## Eight County Athletes Win State Championships

Hall County athletes made an impressive showing at Austin last weekend and brought home three first place plaques.

Memphis golfers and Estelline and Turkey netters were among the state's top athletes at the spring meet.

The Cyclone golfers walked away with the Class A state golf championship by 26 strokes Saturday, playing at the Austin Municipal course which has always given local golf teams trouble. This is MHS golfers' first team victory at Austin.

The Cyclone, under Coach Charley Chambliss, totaled 336 in Friday's first 18-hole round and added 343 Saturday for a 679 total. Smithville took second with a 705.

## Vumore TV Cable System Now Has Audio Emergency Warning Facility

Subscribers of Vumore Co. TV cable system in Memphis who had their sets on Wednesday afternoon probably heard the new audio TV warning system in operation for the first time.

The system was completed Wednesday morning and checked out Wednesday afternoon, E. H. Pope, manager of Vumore Co. office, said.

Vumore's audio TV warning system signal originates in the City Police Station by the throwing of a switch on the Police's radio short wave radio set. When the switch is thrown, the Police's radio signal is broadcast on all three TV channels in Memphis via relay through the master unit located west of Memphis.

The system will be used by the City Police to notify city residents of any emergency situations, such as civil defense announcements, storm warnings and tornado alerts, or any other major emergency announcements.

Memphis residents were reminded that the fire siren signal for tornado alert is one long, long, steady blast on the sirens. Fire sirens modulate (go up and down in pitch).

Residents were assured that they will be notified via the audio TV warning system and fire siren signal of approaching tornado clouds.

The audio TV warning system has been installed at no cost to the City of Memphis, courtesy of Vumore Company, and was approved at the last meeting of the Memphis City Council.

## Republican Primary Attracts 31 Voters

In the Hall County Republican Primary election held last Saturday, 31 voters were cast for Republican candidates.

Since there were no contested races, all candidates on the ballot received 31 votes.

J. D. Buck was elected County Chairman of the Republican Party and Mrs. Mills Roberts was elected voting precinct number one chairman.

Receiving 31 votes were: John Tower for U. S. Senator, T. E. Kennerly for Governor, Kellis Dibrell for Lt. Gov., Robb Stewart for Atty. General, Rudy Garza for Comptroller, Lawrence Gilmer for state treasurer, Albert Fay for Commissioner of General Land Office, Jack Garrett for commissioner of Agriculture, Bob Price for Rep. in Congress, 18th District, and J. D. Tuck, County Chairman.

Congressman Rogers, who was presiding at a Lower Colorado hearing Tuesday, said, "Water-short areas must think now about their future and consider all possible means to alleviate problems, including importation of water from water-surplus areas elsewhere in the United States and adjoining foreign countries. There is simply not enough room for all of us to live on the banks of the creeks, but all of us must have water."

Rogers said "state responsibility cannot be avoided simply because the federal government is willing to help." He added, "The Texas Panhandle and High Plains should be included in the Texas state water plan."

## County To Have County-Wide Meet On Insect Control

The Hall County Insect Control board has called for a county-wide meeting for 8 p. m. Friday, May 13, in the County Courtroom.

The possibility of letting a contract for spraying in Hall County this year to prevent spread of boll weevils and also to control other field insects will be the major item for discussion.

The Board of Trustees, principals and teachers will be recognized in the ceremonies, according to the local Lodge officials.

State Senator Jack Hightower, Grand Orator of the Grand Lodge of Texas, will also be here for the ceremonies.

Grand Master Fullingim, a resident of Odessa, is an insurance agent now, but served 16 years as a well servicing contractor. One of his major duties as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Texas, A.F.&A.M., is conducting cornerstone laying ceremonies throughout the state.

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## EDITORIAL

### A Salute To Our Graduates!

Within the next two weeks, the four school systems of Hall County will conduct graduation exercises concluding the 1965-66 school year. To the senior of 1966, this has been the shortest year of all but probably the one they will remember the longest. These seniors have earned the diplomas they will receive by devoting 12 years of study in the Public School System.

This newspaper is publishing two special issues in salute to the graduates of Hall County. The Editorial Staff and Publisher would like to extend their congratulations to the seniors of all four Hall County Schools for making the sacrifice of staying in school until all requirements have been met and the diplomas earned.

Stop and think for a minute about the progress a student must make from the time he enters the first grade until he walks across the stage to receive his graduation diploma 12 years later. A first grader, with few exceptions, does not have the ability to read or write but usually can speak the language his parents speak at home.

It takes 174 days each year and 12 years to complete the Public School Education curriculum. The average student attends school 2,088 days and 14,616 hours to meet requirements for graduation.

Some students along the way, feel that the diploma is not worth the effort so they drop out of school. They left the halls of learning to enter the labor market or to seek other careers. To these, we would encourage that they do all they can to further their education.

The future of the citizens of our nation today lies in the knowledge and skills they acquire. Some say that future societies may be different, but one fact which was true in the early days of this earth is still true today... if you don't work you don't eat. Maybe there are a few silver spoon people in this world who do not work, but the number is so small it is not worth mentioning, even in this great land of plenty.

The 966 graduates have acquired many skills, some will go on to colleges and universities and acquire even greater skills and more specialized training. Others will enter the labor market and choose careers which take lesser skills.

Some of the graduates will be getting married, establishing a home and raising a family, and within a few short years they will be the parents in the P.T.A. and take their place in the business, social and religious families of our communities.

Sometimes a graduate runs head-on into problems he feels unable to cope with. He should seek the advice of his elders about the problem because many times talking a problem out helps to clearly define courses of action which are open.

The major problem facing all the 1966 graduates is plotting their lives from now on and making the decision of "where to go from here?"

We would make this suggestion to graduates. Set your goals high and make up your minds right now to accomplish your goals by working day by day and making the sacrifices to reach them. Many times, graduates fail to set goals for themselves and drift along from one job to another, spending every paycheck before they get it, only to wake up some years later to look back on wasted, spent years of no accomplishments.

On the other hand, they see their classmates who have set goals for themselves, reach these goals, and set new and higher goals. Great and wise men have said, if young people want to get ahead, they should make it a practice to do the best work they can and in addition, they should, as far as possible, always save a portion of their incomes.

Our graduates have proved themselves in the classroom as being able to meet the requirement and have reached their first goal, the high school diploma. Your high school career will be memories within a few short days, which you will recall many times throughout your life. Now the time is here to shoulder the responsibilities of citizenship, to seek a profession, to work for a better future and to begin living your own life.

The citizens of your county are all pulling for you, but in the final analysis, the decision to set and reach your goal lies in your hands.

### What Other Editors Say

#### Precinct Divisions

A couple of court cases, one at Dumas and one at Midland, has caused a lot of attention to be focused upon them, and the county commissioner structure of all 254 counties of Texas may be affected.

In each suit the plaintiffs have contended that county precinct boundaries are drawn arbitrarily and that these should be redrawn according to population.

The U. S. Supreme Court ruling of "one man, one vote" is cited as the authority for redrawing precinct lines.

In Ochiltree county, under the population method of commissioner precincts, the city of Perryton would have to be split into four precincts because most of the county population now lives in town.

Midland mayor Hank Avery filed a suit in district court asking for redrawing of precinct lines because Midland contains 98 per cent of the population but has only one precinct.

The Midland attorneys argue that equal representation is a cherished constitutional right and that if states have to redistrict so should counties.

Avery won his case in district court but it was reversed in the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals. It is now being argued in the Texas Supreme Court.

The defense argues that a commissioner court is not a legislative body in which all citizens should be represented equally. Commissioners courts are in fact an administrative body, even though all four commissioners are elected the defense contends.

This case is under way in Austin now. Whichever way the State Supreme Court rules, it is certain the case will wind on to the U. S. Supreme Court. When it gets that far, some sweeping changes will likely result.—Ochiltree County Herald.

**Farm Prices Soar**  
The land boom of the post-war era is having a re-run, and land prices are soaring.  
We were in Oklahoma last week on a Boy Scout camping trip and learned from the owner of the land where we camped that his place had been sold and he was moving. The owner sold his land for more than \$200 per acre, and we wondered how come.

This farm has 72 acres in cultivation, has a 17 acre cotton allotment and a 13 acre feed grain case. The rest is wooded grass which will run some cows and a few campers, but not much else. The entire farm had 160 acres.

How can this kind of land be worth more than \$200 an acre? Lots of farmers would wonder the same thing.

But farm prices are jumping. Demand for farm land has been the strongest in history for the past six months and shows every indication of getting higher.

#### Rod Storage

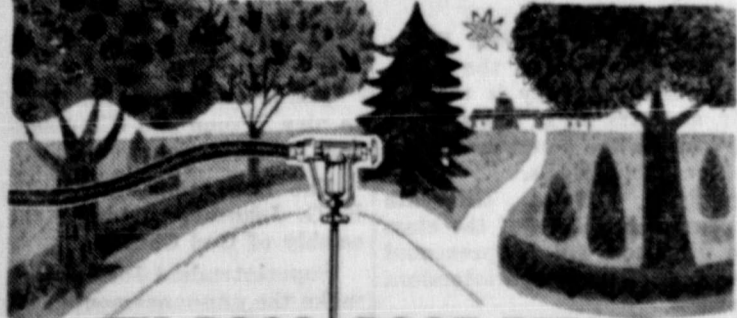

## Income Tax Q. And A. Column

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions about the new tax withholding system which became effective May 1, 1966.

Q. How many different withholding rates are there under the new law?

A. There are now six rates ranging from 14 percent to 30 percent. They are included in two tables—one for single persons and one for married persons.

Q. I am married and my wife works. Can we each take advantage of the rates for married couples on our withholding?

A. Yes. However, you may not claim your wife's exemption if she is taking it herself on her job.

Q. I always itemize deductions because I have high interest, real estate tax, and contributions. I'm always overwithheld and under the new system I will be more

overwithheld than before. Isn't there anything that can be done to minimize this?

A. The new law authorizes you to claim additional allowances for situations such as you describe starting next January. Instructions on this will be issued later in the year.

Q. Even with the higher rates not enough will be withheld from my salary. Can I still have additional amount taken out?

A. Yes. You can claim fewer exemptions for withholding purposes than you are entitled to claim or ask to have additional amount withheld. Arrangements for this may be made with your employer, as they have been in the past.

Each spring, operators of the Department's mowing machines are under orders to skirt patches of wildflowers along the 66,500-mile Texas highway network.

And it also lets nature take her course. The wildflowers are untouched until they go to seed and the pods ripen.

Only after the flowers reseed themselves do the Highway Department men give the roadsides the season's first complete and thorough manicure.

Come next spring, these areas will be ablaze with wildflower blossoms again.

For three decades, the Texas Highway Department has been concerned with the appearance of its roadsides. The Department pioneered highway beautification.

And though "beauty is its own reward" there are practical reasons for the program that has made the Texas Highway Department the state's biggest gardener.

By helping to retard erosion of slopes along the highways, wildflowers serve an important function in protecting the taxpayer's investment in the Texas highway system.

Natural floral along the highways are augmented by plantings

of other trees and shrubs by the Department.

Together, these touches of roadside beauty act as hidden persuaders to drivers. A carefully-located tree or shrub subtly calls to driver's attention to a potential roadside hazard.

Coupled with the 1,100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and scenic turnouts on Texas highways, the plantings of man and nature combat "highway hypnosis".

In this way, beautification efforts play an important role in highway safety. They encourage the driver to take frequent breaks from the wheel, lessening fatigue and making his trip safer and more pleasant.
