-

ing the Civil War the fort, which had been surrendered to the Confederate troops in 1861, was re-activated and reconstructed, on land leased from James. Buildings were of stone and adobe. Some of them still stand today, although portions of the roofs and walls have fallen.

Not too far away is the well-known Indian Lodge, operated as a state park. And only a short distance beyond is the famous McDonald Observatory, where scientists of the University of Texas and Yerkes Observatory study the moon and the stars.

But all the land between is a verdant game paradise.

Besides the mule deer, there also are whitetails.

Antelope play on the prairies and a few mountain lions are known to hide out along the high walls of the canyons.

Occasionally a bear sneaks into the country. In fact the only grizzly bear known to have been killed in Texas was taken not far from Fort Davis back in the late 1800's.

Between Fort Davis and Kent on U. S. 80 West, there are a few head of buffalo on the Reynolds ranch. It is a great quarry for blue quail and a few wild turkey of the Rio Grande species.

This is an ideal area for hunting with a camera. Rock-hounds also find many interesting formations in the upheavals that made the mountains.

Between Fort Davis and Marfa, on U. S. 290, there is the famous Bloys Encampment grounds, where every year the cowboys of the

area hold their annual reunion. It is profitable grazing area for sheep and cattle and is known the world over as the land of the Highland Herefords.

So, whether you hunt wild game in season, or are content to just look at the beauties of nature, you'll enjoy a visit to the Fort Davis country.

Ample accommodations are available at Alpine, Fort Stockton, Marfa and other places in the area. Or, if you are lucky, you may find a place in one of the small motels of Fort Davis, or even the Indian Lodge.

TAX REFORM

It is likely that Congress will continue to work on income tax reform in the Session beginning in January. Whether a cut will be possible is not clear. A cut in the rate of income tax, if made, would be the result of a bill which would increase the income tax exemption from \$1,000 to \$1,500. The original purpose of the exemption was to assist in meeting basic living expenses of their families, but the exemption is now out of step with the times and should be increased. All proposed changes in the law, I think this is the best for attention first.

Reduction of the income tax rate in 1964, which reduced the tax on American private income and corporations, is that tax which provides great incentive to private economy. Reduced taxes on capital for spending increased business capacity to increased consumer ability to purchase goods and services. This is an increase in economic expansion of the base on which taxes are levied and, thus, increased tax revenues. The

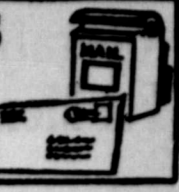
F. G. Freeden Serving With Navy In Pacific

Pressley tests reflected that the fiber strength of cotton was practically unchanged from last week, and that the results continued to be strong. Eighty-one per cent of the cotton tested was in grouping of 80,000 pounds per square inch and above. Thirteen per cent tested 75,000-79,000; and 6 per cent was in the range under 74,000.
