A pioneer Panhandle woman ho helped record the development of the area from frontier privation to today's space-age emire died here Saturday.

She was Mrs. Pearl Wells, wife of J. Claude Wells. Mrs. Wells was stricken about noon Friday at the family home in Memphis. She was taken to Hall County Hospital, where death occurred the folowing morning. She was 84 years

Though she was of a quiet and massuming nature, Mrs. Wells warm and understanding manner won her countless numbers of friends wherever she went in the more than eight decades she lived. An indication of the number are he many tributes to her since her

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Vineyard, she was born Sept. 17, 1881, at Dacula, Ga. The family subesquently came to Texas, homesteading land on the JA Ranch in 1892. The Vineyards later moved to a farm on the north rim of the Palo Duro Canyon, south of Claude, where they lived for many years.

Mr. and Mrs. Wells were married at her parents' home, Oct. 30, 1904. Afterwards, the couple journeyed to Hollis, Okla., where Wells had established a weekly newspaper about a year

crops is in full swing in Hall County, a telephone survey of the 14 gins revealed this morning.

With a week's ginning of approximately 10,000 bales, the season total climbed to 24,741 bales ginned as of this morning, the survey revealed.

The 10,000-bale total is not a record ginning week for Hall County but it is quite respectable. The weather has been ideal the past week and farmers have taken advantage of it.

Compared to last year, the harvest of the 1965 crop is 8,103 ahead of a comparative figure of 1964. It was almost Christmas last year before the county ginning figure climbed to the 25,000bale mark.

The telephone survey also showed that some ginning points are caught up while others are as much as 200 bales behind.

Classing Report Activity at the USDA Cotton Classing office in Memphis has een steadily increasing, and will be in full swing next week, K. E. Voelkel, officer in charge, said

"We have received two additional classers, bringing our total to seven, and should receive another classer early next week. This will bring our office to full operation capacity," he said.

Monday, J. W. Buchanan of New Orleans, La., arrived here, and this morning M. C. Hall of Greenwood, Miss., arrived.

As of tonight, the office will have classed approximately 60,-000 samples as compared to 59,-000 on the same date last year, Voelkel reported.

"We received 6,000 samples yesterday, and about 7,000 today," Voelkel stated.

The quality of cotton classed last week showed that grades improved, the staple length and the micronaire readings decreased, according to percentage, while the Pressley tests were practically unchanged from the week earlier.

The most significant change in the grades was the increase in White cotton from 27 to 39 per cent, the decrease in Light Spotted from 65 to 57 per cent, and Spotted from 8 to 4 per cent compared with that of the previous

The predominant grades in each of the color groups were: Middling White, 12 per cent; Strict Low Middling White, 22 per cent; Middling Light Spotted, 41 per cent; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 15 per cent; and Middling Spotted, 3 per cent. One per cent of the cotton classed was reduced at least one grade because of Bark and preparation.

Staple lengths showed 9 per cent were classed 29-32 inch and shorter; 74 per cent, 15-16; 11 per cent, 31-32; and 6 per cent, 1 inch and longer. One per cent of the cotton this week was classified as Wasty.
